"Those who base their advocacy of the system upon its working in Great Britain, Belgium and Switzerland grore vital differences between the conditions in those countries and in the United States, "Mr. Clark sald, "In this country there are only 67 people to each mile of wire, while there are in Great Britain 129 and in Belgium 221, In the United States there are 1,118,085 miles, All told, there are 22,000 places in the United States reached by telegraph, while in Great Britain there are only 1185 places thus reached. In this country almost 50 per cent of the postoffices have telegraph connections, while in Great Britain in those United States, Mr. Clark contended that on through messages they are comparatively higher.

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


