### NEW YORK STOCK MARKET.

### Big Pacific Railroad Deal Still an Influence in Trading.

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—The stock market was under the influence of the news of purchase of control of the Southern Pa-cific by a syndicate in the interests of the Union Pacific. Notwithstanding the plain corroboration by the tape on Friday of the runners of the "deal," the speculators were not without doubts, and the official Friday found the street in a state of un-preparedness, for while rumors of deals have been thick for many weeks past, this particular one had you have been thick for many weeks past, this particular one had not been formu-lated, even in the imagination of the tip-sters. The natural consequence was a sters. The natural consequence was a large and excited demand for stocks at the opening today. As a result of the accumulation of buying orders in commisaccumulation of Boying orders in commis-sion offlogs since last Friday, there were wide openings in various stocks under the excited bidding of competing brokers. They hought 12.500 shares of Union Pacific upon the fail of the himmer at simultan-cous prices of 35% to 35%, compared with 57% on Friday night. The opening rifes in Southers Pacific

The opening price in Southern Pacific was the highest, that stock selling at both 6% and 47 on the transfer of 5000 shares. The domand came from London, and the opening price here was considerably low the parity of that established in Lon-don this morning. Opinion in Wall street does not lead to the conclusion that the cale of the road is for the benefit of the stock which remains on the market, as it constitutes a minority stock of a road presumably to be operated for the best interests of the Union Pacific. The profeasional speculators took an active part in the market with the advantage of-fered by the large outside demand for stocks attracted by the Southern Pacific deal. In their manipulation to advance prices, one operator made a demonstrative bid for 10.000 shares of Union Pacific at 80. It was guickly supplied in a single


