CAUGHT IN A FIRE-TRAP

WOMAN AND A BOY NEARLY ASPHYXIATED IN A BASEMENT.

Head of Lighted Match Fell on Gasoline on the Floor and Caused an Explosion.

Prompt work by half a dozen men saved Mrs. A. Litzell and her 16-year-old son, Roy Roberts, from asphyxiation in the basement of the Chicago Costume House, 388 Morrison street, last night. Two men who were passing the store at 7 o'clock were stopped by cries of "Save us!" "For God's sake break open the door!" Smoke of a gasoline oil issued from a trapdoor in the sidewalk. The two men tugged at the trapdoor, but water and frost held it tightly together. Axes were obtained at near-by dwellings, the door was pried open, and two gasping persons were lifted to the sidewalk. Mrs. Litzell and her boy were drawing gasoline from a five-gallon can in the rear of the basement, 50 feet back from the street. The woman held a pitcher under the faucet, and the boy held it with a lighted parlor match. The head of the match fell upon a drop of gasoline on the floor and started a blaze, which Mrs. Litzell increased by dropping the pitcher and its contents. The woman's clothing flared up, but the boy threw his arms around her and extinguished the blaze. Then Mrs. Litzell crawled to the trapdoor, pursued closely by the fire. The lad deserves credit for his coolness, for otherwise his mother would have been burned to death. He put his back to the fire and protected his mother as much as possible. Mrs. Litzell was painfully burned on one hand. Roy escaped injury. The stick in the stove was damaged slightly by gasoline smoke. The firemen put out the fire with Babcocks.

TO THE POORHOUSE.

Unenviable New Year's Situation of Three Sick Men.

Erna Leland, the old man arrested near Corbett and brought to this city to answer to a charge of shooting his son-in-law, Watts, was taken to the County Hospital yesterday. He was paralyzed on his left side when he was arrested, and exhaustion and nervous excitement, connected with his arrest and journey to town, brought on complete paralysis. He was held to answer in \$500, which none of his family seemed inclined to furnish. All the property he has is in his wife's name, and she insisted on the county taking charge of the old man and furnishing medical treatment for him, so he was taken to the County Hospital. In the same ambulance with him "Old Mike Maloney," a longshoreman who has lived here for many years, was taken to the hospital. He is suffering from a bad attack of diphtheria, and there is but slight chance for his recovery. A sailor who ran away from his ship in slippers a short time ago and has been going about in a slippish way ever since, came to the County Commissioner's office yesterday, to be sent to the County Hos-

pital. Dr. McKay examined the poor fellow and found that his temperature was 108, so he was sent to the hospital. He has malaria.

NEW ORIENTAL LINE.

Officers of Oregon & Oriental Steamship Company Elected.

At a meeting of the Oregon & Oriental Steamship Company yesterday, the following board of directors was elected for the ensuing year: P. A. Graham, H. L. Pitcock, G. Rosenblatt and George T. Myers, of Portland, and Robert Hanna, of Washington, D. C. The officers elected are: President, P. A. Graham; vice-president, Robert Hanna; treasurer, G. Rosenblatt; secretary, N. H. Alexander. The following-named steamships are now being operated in this line: Eva, 500 tons; Adala, 500 tons; Universe, 400 tons; Carmarthenshire, 400 tons; Monmouthshire, 400 tons. They ply between Portland, Chinese and Japanese ports. The Carmarthenshire and Monmouthshire go via Manila and the others go via Vladivostok, Siberia. Agencies have been established in all principal ports of the Orient and the United States.
