GATES ORDERED BEESON

Verdict of Jury on the Willapa River Crime.

Olsen, Also Accused, Was Acquitted—Jury Out Eighteen Hours and Compromised on Decision.

SOUTH BEND, Wash., Nov. 20.—Shortly after noon today, the jury brought in a verdict of guilty of murder in the second degree in the case of E. Gates, and acquitted of Gates charged with the murder of Captain Beeson, on the Willapa River, August 21.

Gates' ruddy face turned as white as a sheet when the verdict was announced, but soon recovered his equanimity.

The verdict was the result of a compromise. The jury was out 18 hours. It is reported that after the first ballot the vote stood 11 for murder in the second degree and one for acquittal.

EASTERN OYSTER CULTURE

Review of Experiments on the Pacific Coast.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—One of the interesting features of the annual report of the Fish Commissioner is the review of the introduction of Eastern Oysters on the Pacific Coast, which has for a number of years been one of the most important industries that has been instituted by the Commission.

Japan received 31 grand prizes, 131 gold medals, 251 silver medals, 491 bronze medals, 390 honorable mentions, a total of 1275 awards.

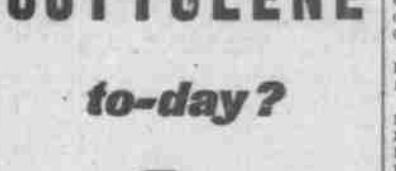
