ORIENT COMMISSION JOBS.

No Attempt Made by This Congress to Revive Bill Creating It.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 .- No attempt has been made at this session to revive the bill creating a commission to visit the Orient for the purpose of making an investigation and report upon the introduc tion of American goods into Asia. As a matter of fact, there was never any necessity for this bill, for all the information that American manufacturers and shippers need can be obtained from our Conquis. Our Consular officers in all foreign countries have been singularly effi-cient in sending information about trade and trade relations, and where they have not covered specific points this informa-tion can always be obtained by application to the State Department. It so happens that our Consuls in China and Japan have informed the Government quite fully upon all matters pertaining to trade and the greatest criticisms are passed because our merchants and business men desiring to trade in foreign countries do not follow the advice and instructions of these Consuls more carefully.

This proposed commission was appar-

ently for ne other purpose than to cre-ate places for a number of politicians and possibly to pay some political debts. There was some objection to it in the Senate. but during the long session it was easy enough to put it through, especially as very few people made it their business to kill the job. In the House there was a distinct opposition to it, and, after the bill had been amended in some particu-lars it was finally shown to be simply a place to give some political favorites a good salary and traveling expenses through Oriental countries for several years.
