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

ward. I heard him again in Medina, O., and Cleveland was read from manuscript, as he then was Governor of the state and a candidate for the Presidential nomina tion.

As an orator, McKinley, to me, was far more effective than was Bryan, whom I heard at Portland. He has a seriousness and a purpose and a freedom from at-tempt to be smart that Bryan has not. He had a single mannerism, in the putting of his hand in his trousers pocket while getting started in speech. His con-trol of voice was perfect, and he never was hoarse whenever I heard him.

But the most vivid impression I have of McKinley is of being with him and several gentlemen in a hotel parlor in Mendina, O., for 30 minutes. He was run-ning for Congress in a badly gerrymandered district, and he was speaking in the different schoolhouses of our county. It was raining hard and the roads were

so muddy that if they had any bottom it was not found. The Major had on a rubber coat and his trousers were with-in rubber boots. There he was before us, and we let him fire away in conversation. and the more optimistic he became upon his election, the faster he smoked his cigar. McKinley is as fond of his cigars as he is of his hymnal. He smoked there in that room until the air was as blue as

the Gibraltar of Ohlo Democracy, would help him out. Speaking of Speaker Reed, who then was making campaign speeches in our state, and whom he called "Tom," he said that his speeches never made vote, as "Tom" was so repulsive to the opposition. He called President Cleve-land, "Cleveland," and Mr. Blaine, "Blaine," One of our number, with but

"Blaine." One of our number, with but one eye, remarked that Senator Hill re-sembled Senator Carlisle, whereupon the Major graciously shook his head so the others could be corrected in the estimate if such were made by the one-eyed man's remark.
