## BECAUSE STEAK WAS TOUGH FOR ST. MARY'S HOME.

After Two Years' Stay, Gabriel Roche Leaves the Poor Farm.

Gabriel Roche is a 74-year-old Frenchman, who has a decided grievance against the County Poor Farm. He lived there for two years, but left several days ago, one reason being that the steak was tough and they declined to serve butter at dinner time.

In an interview with an Oregonian reporter yesterday, Roche, who now lives on Morrison street near Front, said: "I was born near the town of St. Malo, Brittany, France, and I came to Portland in 1887 and left four years later. Two years ago I returned and became an inmate of the County Poor Farm. They have not worked me well up there. They made me pick hay, shoveled manure usually given to three men. Then I refused to work any more at this, and they ordered me to work in the woods, clearing land. I took my dinner with me, but trouble came when the officials refused to give me butter for the bread. The coffee was like dishwater. For breakfast, I got a stew, the main component of which was potatoes. Supper was bread and molasses, and boiled potatoes. The steak was tough, and I couldn't eat it, on account of my bad teeth.

"Are those all the complaints you have against the Poor Farm?" was asked. "Are they not enough?" said Roche excitedly. "I left there last Thursday week. I couldn't stand it any more. I claim that by not allowing me to work on roadmaking near the Poor Farm the county lost \$30, because other men had to be hired to do the work. Three months ago there was considerable hauling of wood around the farm, and men were paid \$3 for this. I could have done the work, so I claim that the county in those two instances lost over \$60 by paying men to do work which I could have done for nothing as an inmate of the farm."

## PROTEST AGAINST SALE.

Marquams Assert That Disposal of Property Was Illegal.

The sale of the Marquams properties by the Sheriff last week was not confirmed by the Circuit Court yesterday, as would have been done had not an objection to the proceeding been filed. The attorneys of P. A. and Emma Marquam entered a motion in Judge Cleland's department, affirming that the sale was irregular and should not be confirmed by the court. The grounds of the motion are that the notice of the sale was given in a Sunday newspaper, and was therefore null and void; that the tracts of land were separate and distinct, but not so sold; that the notices of the sale were not posted in three public places for four weeks, as required by law; that the Sheriff in his return did not state where the notices of the sale were posted. The petitioners ask that the sale be set aside and the property ordered resold. J. Thorburn Ross bought in the property at the sale for \$26,549.77.

## FOR ST. MARY'S HOME.

Appeal for Help From the Superintendent.

B. Faber, superintendent of St. Mary's Home, Beaverton, sends the following appeal to the public:

Two Sisters of St. Mary's Home, Beaverton, Or., are visiting the business part of Portland, soliciting Christmas donations for the orphans of St. Mary's Home. In order to protect the charitably inclined from impostors, these two Sisters will, during this week, have a letter from Superintendent Faber, dated December 13, 1900, to identify them. Two other Sisters of the Home are collecting in the Sacred Heart Parish, or the East Side, also for St. Mary's Home. They have a letter from Archbishop Christie. St. Mary's Home supports, at present, 76 orphans, of whom seven are babies of less than 1 year old. In its main institution, situated one mile west of Beaverton, and 20 orphan girls in its branch institution at St. Paul.

The total number of the inmates of St. Mary's Home, inclusive of attendants and hired hands, is 115. Although neither the superintendent nor any of the Sisters expect, nor would accept any salary, the expenses of the institution during the year run up into the thousands of dollars. For support, it relies mainly upon charitable contributions. These contributions, although liberal, did not by far come up this year to the expenses, and the ends do not meet. "All the priests in Oregon are most willing to accept donations for St. Mary's Home and send them to us. "In Portland, donations may be sent besides to the residence of each priest, especially to the archbishop's residence, and to St. Mary's Academy, on Fourth street."

## COUNTY SEAT OF UNION.

Question May Come Up at the Next Legislative Session.

D. A. McAllister, member of the Legislature from Union County, is spending a few days at the Imperial. In speaking last evening of the projected attempt to remove the county seat from Union to La Grande he said there was very little talk of it just now, in Union County, though there was no telling how forcibly it might be sprung in the Legislature when that body meets in January. "Old La Grande had the county seat of Union prior to 1871," he said, "and many of the old settlers of the western part of the county think the new La Grande ought to recover it. La Grande has become quite a power in the politics of Union County as it casts about one-fourth of the votes. The amount of business done in La Grande is largely in excess of Union while its hotel accommodations are also superior." These items become strong arguments when the question of county seat removal comes up, though how the election would be in case of removal, Mr. McAllister did not venture an opinion. Many citizens might vote to retain the county seat
