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MORE RETALIATION

Russia Raises Tariff on Im-
ports From America.

RESIN AND BICYCLES AFFECTED

This is in Return for the Discrim-
inating Duty Placed by United
States Upon Russian Pe-
troleum.WASHINGTON, June 18.—The Russian
Ambassador, Count Cassini, has communi-
cated to the State Department that in
consequence of the action of the Ameri-
can Government, through a Treasury order
of March 9, last, applying tariff re-
strictions against Russian petroleum im-
ported into the country, the Russian Min-
ister of Finance, M. de Witte, has issued
an order dated June 7, imposing the high
tariff rate of the Russian schedule on
American white resin, under article 82,
and increasing the rate on American bicycles under article
172 of the Russian laws.

This action is entirely apart from that

channel of relief remains open for the

The executive branch, looking to the dis-

NEW YORK, June 18.—According to a
Washington dispatch to the Journal of
Commerce, the recent action of the Rus-

of State. The levy of the special duty
seems to be a part of a policy of retali-
ation adopted by the Russian Govern-
ment because of the decision of the
Treasury Department that a countervailing
duty was levied under this country's
law upon Russian sugar. The action taken
in regard to bicycles, however, is as-
cribed to the fact that Russian petroleum
is subject to duty on entry into the United
States, the right of the Russian Govern-
ment to impose the maximum tariff
when it is imposed upon imports from cer-
tain other countries will probably not be
separated by the State Department, but it
is the duty on bicycles is aimed at the
States alone, it will properly be the sub-
ject of representation by Secretary Hay
against its continuance.

ITALIAN BEET SUGAR.

Treasury Department Imposes a
Countervailing Duty Upon It.WASHINGTON, June 18.—The Secretary
of the Treasury has issued to customs
officials a circular imposing a countervailing
duty on beet sugar imported from or
the product of Italy. It is stated that the
Treasury Department has been informed
that Italy has produced only sufficient sugar
for home consumption, but that latterly
there had been a surplus, and that this
surplus is now being sold. Up to this
time, there have been practically no sugar
exports to the United States. The circular
is as follows:"In view of the information thus far re-
ceived as to the operations of the
of Italy, now in force, concerning the
excise on sugar, it appears highly probable
that sugars produced in that country re-
ceive indirect export bounties as follows:
Sugar below No. 20, Dutch standard, 5.50
francs per 100 kilograms; sugar No. 20,
Dutch standard, and above, 6.13 francs per
100 kilograms. Pending further investi-
gation of the matter, the liquidation of all
sugars imported from or produced in
Italy shall be suspended and the duties
shall be estimated in amounts sufficient to
cover additional duties equal to the above
specified bounties."Official information has reached this
Government that under the recent classi-
fication of the higher rate of duty. This
information is to be regarded as indis-
criminate of art and trade, instead of agri-
cultural machines, and that the change
over to a higher rate of duty. This
Government is likely to make a protest
against this action.

THE CABINET MEETING.

Discussed China Settlement and In-
sular Matters.WASHINGTON, June 18.—The Cabinet
meeting today was without important
business. There was desultory discussion
of the Chinese settlement and the situation
of the Philippines, Cuba and Porto Rico,
but nothing of moment developed and no
action was decided upon. The President
has been informed that the Chinese
settlement is now in the hands of the
insular Legislature, at the extraordinary
session called for June 4, and that the
facts to him to sustain the claim that the

make the island self-sustaining.The Cabinet believes that the Chinese
settlement is close at hand. In talking
of this settlement, Secretary Hay suggested

ment of the Cabinet seemed to favor this
course, but no action was taken.Secretary Hitchcock reported that a de-

homa probably would be rendered in a
few days. Until the court acts nothing
further will be done.Secretary Root laid before the Cabinet
reports from Governor-General Wood
showing a most satisfactory condition of
affairs in the island. These reports main-
ly to the progress that has been made in
the matters of municipal government, es-
tablishing schools, general improvements,
sanitation and the bettering of the condi-
tion of the inhabitants of the island.

PORTO RICO IS SELF-SUPPORTING.

Insular Taxation Provides Sufficient
Revenue.SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, June 18.—After
a careful study of the report submitted
by J. H. Hollander, Governor Allen is
satisfied that the present system of insular
taxation produces sufficient revenue for
the needs of the island, and that conse-
quently the island maintains itself without the
use of customs duties on trade with the United
States. Governor Allen has decided to
call the Porto Rican Assembly in extra
session July 4 for the sole purpose of
passing a resolution to this effect, and ac-
cording to section 3 of the Foraker law.
It is announced that the present supply
of sugar probably will be held here until
free trade with the United States is in
effect.

