CONTINUE TO VIOLATE ORDINANCE.
Whether Contractor Cook has been guilty of violating ordinance 12085 will not be decided in the Municipal Court until this afternoon. The ordinance forbids the hauling of dirt by teams on asphalt, wood block or brick-paved streets, under penalty of \$5 to \$50 fine. Cook's teams have been hauling dirt from an excavation at the corner of Eleventh and Washington streets, along the asphalt pavement of Washington to Lowndes street, five blocks distant, where the earth is dumped into a fill. The defense contended yesterday that the ordinance was unconstitutional and prohibitory, and that the complaint was faulty and void. Judge Cameron held that both ordinance and complaint were all right, and overruled the demurrer, but he desires to look further into the feasibility of hauling the dirt up Burnside street over the macadam pavement. Cook's counsel contended that dirt could not have been hauled conveniently on any other street than Washington. Patrolman King reported that the teams were still violating the ordinance, and the Deputy City Attorney said that other warrants would be issued, and that more arrests would follow.

WILL ELECTRICITY MOUNT SCOTT LINE.
A meeting of property-owners along the Mount Scott Railway was held at the office of George P. Leont, yesterday morning, for the purpose of securing subscriptions to electrify the road and connect it with the City & Suburban system at Richmond. The residents along the line are willing to stand the expense of putting up the poles and electrifying the system and then turn the property over to the City & Suburban. About half a mile of right of way has been secured east of the terminus of the Waverly-Richmond line, but no trouble is anticipated from that portion of the work as the property-owners desire to see the connection made. It will, therefore, not be long before the trolley cars are running clear to Mount Scott and serving quite a large and desirably populated locality.

WILL HAVE STORIES TO TELL.
J. D. DeWolf, business manager for Blanche Walsh and S. Louis Gray, of the Marquam Theatre, threw their spoons into the whirling water of the fight for the fall of the Williamson yesterday, and extracted therefrom seven fine salmon, of an aggregate weight of 24 pounds. Mr. DeWolf, who is an old fisherman, had heard about the salmon fishing at Oregon City, and determined to try it. Mr. Gray accompanied him, and David Howe, the veteran salmon expert, was persuaded to go along as guide. The fish were secured as soon as the spoons were dropped into the water, and kept it up for two hours, which time afforded Mr. DeWolf and Mr. Gray the opportunity to land a small chinook, the second caught at the fall this year.

IDAHO'S NEW COUNTRY.
The contract for furnishing blank books and supplies for the new county of Clearwater, Idaho, was yesterday awarded to Glass & Prudhomme, of this city, by the Board of Commissioners, composed of Chairman Blake and Messrs. William A. Jones and John T. Malloy. In session at Oro Fino, there has been some talk of a suit in the Supreme Court of Idaho to test the validity of the act creating the new county, but those who look at the matter without prejudice are satisfied that the act will be sustained. However, the Portland firm is quite willing to take its chances with the County Commissioners on furnishing the large line of supplies needed and Clearwater County will soon be equipped in first-class shape and ready for business.

LACERATE TOO HIGH.
A progressive Chinese who helps to furnish amusement for his countrymen sojourning in this weary land by establishing fan games and lotteries, is slightly disgusted with the cost of his business. He says the cost of a lottery "license" is \$17.50 per month, and a fan game license \$25 per month. On account of this excessive charge and the fact that many of the "China boys" are away working in the canneries, only four out of 10 lottery games are running, and out of the 20 fan games only eight are open. When the Chinese working in the canneries return at the end of the season, with plenty of money in their pockets, it will pay, he says, to take out licenses to operate the games now closed.

TRAVELING ELECTRIC MOTOR.
The Southern Pacific Company's car shops, in the southeast part of the city, are to be operated by electricity. Wires from the generating station of the Portland General Electric Company, at Oregon City, pass close by the shops, and the necessary power can be taken directly from those wires. The necessary motors to operate the different machines are being installed. One novel feature in the arrangement is that the company is having a motor placed on a truck so that it can be hauled about to operate any machine in the shops singly, in case it is desired to do so. This will be very handy, as at night, for instance, it is sometimes necessary to run one machine without starting up the others.

NOTICE NOT PROPERLY UNDERSTOOD.
The published notice of Receiver Nixon, calling upon all depositors and creditors of the Portland Savings Bank who have no heretofore filed their claims with him to file such claims by May 15 next, does not seem to be generally understood by the depositors. The notice is intended to reach only those depositors who have never put in any claim to the bank, and, therefore, have never received any of the dividends which the receiver has paid. All of the depositors who have received dividends from the receiver have filed their claims, and do not have to file new ones.

TRIPS TO END HIS LIFE.
Frank Galland, an Italian who recently arrived in the city from Idaho, jumped into the river from the Burnside street bridge, early yesterday morning, with suicidal intent. He was fished out by Messrs. Fleming and Forbes, bridge employees, and was taken to the police station, where restorative were applied. He was released yesterday morning, but he was detained at the station during the day. No one in Portland knows anything about the man.

There was no stated programme, the evening being merely designed to give the members an opportunity to get acquainted with each other. SUPPLIES FOR SUPERVISORS

County Commissioners Solving New Problems as They Come Up.
The majority of Multnomah road supervisors attended the meeting of the Board of County Commissioners yesterday and entered into a general discussion regarding road work. The \$5 poll tax for road purposes was brought up. The Commissioners decided to defer action until meeting. Blank receipts have to be printed before the work of collecting can be done. The road supervisors collect and disburse the money under the supervision of the Commissioners.

The road supervisors submitted a list of supplies required, including lumber, spikes, etc. It has been the rule for each supervisor to obtain lumber at the nearest his district, and hardware at the leading hardware house. The Commissioners allowed some of the supervisors to procure some small orders, and to submit a list of what is needed. After these are all in, bids will probably be advertised for. Some time ago bids were advertised for covering such supplies, but the contracts have not yet been let.

