SENDING TO PORTLAND FOR LABORERS—A number of laboring men are being sent from Portland to Los Angeles to work on the tunnels being bored by the Southern Pacific in the San Fernando Range. Fred E. Erickson, a railroad contractor engaged in the work near Chatwood, is in the city to engage men, and says the work will last two years, as there are four tunnels to dig, one of which is a mile and a half long. He gives a glowing account of the condition of California, and says this is the best year the state has known for a long time. The wheat crop is good, and all the loose men are being absorbed in its harvest, so that is the reason he has to come to Portland for help. There are now about 300 men employed in the tunnels, and he needs several hundred more.
