AMATEUR CHAMPION, MAX WILEY, WILL MEET ED JOHNSON.

PLANS TO ANNOUNCE DEATH OF EMPEROR OF CHINA.

Prince Tuan's Son Would Then Succeed to Throne—New Capital Planned for Scheme.

LONDON, June 17.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Globe, telegraphing under today's date, says he learns in Chinese quarters that the Empress Dowager proposes, when the court reaches Peking, to announce that the Emperor has been killed by brigands, and that Prince Tuan's son would then succeed to the throne.

DE WITTE TALKS OF ACTION TO WARDS RUSSIAN SUGAR.

Contents Home System Is Not a Bounty—Relations With America Not Satisfactory.

NEW YORK, June 17.—M. de Witte, the Russian Minister of Finance, is quoted at length in a Herald special from St. Petersburg. He is made to say regarding the sugar question:

"It seems to me that the step taken by the United States cannot be characterized otherwise than as an action taken without knowledge of Russian law. By the law here the production of sugar is controlled, and the amount produced for home consumption is limited. Our object is to prevent a sudden rise in prices. But we must not keep up prices. We insist on a reserve in order to prevent prices rising unduly and to check speculation.

SECRETARY GAGE TALKS. Russian Treatment of Sugar Exports Does Constitute a Bounty. NEW YORK, June 17.—The interview credited to M. de Witte, the Russian Minister of Finance, dealing with the sugar question is commented upon as follows by Secretary Gage in a Washington special to the Herald:

It is not contended that the remission of the internal taxes by the Russian Government constitutes the granting of a bounty on Russian exports of sugar. The Russian home market for sugar is regulated by the Government, which fixes the price by limiting the amount of sugar that can be imported.

Emperor Will Meet Troops. LONDON, June 17.—The correspondent of the Daily Press at Cherborg learns that Emperor William intends to meet the returning German troops from China with a naval squadron, which will be joined at Cherborg by President Loubet and a French squadron.

Emperor Is Displeased. Von Bulow's Remarks at Unveiling of Bismarck Memorial the Cause. BERLIN, June 17.—The German papers tonight are filled with accounts and comment on the unveiling of the Bismarck memorial, which occurred yesterday. Generally speaking, the Liberal press heartily praises Count von Bulow's speech, while the conservative newspapers, with few exceptions, make a bad thing worse.

Mad Mullah Expedition Cut Off From Base by British. LONDON, June 17.—A dispatch to the Foreign office from the Consul-General of Somaliland says that the Mad Mullah expedition of mounted infantry, under Captain Meriwether, struck the Mullah's supply camp during a night march and captured a herd of cattle, killed one important chief and captured another.

Joint Dedication of Monuments. BERLIN, June 17.—A remarkable ceremony occurred at Hachenburg, Prussia, yesterday when the military attaché of the French and Austrian embassies in Berlin, together with 65 German veteran associations, jointly celebrated the dedication of two monuments, one erected by the French and Austrian empires in honor of those Austrians who fell in 1796, during the war with France, and the other to the French General Marceau, who was mortally wounded at Altenkirchen, Rhenish Prussia, September 30, 1796, and died three days after. At the dedication of the monuments the bands played the "Marseillaise" and the Prussian hymn. A French attaché presented three cheers for Emperor William, and an Austrian attaché expressed his confidence in the durability of the friendship between the two nations.

American Will Probably Come Clear. LONDON, June 17.—Charles Lilly White, who says he is a naturalized American, and who says he had been in the United States since 1885, but who was arrested in New Zealand in November last and brought to this country and charged with the murder of Arthur Birch, who is accused of murder, robbery and arson, committed at Colchester, England, in 1885, had his first hearing today in camera, to the disgust of a number of curious people who crowded the courtroom. The discovery of relatives the prisoner claims to have in Leeds presages a break-down of the government's case.

Serious Uprising in Serbia. BELGRADE, Serbia, June 17.—A serious uprising is reported to have occurred in the Turkish town of Novi-Basar. A thousand Albanians rebelled at the appointment of an unpopular Lieutenant-Governor and compelled him to flee. The Serbians then turned their attention to the Russian population. All the shops of Novi-Basar were closed, and the houses were barricaded when the above affairs were forwarded here.
