

DEEP WATERWAYS. Report of the Commission Sent to

Congress. WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.-The complete report of the Deep Waterways Commis-sion was sent to the House of Repre-sentatives today by Scretary Root. The project is one for a deep-waterway be-tween the Great Lakes and Atlantic tide-water. The estimated cost of a 1L-foot waterway is given at \$205,355,000, and of a 30-foot waterway at \$117,58,500. An ad-ditional estimate is made for deepening the harbors of Chicago and Duluth, making the total for the 30-foot channel

of \$255.592,000. The cost of annual main-tenance of the 21-700t waterways is giv-en at \$2,520,305, and of the 30-foot water way, \$2,530,305. The most favorable route, the commission states, for a 30-foot water way from the lakes to the sea is "from Lake Eric to Lake Ontario, via LaSalle and Lewiston and from Lake Ontario to the Hudson River via Oswego and the Mohawk Valley, and that the same route is practically favorable as any for the 21-foot waterway." 
