Prospect for a Strike of Blast Fur-nace Operators. CLEVELAND, O., Jan. 11.—The Iron Trade Review this week will say: The prospect of a conflict between blast furnace operators in Mahoning and Sheungo Valleys and their employes may become a factor of some importance in the situation. The furnace men recontly decided on a reduction from \$1.90 to \$1.55 for turn work and the employes at a delegate convention this week not only de-cided to strike in case the reduction is put in force, but presented a counter demand for a 10 per cent increase. The in-dications are that operations will stop at all the valley furnaces now in blast, these including a number of important plants connected with the steel works.
