SEASON ENDED, BUT COMPLAINTS HAVE NOT.—The duck shooting season ended in this section a month or more ago, owing to the ducks becoming too well informed as to the ways of the hunters, and nearly all the gangs of hunters had abandoned their preserves and brought their belongings home, before the Legislature passed the new game law. Game Warden Quimby is, however, kept on the move by complaints from outside districts. He had been informed that ducks were being murdered at Wapato Lake by the thousands, through the use of snipe boats or sink boxes, and he might shooting. He went out there and found that there had been no violations of the game law there, and that it was difficult to find ducks to shoot in any manner. As soon as he came home he was implored to hasten to Columbia Slough and Sauvie's Island to protect the ducks there which were being literally exterminated. As the sportsmen who have shooting premises at both these places have not been able to get any ducks for a month, it is probable that the reports are exaggerated. The sportsmen have given up feeding and "shooting" ducks for the season, it is safe to say that any one who gets many ducks now earns them dearly, besides running the risk of being overhauled by the Game Warden.

HIS BAKER AND ACTOR.—F. H. Schweitzer and M. Reink were in the Municipal Court, yesterday, charged with stealing \$200 in gold from a baker. From the evidence, it appeared that complainant and defendant are Hebrew actors, when they get a chance. Schweitzer said: "I'm an actor and a baker. I came from San Francisco to Portland several weeks ago and had \$100. When the defendants robbed me I only had \$20." The defendant's attorney said: "Schweitzer, Reink and Edelstein lived together in the same house on Front street. A woman named Jenny was there. Edelstein squandered his money on Jenny, and when she refused to have anything further to do with him, he threatened to throw himself in the river. 'I'll not drown myself for any Jenny, or for any one woman. There are others,' was Edelstein's unattractive response. The defendants were bound over to the Grand Jury, and Edelstein was held as a witness.

REMINISCE OF OLD DAYS.—A man wearing a leather coat, a dark shirt, a snowy hair and beard indicated an advanced age, which his bright eyes, ruddy cheeks and sturdy form belied, was seen starting yesterday at a window in which a large collection of minerals covered with dust, was displayed. He stood gazing at the heterogeneous mass so long that a bystander approached him and asked him if he were a miner. He said he had been engaged in prospecting and mining in various places for over 30 years, and was now 57 years of age. He said he had made and lost several small fortunes, and now had some good property in Alaska about 50 miles from Nome, out of which he hoped to make a "home stake" this summer. Such "old miners" used to be numerous all over the Pacific Coast, but of late years they are thinning out.

ASKS AID FOR PUBLIC LIBRARY.—At the regular meeting of the Portland Ministerial Association yesterday, Mrs. O. V. Bratt, who has been the leading spirit of the Portland Public Library, submitted the following: "The members of the congregation who represent are earnestly requested to make this new century Easter Sunday an offering of either one volume, suited to the need of the library, or its equivalent, the value of a volume in money, it is the opinion of the committee that if your organization will take hold of this problem of aiding the library, it can be most effective, and note will be volunteered for the purpose, convincing you of the needs of the city as to the library, or the great value such a donation as asked will prove."

NEW CROSSING.—The City and Suburban Railway Company yesterday began the work of removing the crossing at the intersection of Third and Morrison streets, and had about as many men employed as could be placed on the ground. The new crossing, of seven-inch, 90-pound rails, which is to be put in there is the finest crossing yet seen on the Pacific Coast. The ties will be placed away down and imbedded in and covered with concrete to within five inches of the surface. On this bed of concrete Belgian blocks will be laid, and grouted with cement, forming a pavement which will not be so easily worn into hollows alongside all the trucks and cures. With the best expedition that can be made, it will be about a week before the cars can be running over the new crossing.

POSTOFFICE RECEIPTS.—The receipts of the Portland postoffice from the sale of stamps, stamped envelopes and postal cards, for the month of February, 1901, amounted to \$16,020.20, as compared with the corresponding month of last year were \$14,916.88, showing an increase for this year over last of \$1,103.32. This is a very satisfactory showing for the shortest and one of the dullest months of the year. The receipts of the internal revenue office of this district for the month of February last amounted to \$76,962.93. The receipts for the corresponding month of 1900, were \$66,343.69, showing an increase for February, 1901, of \$10,619.24.

LIGHTHOUSES FOR ALASKA.—Capt. Langfitt, United States Engineer, who is Lighthouse Engineer in charge of the 12th district, has the plans and specifications prepared and will forward to the Lighthouse Board in a few days for the light-house in Alaska. One of these is to be built on Sentinel Island and the other on Southeast Five Fingers, on the south-east coast of Alaska. These are the first light-houses the Government has undertaken to build in Alaska, but it will probably not be many years before there are many more in that territory.

A NIGHT IN FAIRYLAND

MAGNIFICENT PRODUCTION OF "A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM."

The James-Kidder Company's Splendid Interpretation of Shakespeare's Comedy.

Never in a Portland theatre has such a magnificent spectacle been seen as the production of "A Midsummer Night's Dream," at the Marquam last night. Had there been no spoken words, no music even, the great audience that filled the theatre might have feasted his eyes on the wilderness of beauty before him, and felt more than repaid for standing long in line to secure seats. And when the play is read by such an unexceptionably good company as that headed by Louis James and Kathryn Kidder the witness-bered. Of all Shakespearean dramas, this is unquestionably the most difficult of adequate presentation. It would be incredible to know just what the managers in Shakespeare's day did with it, for the master playwright seemed to have gauze drops and incandescent lights in mind when he peopled his sylph scenes with fairies and shed the soft glow of the will-o-the-wisps over their festivities, and it is not on record that either of these accessories were at hand when the stage of the Globe was fitted up. At all events there is no doubt that if the author of "A Midsummer Night's Dream," however gorgeously his mind may have pictured the fairyland of which he wrote, had stepped into the Marquam last night he must needs have spent the rest of the evening recovering from his surprise. Artist and stage manager have united to mount the play with a magnificence that seems as magical as the love charm with which Robin Goodfellow confuses the wandering lovers in the wood, and a splendid company lends a beauty to the poetic lines that is indescribable.

