

Bealizing of Speculative Profits Drove Prices Down.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.-The realizing of speculative profits proceeded steadily to-day at a resulting expense of prices. The Guly variation from the downward course was due to purely technical causes. 


The Metal Markets.
