ST. DAVID'S NEW CHURCH

EAST SIDE EPISCOPALIANS TO FINISH THE EDIFICE.

Enough Money and Pledges to Carry Out the Work This Year—Other East Side News.

The fine stone edifice of the St. David's Episcopal Church, on the corner of East Twelfth and Belmont streets, whose cornerstone was laid in the spring of 1893, will be finished and occupied before the close of the present year. This announcement was made from the pulpit Sunday by Rev. George E. Van Waters, D. D., rector, the 8th anniversary of his rectorship. The encouragement he has received in the way of large subscriptions and cash, together with the promise of the hearty co-operation of the members of the church, its friends and the residents of the community, justified Dr. Van Waters in making this statement from his pulpit. It has been through the enthusiasm and devotion of the members and skilful management that St. David's Church has been able to hold its fine property of one and a half blocks on East Twelfth, between East Morrison and Belmont streets, through the years of financial stress, and to be able now to take steps for the completion of what will be the finest stone church on the East Side and one of the finest in the city.

Over 16 years ago, and before Dr. Van Waters was called to the rectorship, the congregation determined to build a new stone church and rectory and parish house. Elaborate plans were drawn up for this group of buildings, and the half block on East Twelfth street was secured. The old church was moved from East Sixth and East Morrison streets to the ground purchased, and a rectory was first built, and work on the magnificent stone edifice was begun on the corner of East Twelfth and Belmont streets, and the cornerstone was laid by Bishop Wilton B. Morris. The work on the church was prosecuted with vigor, and the walls were carried up about 15 feet when work was forced to cease by reason of the panic which struck the whole country in 1893. Since then the walls have been standing covered with boards all these years, and much as the congregation desired to do so, it seemed impossible to complete the structure; but conditions have changed, and it is to be finished. In his address to his congregation Sunday, Dr. Van Waters spoke of the plans for the future and said that it was intended the church should be finished and ready for occupancy before the close of the year; that a considerable sum had been subscribed, and much of it actually paid into his hands, and that work would be begun at once. The rector has received a large donation from a friend, and with other substantial subscriptions and with promise of more, he felt safe in making the announcement that the building would be finished.

While the original plans will be generally followed as to the finishing, it is not intended to be so elaborate as at first contemplated, so that the cost will be very much lessened. Dr. Van Waters, in speaking of the new church yesterday, said he desired that when occupied it should be free from debt. New life has been infused into this parish, by the possibilities, and the rector himself is determined that the work must be done, and that speedily, and expects the co-operation of all members and friends in this great undertaking.

Hope for Streets.

Those who have been trying to get East Burnside street and Grand avenue improved have taken hope from the decision published in yesterday morning's Oregonian. Charles Wilson, morning's street, interviewed the City Engineer and the Mayor, and they think that work on the improvement of streets may go ahead the same as ever from the first of the month. The petition of East Burnside street provided for the improvement from the Burnside bridge approach to East Fourteenth, and for the improvement of Grand avenue from Belmont to East Burnside street. There was a movement also for rebuilding the elevated roadway on East Washington between East Water street and Union

avenue. In Albina a petition had been signed up for the improvement of Vancouver avenue between Russell and McMillen streets. All these projected improvements were immediately stopped when Judge Bellinger's decision was rendered, but will be taken up if it be settled that the contracts can be made and the assessments collected.

Public Benefactor.
People residing in the vicinity of East Morrison and East Twelfth streets have been considerably worked up over the action of a man living there. He is bent on killing all the cats in the neighborhood, and is making good progress with the felines of his vicinity. He gets the cats somehow into his basement, and then beats them to death with a club or an ax. They are then thrown out on the track of the electric line, to make it appear that the cats had killed them. Tom, the finely educated trick cat, whose picture appears in Woodard, Clark & Co.'s window, was one of his victims. It is known that this man induces the cats to enter his basement and that he kills them. He seems actuated by pure malice.

Woolen Mill Buildings.
The contracts for the erection of the buildings for the woolen mills at Sellwood will be let as soon as the plans and specifications have been prepared. Bids will be asked for once. The main mill building will be 60x200; also a building 50x150 feet for dryhouse, scouring and sorting purposes, and a warehouse 40x50 will be erected. The mill at Dalles will be dismantled, and the machinery shipped to Portland as soon as the buildings are ready. Charles Carter has been selected as superintendent and will enter on his work at once. He has had about 19 years' experience. He will superintend the installation of the machinery and the erection of the buildings.

Raised \$1200 for New Church.
At a congregational meeting of the Mizpah Presbyterian Church, East Thirteenth and Powell streets, held a few evenings ago, \$1200 was raised toward the erection of the proposed new building. This is considered an excellent start, and there is no doubt but the full amount required will be secured. The intention is to build a \$5000 church, and with the help from the general fund raised by the Portland Presbyterians, it will be built this year.

East Side Notes.
The Hassalo-Street Congregational Church at Holladay's addition will celebrate its anniversary this evening with an appropriate programme. The Gilbert Auxiliary No. 1, Spanish-American War Veterans, will give a whist party tonight to veterans and their friends at Central Hall, corner Union avenue and East Morrison.
A deed to the Riley property, purchased by the Odd Fellows' Home trustees, has been secured. The deed will be presented to the grand lodge, which meets at Baker City May 22.

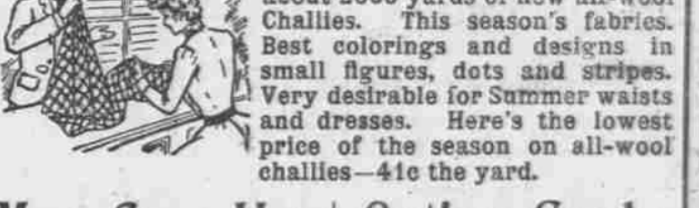

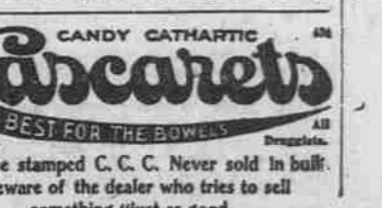