The scenes from Thesens palace in which the characters are introduced, the work of art and scenery of the introduction to the splendor of the forest dell in which the fairies live, move and have their being, and whither the mortals wander, offer a glimpse of a world of opportunity to moralize on their foolishness, and furnish amusement for their royal master, Oberon. Twinkling lights, floating through the branches overhead, vast depths of tangle, wildness, and fairylike flitting and dancing under the trees combine to astonish and delight the spectators, while the exquisite music which is the constant accompaniment of dialogue, mellow and enriches it so that it seems enchanted. It is in such surroundings that the play is given, and given faultlessly.

As might be expected, Louis James, in the character of Bottom, alone most brilliantly among the galaxy of stars that twinkled through the forest and shone in the garden, and palace. His rollicking humor clothes the heavy-witted weaver with a charm that is irresistible, and even the liberties he occasionally takes with the text seems pardonable in consideration of the interpretation he gives to the lines that are rightly his. So the playgoer derives new enjoyment from the passages which he so familiarly, and forgives the actor with all his heart when, from under the ponderous donkey's head, Buster Bottom inquires for a bale of hay! James has, in his turn, played several parts on the Marquam stage, but he has done nothing better than Bottom, and the gusto which he gives to the scene in which he impersonates Pyramus, and from his side the words of the play to the king that this or that line was correctly given, will probably always live in the memories of his admirers as their most pleasant recollection of him.

They are a dainty grace and beauty about Kathryn Kidder's reading of Shakespeare that might well be the envy of a number of actresses of possibly greater reputation. The words of the play are by no means easy of rendering feelingly and well, and the recurrence of the rhyme, which, in the mouth of a woman who is not an intelligent student of Shakespeare would make the reading monotonous and stinging, becomes sonorous music in hers. Her acting was finished throughout, and the scene in which she was represented as Hermione in the woods was a masterpiece of serio-comedy.

Ranking with the stars is Miss Ethel Brown as Robin Goodfellow, whose rippling laughter, light-footed tripping and fairy-like grace in everything she did won the approval of the audience instantly, and left her, when the play was done, a high favorite.

Norman Hackett, who does everything well, made a splendid Lysander, and James J. Ryan was scarcely less good as Demetrius. Hermione, played by Miss Jane Oaker, is a very lovely maid, and capable of a very excellent participation in the quarrel scene with Helena. Ashley Miller makes much of the difficult part of Oberon, while Miss Ida Brooks as Titania, is a truly enchanting fairy. The musical numbers in which the characters joined were not the least pleasing features of the production.

Mr. James has a very able force of craftsmen to assist him in his grand all-star production of the tragedy of "Pyramus and Thisbe." Thomas Coffin Cook is a Peter Quince to one's heart's good to see; Putnam Bond as Francis Flute becomes by translation an admirable Thisbe; D. A. Patterson plays well the dual role of Snout the Flute, and the wall with the chink in it; R. E. Jamieson is both a ferocious lion and an inoffensive joiner, and George A. McCulla as Starveling becomes in the great play a mellow and beautiful moonlight. The remainder of the company is equally well equipped.

The music, under the direction of Maxim de Grosz, adds much to the enjoyment of the play, the singing numbers by the fairies being exceedingly beautiful. All

WILL OPEN STREETS.

Preparing for City & Suburban Car-Shops Branch.

The owners of Rafferty's addition, in Brooklyn, have prepared a map showing several streets so that construction on the proposed branch of the City & Suburban Railway through that portion of the city may be undertaken. The route of the branch is along Grand avenue from East Tenth to Ellsworth, on Ellsworth to East Tenth, thence to Brooklyn, and thence to Pull street. None of the streets in Rafferty's addition are open, but it is proposed to open East Tenth south to a point where it is already open, and also all the other streets named in the car franchise. As the franchise passed by the City Council has been accepted by the company and the streets now closed are to be opened to permit construction, it is considered certain that work on the branch will soon be commenced. On passage of the ordinance the manager of the company gave assurance that the branch would be built this Spring.

First Local Institute.
 R. F. Robinson, county school superintendent, will hold his first local county teachers' institute at Troutdale on Saturday, March 16. He has not yet prepared the programme, but it will be ready in due time. Professor Robinson has visited most of the schools, and is thoroughly in touch with all the teachers in the county. He has given them the benefit of his long experience and encouraged them in their work, and now thinks the time is ripe for some institute work.

Work is progressing on the basement of the new Catholic Church on the Milwaukee road near Holgate street. It is a part of the School of the Sacred Heart, and will be a handsome edifice. It will be 80x40. A large amount of building material has been gathered on the ground.

The friends of Rev. G. A. Blair, now of Walla Walla, for several years pastor of the First Cumberland Presbyterian Church, East Side, will be glad to learn that his health has been fully restored. Mr. Blair was compelled to resign his Portland work on account of sickness.

There will be a public meeting in Odd Fellows' Hall, at Montavilla, Thursday evening, under auspices of the Board of Trade. Reports will be made by the committee on construction of a switch from the O. R. & N. Railway, and other matters of local importance, and a large attendance is desired.

The mission opened by Rev. Father Smith, at St. Patrick's Church, East Eleventh and East Oak streets, promises to be a great success. Father Smith addressed a large audience at the church Sunday and last night. Services will continue during the week. Father Smith is a pleasing and forcible speaker.
