**TURKEYS ARE PLentiful.**—The markets are displaying Thanksgiving turkeys by the hundred, and there are plenty of very fine ones. The price of a choice bird is 20 cents per pound. This is about as cheap as meat birds have been for some time. The turkeys are being sold. There will, of course, be some turkeys to be got for less than 20 cents, some second-rate ones probably for 15 cents per pound, and some very poor ones for still less, but dealers say that it is economy to buy a good one. It is putting fat on a turkey that costs, and there is no comparison between a lean one and a fine fat one. There are also plenty of chickens, ducks and geese in the markets, but the only really appropriate bird for Thanksgiving is a good, fat turkey.

# HELPING THE NEEDY

**Annual Meeting of City Board of Charities.**

**ONE EVIDENCE OF PROSPERITY**

**Reports Demonstrate a Gratifying Decrease in Cases of Distress—New Directors Chosen.**

The annual meeting of the City Board of Charities was held last night, President Thomas N. Strong presiding over a representative gathering. The election of directors resulted in the choosing of John C. Robinson to succeed Dr. T. L. Elliot, who declined re-election; Rev. H. W. Kellogg and Dr. Andrew C. Smith. The directors will meet shortly to elect a president and other officers of the board.

Reports of the treasurer and auditors were adopted and a vote of thanks tendered those gentlemen. Messrs. D. O. Oliphant and John Cran were re-elected auditors of the board.

The reports of the president and secretary were then submitted, as follows:

**President Strong's Address.**

In view of our annual meeting, it again devolves upon me to make such suggestions and recommendations as seem pertinent to the occasion. The year past, so far as our work is concerned, has been a most successful one. In conditions have become established, and the slowly rising tide of what we all hope will be a long-continued prosperity has helped us on our way.

It is curious to observe how exactly economic conditions are indicated in our reports, and how a much larger proportion of real poverty than was supposed to exist in 1909 is now being met. The amount of necessary charity in a population of 100,000 ought to be about exactly double that in a population of 50,000.

There are many more really needy people, and by this I mean needy through no fault or neglect of their own, in Portland today than there were in 1909. Last year more people had to be helped, and charitable expenditures were twice or three times what they were in 1909.

Let us year our expenditures for all purposes were \$9448.37. This year it was \$9800.00. Last year we had 2996 applications for help. This year 1938, and although in view of the vast amount of defective human material constantly being turned out of nature's workhouse, and of the devices of men to ruin each other, it is idle to imagine that poverty will ever be wholly eliminated, still, we are making satisfactory progress in reducing its volume. The old Indian "potluch" system of charity stands as a monument to the belief that this money should have been given away, left at the cross-roads for every needy and helpless creature at the time of its birth. It is not an alms-giving board, and much to the surprise of cheap philanthropists, it will at any time wisely spend three dollars rather than ten in the comparatively short existence of full participation. **YEAR'S WORK IN DETAIL.**  
**Less Destitution and Fewer Calls for Relief Than in 1909.**  
 The report of Secretary Walpole was almost entirely statistical, and set forth by comparative figures very clearly that the amount of destitution had largely decreased since last year, notwithstanding increase in population. The figures appended here for the year ending November 26, and showed that since the establishment of the board in 1888 exactly 15,750 cases of distress had been relieved. The report of the year ending November 26, 1909, showed the balance on hand to be \$117.79. The receipts for the year were as follows:
