THOSE OREGON REGIMENTS

The First Oregon Infantry and First Oregon Cavalry.

HUBBARD, Or., Jan. 29.-(To the Editor.)—In publishing my communication of January 25, pleading for justice and recognition for my dead comrades of the First Oregon Cavalry and First Oregon Infantry, you head the article as "A Strange Kind of Letter," and ask "What bloody fields did these heroes fall on?"

Now, let me say that the two regiments mentioned were recruited and ovanized. mentioned were recruited and organized by direction of the Secretary of War, and were as much a part of the "grand army" as any regiments in the Army of the Potomac. A very good history of the enlistment and muster of the First Oreson Cavalry was given in The Sunday Oregonian about three months ago by a person writing from Albany. 

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
