NEW YORK STOCK MARKET. Upward Movement Caused by Northwestern Rallroad Deal.

NEW YORK, March 26.-The recurrence of the story of a Northwestern railroad Bodeal, coupling Northern Pacific and Burlington, was the occasion of an extraor-dinary and impressive upward movement in the late stock market today. Whatever may be the validity of the oft-re-newed claims of a transcontinental ar-rangement for the benefit of Northern Pacific and Great Northern, It was cles enough that the recovery in the gener market was due to the precipitate cover ing of short contracts which were pr out with great freedom and boldness is practically all the trading element on the exchange.

The attack on the market by the best element had met with inviting success and they had broken prices throughou practically the whole market. There was some show of strength in the early deal ings, and an apparent attempt to rene the built movement, but it soon became evident that the attempt to advance prices was no longer in such powerful and capable hands as has been the case during much of the recent built specular trees.

MOST FAMED OF DIAMONDS Six Gems of Priceless Value and Something of Their History.

Woman's Home Companion. Among historic diamonds the largest and best known is "the Grand Mogui," a stone weighing 280 carats, in the possession of the Shah of Persia. Next comes the "Orloff," named for Count Orloff, who bought it in 1772 for the Empress Cathbought it in 1772 for the Empress Catherine of Russia. The stone is rose-cut, shaped like a pigeon's egg and weighs 185 carats. The third is the "Regent," or "Pitt" diamond, which is one of the French crown jewels, The Duke of Orleans, acting as regent for Louis XV, bought it for him, paying 2550,000. The "Florentine," or "Austrian," is the fourth in size. It belonged to Charles the Boid of Burgundy, and was lost by him at the battle of Granson, in 1476. A Swiss peasant found it and sold it for half a crown. It finally came into the hands of Pope Julius II, who presented it to the Pope Julius II, who presented it to the Emperor of Austria. The fifth in size, called the "Star of the South," is a Bra-

The English "Krohinoor," while ranking sixth in size, is counted the most val-uable in the world. It was found in the mines of Golconda ages ago, and, after being successively in the possession of many Indian Princes passed to Queen Victoria. These are the six most famous dia-monds. A stone recently discovered in Africa can claim to be the largest in the world. It weighed, uncut, 475 carats,

BEET SUGAR IN ILLINOIS.

Farmers Find It Is Much Easier Raise Corn and Pork.

One of the greatest beet-sugar plants in country is about to be constructed at Shelby, Ind. It takes \$1,000,000 to put it in operation. The trouble with the best beet sugar plants is one of labor. The Illinois farmer can make a living too easily raising corn and pork, and he will not get down on his hands and knees and weed all day long and go through the backaching toll that is necessary to raise beets. He can do it, but he won't. The experiments that have been successful have been carried out by Russians, imported where they have been colonized from their native land, but with each succeeding year it has been found necessary to bring on a new lot. The old ones would save money enough to buy ground of their own, and they, too, find it easier to raise corn and hoga than beets. The problem seems to be, not to get improved processes for extracting sugar, but to devise labor for cultivating the beet. The "man with the hoe" has discovered that what he wants is a riding plow. He is not going to break his back over the clods when he can mount a spring seat and whistle while he rides.
