The validity is questioned of the agreement made in April, 1999, by which the Chicago Consolidated Traction Company secured the right to use the down-town lines controlled by the Union Traction Company in exchange for 8,750,000 of its bonds, which were to be placed with the Equitable Trust Company, to be given in exchange for shares of the capital stock of the Company. The heads were to be supplied to the Company. Company. The bonds were to be guar-anteed by the Union Traction Company. The agreement is alleged to be the result of a secret understanding. The inter-venors charge that the "actual financial result of said secret understanding and scheme was that Yerkes and his assosonems was that Yerkes and his asso-ciates in the Consolidated Company fraudulently, illegally and without any feal consideration obtained a gratuitous use of valuable property rights of the Union Traction Company, over \$400,000 or its cash and several millions of dollars of its personal interest-bearing obliga-tions."