One supervisor suggested that a supply of lumber sufficient to last for a year be obtained for him, which, as there is considerable bridge repairing in his district, would be a large quantity. The Commissioners stated that the county does not desire to establish lumber yards on a small scale throughout the county, and that a six-months' supply is enough for one time. The court will solve all these problems as rapidly as possible.

The original interpretation of the law that the county cannot purchase even a pound of pins, or a few dollars worth of anything except by contract, has been exploded. In emergency cases small articles will be bought by requisition, as before. If a prescription is necessary for a sick person at the county jail, it will be filled. Mr. Physician McKay was authorized to show at the most convenient blacksmith's, when necessary.

At the afternoon session of the Commissioners, one of the steel bridge tenders called and stated that he was out of oil, and it was imperative that they have a supply at once for signal lights, etc. He was given a requisition for two cans. The County Physician McKay was authorized to pay a balance due on a cork leg for G. Miller, who was obliged to have his leg amputated some time ago. He was assisted in the County Hospital, and his friends promised to pay half the cost of the artificial leg. Dr. McKay said it was a very worthy case, and Miller would be able to shift for himself when he got out, and he was a capable person.

The petition presented by David Cathay to have the license granted to Ford Metzger to conduct a saloon at Gresham revoked, was denied. The license of the resident of Gresham who was granted Metzger was recently fined \$300 by Judge George for selling liquor without license, on a plea of guilty.

Exposition Building and Multnomah Field for Carnival of 1901.

The Portland Carnival, 1901, will be held at the Exposition building, and on the grounds of the Multnomah Club, if suitable arrangements can be made. The committee reported at the Carnival meeting held at the Commercial Club rooms last evening, that all available sites in the city had been examined and the selection was considered the best. The Exposition building can be used in case of bad weather, and the open grounds on the south, when the days are warm, will be the best. The committee will meet this evening at the Multnomah Club headquarters further to discuss details.

Athletic sports will be made a feature of the Carnival. Amateurs and professionals will be summoned from all parts of the Northwest, to compete for prizes. In addition to novel drawing cards within the pavilion, will render the Carnival new and unique, and as reduced rates are to be secured from all points, country people will be induced to visit the city in greater numbers than ever before. This was the prevailing sentiment at the meeting last evening.

DURPHY MAKES A FIGHT

ALLEGED BIGAMIST STRONG ON TECHNICALITIES.
Complaining Witness Tells How She Learned That He Had Another Wife Back East.

The case of B. F. Durphy, charged with polygamy, by Margaret Durphy, occupied several hours of Judge Cameron's time yesterday afternoon, but the struggle over legal technicalities on the part of counsel prevented the development of much testimony. The case will be taken up again this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Papers used by the defendant in a divorce suit he instituted against the complaining witness in 1900 were introduced by the state to prove that he had been married to the complaining witness, but their admission as evidence was strenuously objected to, on the ground that the husband's affidavits could not be used against him. E. B. Miller, the notary before whom the affidavits were sworn to, could not state positively that the jurat was his, but thought it was. Neither could he tell whether the papers attached were those sworn to before him on the former occasion. He was very careful to keep from making any positive statement about anything, and so the cross-examination deduced nothing of moment from him.

A certified copy of a memorandum of the defendant's marriage to Sadie Bosworth at Plympton, Mass., in March, 1874, was also introduced by the state, and this was the cause of much contention, the attorneys for the defense declaring that he had a proper certificate of marriage, but simply a memorandum. Both sets of papers were admitted as evidence.

Mrs. Durphy, on being called to the stand, said she was married to the defendant in Chicago, July, 1887, and moved with him to Portland two years afterward. She was asked by the state's attorney what time she found out that Durphy had a previous wife, and at this point another set of arguments began. Durphy's counsel contended that the complaining witness had proven herself the wife of their client, and therefore was barred against testifying against her husband. Her testimony was admitted, however, and she then stated that she knew nothing of Durphy's former marriage until his grown daughter had appeared upon the scene; that Durphy then confessed that he had a wife living, and that this young woman was hounding him to death, and that he was obliged to give her money to keep her still.

At this point defendant's counsel contended that under the laws of Illinois Durphy had a right to get married again, as he had not seen or heard of his former wife for over five years, and this constituted a legal separation; that Oregon courts must respect the statutes of Illinois, as it is customary in all countries to respect the marriage laws of others.

Mrs. Durphy, the complaining witness, sat composedly on her chair in the witness stand, while the pros and cons were being argued. She spoke in a low tone of voice, when asked a question, which was hardly audible a few feet away. She said that Durphy had contributed nothing to her support for three years prior to her return to her mother, at Chicago, and that she had been obliged to move on account of the nonpayment of rent; that when she applied to her husband for money he told her out \$2 or gave her a letter to a third party for a small loan. Many of these little bills, she said, still remain unpaid. She never had any serious trouble with him, however, until she suspected he was running away with her, and until he began staying out until 2 o'clock in the morning. Then she became angry, and they had a quarrel. This was when they lived on Portland Heights.

Counsel for the defense asked her if she had not brought suit against Durphy in California, and if such suit was not still pending. This question was objected to, but permitted by the Judge. Mrs. Durphy answered she had sued the defendant for \$50,000 damages for treating her as he had, and that the case was still before the courts in California. This was made the basis for an arraignment of Mrs. Durphy for perjury, her husband, by suing him for damages in one state, and at the same time having him tried on a criminal charge in another. Mrs. Drake, a sister of Mrs. Durphy, is in attendance at court with her, and will probably be called upon as a witness for the state. The maiden name of the sisters was Ryan.
