WILL CALL A MEETING

MINISTERS WHO ARE OPPOSED TO GAMBLING.

Mass Meeting to Be Held Next Sunday Afternoon—Names of Five "Lay" Members Announced.

The ministerial committee recently appointed to investigate gambling conditions in this city met, yesterday, in executive session, at the rooms of the Young Men's Christian Association, and made arrangements for a public meeting at the Marquam Theater, next Sunday afternoon, at 3 o'clock. The name of the chairman will be announced later.

It was stated that addresses will be given at this meeting by Rev. J. E. Snyder, of the Third-Street Mission, who will make statements as to his investigation of the case so far, and Rev. Dr. Edgar P. Hill, of the First Presbyterian Church. Action will then be taken toward the organization of the proposed Law Enforcement Society, and resolutions will be prepared for presentation at the meeting. Officers of the organization will be elected to co-operate with the city officials, in the enforcement of the law.

The lay members of the committee, it was stated, who have thus far agreed to serve are: H. W. Scott, W. M. Ladd, James F. Felling, R. Livingstone and F. McKercher. It is hoped to announce the names of the three remaining lay members of the committee who will serve in a day or two. The names of the ministerial members are: Rev. J. E. Snyder, Rev. A. W. Ackerman, Rev. Alexander Blackburn, Rev. Dr. A. A. Morrison, Rev. H. W. Kellogg, Rev. J. J. Dalton and Rev. Dr. Stephen S. Wise.

VETERANS OF GERMAN WARS

Band of the North Pacific Formed in Portland.

The roll-call of the German veterans of the campaigns of 1848-49, 1864 and 1870-71 proved a great success. Out of a list of 21 veterans, 17 were present. Of six veterans of 1848-49 there were present: Consul C. von Wunsingerode, P. Peterson, of Albina, and Christopher Schlotz, of 408 Fourth street, and among those of the year 1864 were Charles Schmidt, Assessor of Wasco County, Veterans had come from Mount Angel, Hubbard, Oregon City, The Dalles, Scappoose, Vancouver, Wash., and Portland and vicinity.

After the German Veteran Band of the North Pacific was formally constituted, the following officers were elected: C. von Wunsingerode, district commander; G. Schlotz, district quartermaster; A. Childs, district sergeant-major; Louis Desort, of Vancouver, Joseph Kuerten of Oregon City, C. Schwerdtmann of Hillsdale, Charles L. Schmidt of The Dalles, A. Baerndt, W. Eschelsbacher, H. Waterholter, D. W. Riedle, of Portland, district under officers.

The Stephens Addition Athletic Hall was finely decorated with American and German colors. The German eagle bore as a motto the refrain of the Landwehr-song: "To him who served his time with honor, this full goblet is dedicated, while the American coat-of-arms bore the motto:

Love to the country where my cradle stood, Loyalty to the country where rest my wandering feet.

RESORT TO HAZING NOW

EAST SIDE "S. S. S." TAKE UP WEST POINT SPORT.

Victims Are Afraid to Tell for Fear of Worse Treatment at the Hands of Ruffians.

The members of the "S. S. S." who made it hot for the residents of Central East Portland by smashing windows and perpetrating other damages to property, have suspended operations in that direction, but are hazing youngsters who they happen to catch unprotected away from their homes at night. Policemen Parker said yesterday he was informed that several small boys have been severely handled by the gang recently, but he had been unable to ascertain the identity of the boys who were hazed. The youngsters are operating in the vicinity of the Central School grounds. They catch a boy on the street alone and drag him down under an elevated roadway, where they handle him rather roughly. His clothes are partly torn off and he is "exercised" severely. The gang seems to have gathered the idea of hazing from the vaudeville acts at West Point, only it don't give the victim a chance to fight. It is not known how many "regiments" to use a West Point term, they compel the unfortunate boy to do while they have him under the roadway, or how much exercise they give him, as the victims have been frightened into silence so far. Whether this new form of devilry is an improvement on smashing windows or defacing property may be doubted, but the long suffering residents of East Portland will have to stand by and see if it would be wrong to abridge the rights of the gang.

Work on the Crematory.

Work on the foundation of a crematory on the Oregon City Railway, near Sellwood, was commenced yesterday morning, the excavating having been finished last week. The footings for the brick walls will be of concrete, and several men were mixing the concrete yesterday. The switch from the Oregon City Railway is completed so that flat cars can be run down on the siding with material. Brick is being delivered from Willaburg. A considerable quantity of brick and concrete is already on the ground. Frank Gibson, superintendent, hopes to have the foundation well enough advanced so the corner-stone may be laid within a week with appropriate ceremony. Several clergymen and representatives of fraternal organizations will be invited to take part in the ceremony. Mr. Gibson has had the grounds cleared, leaving much of the natural shrubbery standing. He says there are on the ground 20 different varieties of trees, and he will have others planted. Well down the bluff on the river side is a magnificent spring gushing out of the bank, and paths will be terraced down to it. Some more ground has been added at the south end, so that the crematory site is in a form of a horseshoe facing the river. It will be made a beautiful spot.

Shot at a Thief.

Sunday evening Harry Dyer, who is a Deputy Sheriff, charged off a trap who was trying to sell him a new mackintosh on Hawthorne avenue. He said the coat belonged to him, but Dyer could see it was too small for the fellow to wear it, and concluding it had been stolen started with the tramp to find Policeman Parker. At about East Third and East Washington streets the tramp suddenly threw the coat to the side and started to run west on East Washington street. Dyer fired a pistol over his head, but the

tramp continued his flight and got away. The mackintosh was stolen from a West Side store.

Death of Mrs. Eliza E. Paquet.

Mrs. Eliza E. Paquet, wife of Louis Paquet, the well-known East Side boat-builder, died at Los Angeles, Cal., yesterday morning. Mrs. Mary Walton, her sister, starts for Portland with the remains today. Mrs. Paquet was born in Clackamas County in 1858, her father being Coleman Buckner, a well-known pioneer of that county. With her sister, Mrs. Paquet went to Los Angeles last October for her health. A husband and an only son survive her. The funeral will take place at Oregon City.

Nisley and wife tendered the boys of the Sunnyside Boys' Brigade a pleasing reception at the quarters of the brigade, East Yamhill and East Thirty-fifth streets, Friday evening. Fully 300 gathered at the quarters. A pleasing programme was rendered, and the brigade received much encouragement.

DRIVING MANY LOGS.

Cowman River Now the Scene of Much Activity.

Along the Cowman River in Washington, is a busy place for loggers this winter, according to H. N. Crum, of that section, who was in Portland yesterday. Early 1,000,000 feet of logs have been driven down the river since last fall, he said, "and a large number of logging companies are operating constantly. There are four dams across the Cowman and its two main tributaries, and a 'splash' occurs twice a week, during which the logs are washed down toward the Columbia, as in a freshet. Most of the logs are rafted to Portland, where they are speedily sawed up into merchantable lumber."

Timber lands are now at a premium on the Cowman, according to Mr. Crum, and quarter sections find ready sale to Eastern men at \$200 and \$300 each. Even the odd sections claimed by the Northern Pacific Railroad are built up by squatters, pending the result of a lawsuit. The squatters, however, have very little hope of obtaining title, as the lands are too valuable for the big corporation to let go without a long-continued struggle. The lands which have been secured by Eastern speculators have jumped to high figures and the holders are by no means anxious to sell even at their own prices. There is very little land now left in the hands of the first owners along the Cowman or, in fact, along any stream emptying into the Lower Columbia.
