New Committees Named in School Board.

NON-RESIDENT PUPILS AGAIN

Mrs. Sitton Placed on the Finance Committee With Director Thompson. Supplanting Mr. Williams-Routine Business.

What constitutes a non-resident pupil his been a burning question for the finance committee of the City Board of Education for a year, and no agreement has been reached. Directors Williams and Thompson constituted the committee, and each accuses the other of being the most contrary man he ever met. Last evencontrary man he ever met. Last evening il applications were presented for free
tuition from non-resident pupils, and a
motion was made to have them referred
to the committee on examination of teachers, as the finance committee could not
agree on such matters. Mr. Thompson
end.

"There's no use referring these applications to the finance committee as it is now constituted. There are fully 300 non-resident pupils attending Portland public schools, and these pupils should pay tuition, but Mr. Williams is opposed to it, In many cases the parents of these children are farmers, living in adjoining counties, who vote against a school tax in their own districts and send their children into the city, to live with some uncle, cousin or aunt. This is an outrage on the taxpayers of this city, and I in sist that all non-resident pupils shall pay the tultion fee."

"But," protested Mr. Williams, "these are not non-resident pupils. The fact that their parents live outside the city does not prove that the children's home is some-where else. Orphan children have to be educated, and it is the children's inter-est I am looking after, as well as the district's. Many of these so-called non-resident pupils are attending school with-out adding one cent to the expense of this district. I hold that where the child lives

In support of his opinion he quoted a Wisconsin case, where the child of a school mistress whose mother taught in Milwaukee was educated at a public school some distance from that city, and the law held the pupil a resident and entitled to school privileges, even though the mother was teaching in a distant

STUDIED OTHER STREETS.

A. L. Mills Observed What Eastern Cities Are Doing.

A. L. Mills, chairman of the Board of Public Works, has returned from a three weeks' visit to several of the principal Eastern cities. During his trip he de-voted considerable attention to municipal matters, especially street-cleaning and improving streets, and will lay the results of his observations before the board at its meeting this afternoon. He has concluded that by letting the work of street. cleaning by contract more satisfactory resuits can be obtained and will advocate a change in the system here. Mr. Burrell, on a late visit to San Francisco, came to the same conclusion in regard to the contract system for cleaning streets which he saw in operation there.

Mr. Mills also studied the manner of

contracting for various kinds of street pavements and improvements, and se-cured forms of the contracts which are made with paving contractors in Brook-lyn. These are much more binding than those in use here. He has handed them to City Engineer Chase. He also investi-gated the matter of the street-car ralis used on improved streets, and found that the kind of rail used and the work done by the City & Suburban Railway Com-pany at the intersection of Third and Morrison streets is up to date and the crossing a model. In nearly every place the space between the rails and the space just outside the tracks was paved with Belgian blocks on a concrete foundation. He is likely to recommend that all street railways hereafter, in improving their share of the streets, pattern after the work at Third and Morrison streets. He also looked into the matter of granting street railway franchises, and found that the general tendency is toward making them short lived-29 or 21 years. "I never forged any affidavits for pension papers," went on Bowlin. "Those
two pension claims mentioned in the present charge against me have not been allowed by the United States Government. No one has been defrauded out of one cent, in this matter, and if the claims had gone through the Pension Department, my fees would have amounted to only \$2. I merely drew up a few pension papers for old soldiers in Southeastern Kentucky, who could neither read nor write. I did

"I have never been in a Kentucky feud myself, and have never shed blood. Man. chester, Ky., is my town. I founded the town of Goldbug, Ky., in 1896, resided there three years, and established a Congregational Church and church-house. As for occupation, I was engaged in the merchandise business.
