Professional bear speculators who have been siertly looking for the moment of reaction ever since Weines-day, found that the freezing for the first time was not effectually absorbed. Their efforts were redoubled, and when prices began to make wide decimes, stop-loss orders were disloged and the fall thus precipitated. The bears were in more reckless mood and were quick to take profits, causing frequent railies, as they

covered their short contracts.

While some outside demand continued during the day, it was at no time resumed in force. The resumption of selling for London account dissipated the hope of an enormous short demand for that account to be covered. If London is still short in the New York market it is on contracts due at some future settlement, and the continued selling from there indicates an unchanged conviction that a reaction in prices will intervene here before that

The expectation of another large war loan to be floated in London depressed that market, and was a direct influence in New York as well. It emphasized the apprehension hitherto felt of a forther German Government issue niso. It is not to be supposed that with the huge in-debtedness of the foreign money markets to the United States, the foreign government authorities can hope successfully to float their loans without assistance from other markets, and believe that an outward flow of gold from New York would probably be necessary.
