### SUSTAIN JUDGE CLELAND

LAWYERS OPPOSED TO WATSON'S REMOVAL BILL. No Legislative Act Can Elect a Judge Who Has Been Elected and Installed.

### SPokane's Exhibition

Northwestern States Will Be Asked to Co-operate. E. M. Heyburn, of Spokane, was in Portland yesterday, in the interest of the Industrial Exposition, which is to be held at Spokane in 1902. He said: "I am here on legal business of my own, and to represent the business men of Spokane in bringing before the business men of Portland our exhibition in 1902. It is to be an interstate fair, and it is our intention to ask each of the Northwestern States to erect a separate building. There probably will be a building devoted to the resources of British Columbia. Spokane will erect a city building, which will be a permanent fixture. The cost of the exposition will be \$750,000. We are confident that the Northwestern States will respond cordially to our invitation. The project will be submitted to the Portland Chamber of Commerce at an early date."

### QUEEN'S MEMORIAL SERVICE

Postponed Until Next Sunday at the Armory.

Memorial services for Queen Victoria will be held at the Armory, Sunday, February 3, at 3 P. M. It was at first proposed to have this service tomorrow night, at the First Baptist Church, but more people applied for admission cards than the church will seat. The committee, preferring one large, impressive memorial, instead of a church service, with one or two overflow meetings, decided that the services would better be postponed until after the Queen's funeral, which will be held on February 2. About 2000 people will be accommodated in the armories, and a big chorus will be organized for the occasion. All singers will be invited to assist in the music arranged to meet at Trinity parish-house, 69 Fifth street, Tuesday evening, at 8 o'clock.

### FEBRUARY WEATHER.

The following data, covering a period of 25 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau records at Portland: Temperature—Mean or normal temperature, 41 degrees. The warmest month was that of 1885, with an average of 47 degrees. The coldest month was that of 1887, with an average of 31 degrees. The highest temperature was 85 degrees, on the 4th, 1886. The lowest temperature was 7 degrees, on the 5th, 1883. Average date on which first "killing" frost occurred in Autumn, November 23. Average date on which last "killing" frost occurred in Spring, April 11.

### OWNED HOWE'S ADDITION.

Death of a Pioneer Who Was an Early Comer to Portland.

James Howe, who died Thursday morning at 123 1/2 Third street, and who was widely known as the original owner of Howe's addition, had an interesting history. Born in Worcestershire, England, he came to Missouri when he was a young man, and in 1821 he and 40 other people started across the plains, with ox carts to find a home in the West. Cholera, hunger and wolves attacked the pioneers on the journey and many perished, but Howe managed to reach The Dalles, with two oxen. He built a log cabin, and in relating his first journey to Portland he used to say that he found only two white women in the town at that time. He got 72 acres of land, known afterward as Howe's addition, and settled down as a farmer and herb doctor. In 1836 Howe married Mrs. Carrie Wheatley, a Sioux Indian of high lineage, who was born in North Dakota. His wife survives him and one son, 6-year-old James Gladstone Howe, to whom Mr. Howe left his property, consisting of about 13 acres of land, near First and Division streets.

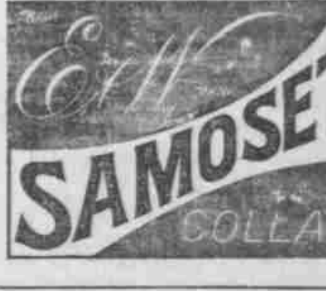
