

DEEDS OF THE OFFICERS

MAN WHO IS ALLEGED TO HAVE STABBED ANOTHER.

Was Fortified in a Log Cabin—Passe Leaves for Scene to Take Accused.

CANYONVILLE, Or., June 14.—On the night of June 12, one Lewis stabbed a man named Horn, 14 miles east of Canyonville, at the residence of Mr. McKay, where a wedding and dance were in progress. Horn was cut on the right side, the knife penetrating the abdominal cavity. The wound will probably prove fatal. Constable Smith and one assistant went to the scene of the trouble, and found Lewis and son fortified in a log cabin. They notified the officers to go away and so quickly, remarking that they would not be taken, so the officer and deputy returned without Lewis, whereupon the constable secured a posse of four or five men armed with Winchester and left this evening to take the men or have a battle.

JURY DISAGREED.

Considered a Criminal Assault Case for Seventeen Hours.

SALEM, Or., June 14.—After being out 17 hours, the jury in the case of the State against A. T. Zumbult disagreed and was discharged. Zumbult was tried again on October 10. The charge against him was that he committed a criminal assault upon his 15-year-old daughter. The testimony of the witnesses for the state was direct, positive and in itself unshaken so that, if it were believed at all, a conviction must result. The defense alleged that the whole matter was a concocted scheme for revenge and the testimony was fabricated. If the jury believed the defense, therefore, the testimony for the prosecution must fall in its entirety. The jury believed the testimony for the state, and half believed that the whole case was a fabrication. There being no doubt in the minds of the jurors on either side, there could be no compromise, and the 12 gentlemen informed the court that they could not hope to agree.

Trial Jurors Discharged.

The trial jurors were discharged this morning, and the case will be tried again before the term of court remains to be disposed of. Judge Hamilton returned to his home in Roseburg this morning, and Judge Barrett took his own place on the circuit bench in his own place.

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ITS CREATION IS ILLEGAL

DECISION ON NEW COUNTY OF CLEARWATER, IDAHO.

Supreme Court Holds That Necessary Language Is Not in Bill Passed by Last Legislature.

BOISE, Idaho, June 14.—The Supreme Court has handed down an opinion declaring the creation of the County of Clearwater illegal. The act creating this county was passed by the Legislature last winter. Today's decision is based on the omission of language specifically declaring that the territory named shall constitute a new county.

Mineral Output of Idaho.

BOISE, Idaho, June 14.—The report of the United States Assay Office here on the mineral output of this state for 1900 has just been issued. It shows a greater increase over the previous year than had generally been supposed, amounting to over 50 per cent. The totals are: Gold, \$1,238,087; silver, \$5,883,329; lead, \$1,008,274; total, \$8,129,690. For 1899, the figures were: Gold, \$1,219,718; silver, \$5,233,418; lead, \$1,713,024; total, \$8,166,160. Increase of 1900 over 1899, \$4,129,084.

Guilty of Manslaughter.

BOISE, Idaho, June 14.—At Idaho City tonight a jury found George Eden guilty of manslaughter for the killing of L. W. Crake at Pearl, May 10. Eden was a horseherd and Crake a farmer. Eden drove his sheep on Crake's claim, and the latter assaulted him, according to the testimony, whereupon Eden shot him. Crake was formerly a partner of H. H. Henry, the miner.

NO MORE ROOM FOR WOOL.

Pendleton Has 4,200,000 Pounds—Growers Continue to Sell.

PENDLETON, Or., June 14.—Pendleton has in warehouses 5,231,412 pounds of wool, which places Pendleton second as a primary wool market of the United States. The wool is being sold at a price of 10 cents per pound. The wool clip has been received, and the total for the season will be about 5,000,000 pounds, according to the best posted men in the business.

At the Pendleton Wool Scouring Mills warehouse there is 1,347,312 pounds of wool, not counting 20 cars standing on the sidetracks and waiting room in the crowded yards. At the J. W. J. Furnish warehouse, there is 1,750,000 pounds, with several cars standing on the tracks. At the Independent warehouse there are 1400 bales, or 33,000 pounds. These three houses contain a total of 4,231,412 pounds. Besides the wool in cars on the tracks.

Of the total to be handled at this point this season, about 3,500,000 will be secured. That many pounds of grease wool will leave about 600,000 pounds of washed wool, inasmuch as about 75 per cent of the grease stuff is washed away in grease and dirt. In other words, of the 5,000,000 pounds of grease wool, passing into the vats, about 2,000,000 pounds will be washed off, and the remainder shipped to the East, or manufactured into blankets or robes here in Pendleton.

WHEAT MOST DAMAGED.

Effects of Late Severe Frost on Grand Ronde Valley Crops.

THE GRAND RONDE VALLEY, June 14.—The damage to Fall wheat in the Grand Ronde Valley as a result of the freeze 10 days ago remains in doubt. It is safe to say, however, that wheat suffered more than any other crop. Some farmers believe that they will lose all their Fall wheat, while others in the same neighborhood maintain that the grain, though damaged, will redeem itself. Of the 1,500,000 bushels of wheat raised in the Grand Ronde Valley, perhaps not over half is Fall-sown. Since the frost belt did not include all parts of the valley, and since much of the Fall-sown wheat is in the hands of the farmers, injured, the loss will have no great commercial significance.

Rain Benefited Wheat.

ALBANY, Or., June 14.—Reports from different parts of the county since the recent rains indicate that the Spring wheat was benefited, and that no damage was done to most of the Fall wheat, though some was injured in special cases. The fruit outlook is the best for several years.
