#### FOR A LARGER BUILDING

Y. M. C. A. DIRECTORS DISCUSS  
NEW PLANS.

Informal Conference Favors the Addition of Another Story and Much Larger Auditorium.

The directors of the Young Men's Christian Association are now engaged in the work of planning the new building for which the successful canvass of funds, recently closed, was made. The total amount raised by the association was \$36,000, \$200 more than the amount originally announced, as additional subscriptions have been received by mail. At an informal conference of the directors, the policy of the association was outlined in a general way. With the money thus raised, the directors propose to enlarge the building to four stories in height, and to incorporate features in the building more ambitious than they had in mind when the canvass was begun. With subscriptions which were being negotiated for before the close of the canvass, and which the directors hope to get, the directors expect in all to raise \$50,000, which will be ample, not only to provide the new improvements, but also to pay off the \$22,000 debt of the association, and thus start the organization in its new building unincumbered by the debt of a single dollar.

When the building project was first outlined, it was the intention to enlarge the frame structure which is occupied as a part of the association building at present. This was abandoned at the instance of the Board of Fire Commissioners. The plan that the directors will now follow is to remove the walls of the frame structure, and to replace them with walls of pressed brick, raising the entire building to a height of four stories. The building will thus present a handsome front of pressed Japanese brick.

constantly for the athletic and gymnastic work. If incorporated in the building, the new auditorium will be in the third story, and occupy two stories space. Another feature that will be added will be separate parlors and reception-rooms for the boys' department. This will solve an important problem of the association, as the interests of the men's and boys' departments are somewhat diverse in character, and by providing comfortable and attractive rooms for the boys' department, the work of each branch of the association will be furthered.

The present gymnasium, which is admirably equipped for its work, will be kept in substantially its present form, with several adjuncts that will increase its scope and efficiency. On the ground floor, where the bowling quarters are located at present, a large new swimming tank will be built. The bowling quarters will be moved to separate quarters in the basement of the fourth story, extending up somewhat higher than the level of the roof, will be erected a new handball court, and adjoining rooms also will be provided for wrestling, boxing and kindred sports.

One of the changes proposed in the new building that will meet the approval of all the members is the rearrangement of the present reception-rooms, parlors and reading-room of the association. Since plenty of space will be available for class and office rooms, the reception hall will be arranged after the fashion of a modern clubhouse, and every effort will be made to have it present a modern and attractive appearance.

In all work of enlarging the association building, said A. M. Simon, one of the directors yesterday, "every effort will be made to avoid incurring a debt. The off the indebtedness of the association and to finish the proposed improvements. The directors, however, do not propose to add a dollar of indebtedness to the association, and if it is found that all the proposed improvements cannot be built, the plans will be curtailed to meet the amount of money available."

#### MONTANA TROUT ARRIVE

BIG SHIPMENT OF GRAYLINGS TO  
EASTERN OREGON.

Western Part of the State to Be  
Stocked With 200,000 Fish  
Next Month.

The Oregon Fish and Game Association is continuing its good work in the line of fish propagation. Last night 100,000 fine trout of the Montana grayling variety were shipped to Eastern Oregon and will be planted under the supervision of the members of the association in that section. They will be planted along the line of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company in Meacham, Bear and Pearson Creeks, in Umatilla County, and in Catherine Creek, near Union. The association will soon have another lot of 200,000 choice trout which will be planted in some of the best trout streams of Western Oregon, some time next month.

Under the new fish law a permit must be obtained from the State Board of Fish Commissioners. Last night 100,000 fine trout of the Montana grayling variety can be planted in any of the waters of this state, and there are a thousand and one details that have to be attended to in order to make a lawful and successful plant.

The Montana grayling is said to be one of the gamiest and most desirable species of trout. They are protected by the law for three years, which will give them ample time to develop and attain a large size. Unlike many other species of trout, they are veritable cannibals and begin to eat each other almost as fast as hatched, when closely confined, which makes it absolutely imperative to plant them soon after they are hatched.

These large shipments to Eastern Oregon are in recognition of the growth of membership and interest manifested by the clubs belonging to the association in that section of the state. The association has more than 100 members at Pendleton and Union.

#### STANFORD'S CAPTAIN HERE

Plenty of Material Available for  
Football Team.

Ralph Fisher, captain of the Stanford University football team for the coming season, arrived in Portland yesterday, after school having closed last week. He had a consultation with George McMillan, who has been chosen one of the coaches of the eleven for next season. The annual intercollegiate game with the University of California will be played on November 20, the annual Thanksgiving game having been abolished by intercollegiate agreement. This will give McMillan a chance to coach at Stanford and return in time to put the finishing touches on the Multnomah team. In case he decides to accept the position offered him in California. At the most, he does not expect to be gone from Portland over a month.

Captain Fisher reports conditions favorable for good material for the university team next season, and several of the men who were seen to good advantage in the game of the second eleven with the Multnomah Club New Year's day are expected to turn out to be promising varsity players.

In the Stanford party that arrived yesterday were W. C. Morrow, who was graduated last season, and E. W. Russ and W. G. Decker, also Stanford students who are making a visit in Portland. The Stanford graduates this year

who hail from Portland were the following: W. C. Morrow, history; Fred H. Drake, law; A. W. Baird, physiology; Miss Mildred Stanford, English. William A. Morris, of Salem, was also a graduate. Morrow and Morris were members of the intercollegiate debating team, and both were prominent students. Morrow was a well known member of Company H, of the Second Oregon.

Progress all along the line was reported by the sub-committees to the meeting of the general committee, Alex Sweek presiding, in room 704 Marquam building, last evening. Another meeting will be held in Elks' Hall at 7 o'clock tonight, at which the final programme will be decided. Captain Riley's plan is for the Elks' division to meet the Norris & Rowe attractions at West Park and Morrison. All the rigs and teams belonging to the circus will be driven by members of the Elks' lodge.
