SLOGANS OF POLITICIANS

CAMPAIGN RALLYING CRIES, PAST AND PRESENT.

An Interesting Comparison of Those Employed in American Presidential Elections.

The political cry, "What's the matter with —?" and the response, "He's all right." followed by the inevitable query and reply, "Who's all right?" "—a all right," are longilved, says the Chicago Times-Herald.

An old politician who has attended the National conventions of the two big parties since 1878 says that the present cry, above quoted, originated in New York, and that the inquiry was made about Grover Cleveland, when he was first a candidate for President. This will probably bring out several denials, and the public will in time know all about it.

A singular fact in connection with the cry is the unanimity with which it has been taken up, not only by the shriekers in the conventions and mass meetings of the two parties referred to, but by all conventions of minor parties and in every mass meeting of a secular character where the cinmor is focused on some one individual. It is not known, so far as the records show, whether anybody ever proposed three cheem for George Washington, but it is said that he was accustomed to hearthe cry in the days of his political prominence, "Long live George Washington," nence, "Long live George washing,", which was a curtous slogan when one remembers that it is the saturation to royalty, especially in Great Britain. "Sound on the Goose."

"Sound on the Goose." or "All right on the goose" was a sectional cry before the Civil War. It was never heard in convention, but was applied to the arthodox views on slavery of any individual in the Southwest who was seeking political preferment. During the Kansas troubles, before the admission into statebood of that territory, the expression became general. There was a secret organization in Leave-There was a secret organization in Leavenworth composed of border ruffians, which investigated newcomers into the territory in order to ascertain their political opinions on the question of siavery. the opinion harmonized with the views of the investigators the newcomer was selemnly declared to be "all right on the goose," and he was received into fellow-ablp and assisted according to his wishes. Later the expression was adopted in the East. As early as 1857, in a mayorally campaign in Providence, R. I., a writer referring to one of the candidates, said in rhyme, which became a campaign cry: To seek for political flaws is no use, His opponents will find he is sound on the

Just why the goose, which, next to the hen, has less sense than anything in feathers is still to be explained. The expression was contemporaneous, or nearly so, with the abbreviation, O. K. which originated with Davy Crockett's spelling of "all recent of the state of the sense of the sense

spelling of "all correct." A candidate who was declared O. K. was on an equal footing with the one who was all right on the gross, although the latter expres-sion become became known long after Croekett's

nicknames applied to parties. That of
locofoco was one of the earliest and lived
longer than any. It was applied to the
Democratic party in 1825, and had its
origin in an incident that occurred in
Tammany. Gidson Lee was a Congressional candidate. According to party
usage his candidate had to be confirmed
by Tammany. During an animated contest over the selection of a chairman the
gas was estinguished. The faction in the
meeting known as the equal rights party gas was extinguished. The faction in the meeting known as the equal rights party had self-lighting candles, which were known as locofoco candles, the origin of which was the lacofoco cigar. During the excitement in the fark the equal rights party "lighted up" with their candles and elected their chairman. The term locofoco was immediately applied to the party as a whole, and the appellation, becoming general continued for years. ming general, continued for years. In splie of the call for harmony in the party, the Democrats were nearly always rent by dissension, and thus one wing in New York, the nadical and progressive

wing, was known as barn-burners, while the more conservative element was more conservative element was known as huskers.

Long before the Whig party ceased to exist its members were called coons, and the pelt of that animal was selected as the emblem of the party in its notable canyans of 1840.

The terms "squatter sovereignty," applied to a wing of the Democracy which believed in the rights of people in each territory, before or after its admission into statehood, to permit or prohibit slavery, and "rail-splitters," applied to Republicans during the first canvass of Mr. Lincoln, are still familiar to the present generation.

HAS A SIXTY-DOLLAR BILL.

Spokane Man's Piece of Money the Trensury Has Pronounced Good.

Spokane the only 30 paper bill in United States currency known to be in It was issued at the first session of the

Continental Congress in ITS, and carries with it all the crudity of that age. It is a peculiar-loaking document, being a piece of greenish paper of much the same material as the present paper money, except that it is heavier. In shape it is almost square with directions of them. most square, with dimensions of about four by 2% inches.
On one side of the bill is written the receipt, which is as follows:
"This bill entities the bearer to receive

60 Spanish milled dallars for value re-ceived in gold or silver, according to a resolution passed by Congress at Phila-

resolution passed by Congress at Philaphia, September M, 1778."

On the back of the bill is drawn a bow with a set arrow. Along the margin the value of the bill is again printed, and at one side the words, "Printed, Hell & Selers, 1778." At the bottom of the face is the signature of some one in authority. The letters have so faded out that it is almost impossible to failure the observed. almost impossible to follow the charac-ters. Some have imagined they could trace the signature of George Washington upon those lines, but others could not imagine what authority he had to dis-tribute money at that date. This rare bill is the property of Otto Fischti, of the Fischti quarter of the

Cowur d'Alene. It was presented to him at the Charleston earthquake in 1885 for the saving of an Irishman's life. The open-hearted act of the big German toward his hereditary enemy so overcame the man from Erin's Isle that he gave him the only article of value he pos-
