AGAINST IMPURE SPICES

FOOD COMMISSIONER WILL ENFORCE THE LAW.

Ample Notice Has Been Given to Retailers to Label Goods According to Requirement.

On and after July 1, Food Commissioner Bailey is going to enforce the law in regard to spices, flavoring extracts, cream of tartar and similar food products in the grocery line. Merchants should not forget that they have goods in this line on hand bought some time ago, which may not conform to the requirements of the pure food law. It behooves them to look over their stock carefully and to confer with the jobbers and manufacturers from whom they bought these goods and ascertain what steps they must take in order to avoid the penalty which might be imposed on them for selling these goods. Manufacturers in spice and coffee lines are prepared to furnish their customers with stickers to attach to the labels of such goods as are not pure or for some other reason will not comply with the pure food law.

It is useless for a dealer to attempt to evade the law by attaching an impurity notice on the back of the package. Such notices must be on the face of the label and in as large type as the prominent part of the label.

Manufacturers and jobbers are in no way responsible for goods sold to retail dealers previous to the enforcement of the law. Retailers have been allowed several months in which to get their stocks fixed up in preparation for the law being enforced, and if they are not ready in time the fault will be their own.

In ordering goods from this time on, dealers should be careful to state in their orders that the manufacturer or jobber is requested to see that the goods ordered are properly marked. The safest and best course to pursue in this matter is to state in order that the goods must be absolutely pure.
