ROAD BOUNDARIES NOT ADJUSTED.—The matter of definitely locating the boundaries of the county road extending from the O. R. & N. Co. to the company's property was to have been arranged Saturday by the attorneys of the Northern Pacific Railway Company and the O. R. & N.
