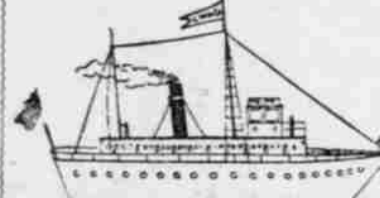

NEW MILITARY ACADEMY.

Dr. J. W. Hill to Establish One in a Fashionable Neighborhood.

Principal J. W. Hill, of the Bishop Scott Academy, will open a new military academy next Fall, and is preparing to erect a handsome building near Twenty-fourth and Marshall streets, for the home of the school. Dr. Hill has been the leasee and principal of the Bishop Scott Academy for 22 years, and has conducted the academy for the school trustees of the Episcopal Church. At the last Episcopal diocesan convention, it was decided that the school property should be leased no longer than the present year. For this reason Dr. Hill decided to open up an independent school of his own, and has his plans perfected for that purpose.

Speaking of the school and its prospects, Dr. Hill said last evening: "The school building will be one of the most complete of its kind on the coast. It will be called the Hill Military Academy, and will be run independently of any church or board of trustees. Its capacity will be limited, and the students selected from the number of applicants. The features of the school which will be emphasized will be military training and discipline and manual training. I am not prepared to announce my faculty, but I have already engaged two of the best school men I know of. The playground and athletic field of the academy will be removed some distance from the building, which will be the home of the school, and quietly and orderly conducted. There is no likelihood of the neighborhood fearing that the school will be a nuisance. On the contrary,

SHOCKED BY A LIVE WIRE

City & Suburban Lineman Did a Careless Act.

Ed Snyder, a lineman in the employ of the City & Suburban Railway, was badly shocked by contact with a 300-volt wire yesterday afternoon about 2 o'clock, at the foot of Caruthers street, in the south end of the city. He was sitting astride a crossbar at the top of a pole, adjusting a new wire, and in a forgetful moment, thrust his head between two loaded wires. His right ear came into contact with one of them and in an instant he was rendered insensible. He did not fall to the ground, as he was provided with a "safety," which is a broad leather belt, passing around the waist and looped over a crossbar. He hung limp and apparently lifeless by his strap, and by the time his two companions reached him he was frothing at the mouth and his eyes wore the stony glare of death. He was lowered to the street, and Dr. Cottle, who arrived at the scene a few minutes later, administered a hypodermic injection, which restored the injured man to consciousness in a short time. Snyder had been going to work again, though his ear and the side of his face were black from the shock. He was finally placed in a carriage and taken to his lodgings at the Tremont House, and later to the hospital.

The physicians were unable to tell how badly he was hurt yesterday, as injuries from an electric shock do not develop for a few days. Snyder has been in the employ of the company for about six months, and his fellow workmen say he