Loomis Pleaded With the Change.

PARIS, June 18.—Francis J. Loomis, un-
til recently United States Minister to
Venezuela, in an interview today with the
correspondent of the Associated Press, said
he was very much pleased with his ap-
pointment as Minister to the post at
Lisbon. His health has suffered by his
stay in Venezuela, and he considered his
transfer to a European Legation not merely
an agreeable change, but a promo-
tion. Mr. Loomis does not, however, con-
sider the renewal of the Venezuelan trou-
ble. On the contrary, he looks forward
to an era of the most friendly relations
between the two countries and that conse-
quently he will take a trip to Switzerland and then he
will probably return to America before
taking up his post.

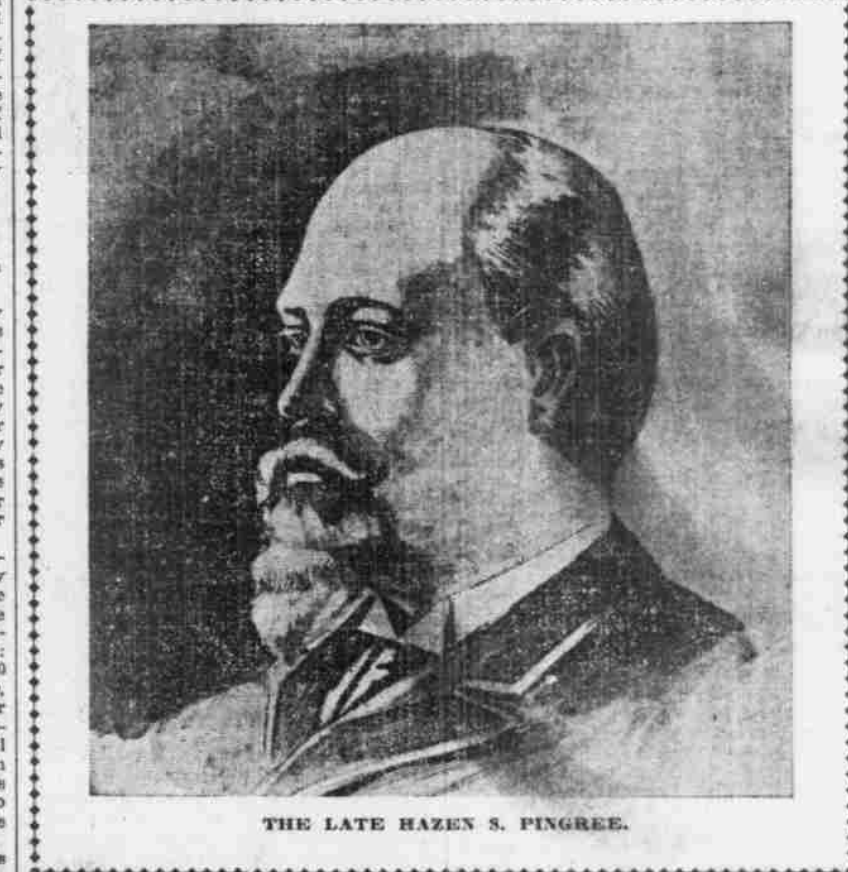
Treaties With Southern Republics.

DEATH OF PINGREE

Ex-Governor of Michigan
Passed Away Last Night.

HIS SON WAS AT HIS BEDSIDE

Diagnosis Made by London Special-
ists Left No Hope for His Recov-
ery—Remains Will Be Sent
to Detroit.LONDON, June 18.—Ex-Governor Hazen
S. Pingree, of Michigan, died here to-
night at 11:35. His son was the only one
present at his bedside. The attending doc-
tors left Mr. Pingree's bedside about

THE LATE HAZEN S. PINGREE.

His promise to remain shortly. H. S.
Pingree, 72, who had been watching at
his father's side for many days, and who
had removed his clothes during the
night, noted a sudden change in his
father's condition. He had hardly reached
the patient's bedside when his father died
peacefully without warning and without
realizing how close death was to him.Young Pingree has wired to his mother
and his uncle in the United States not
to come to London. The body of the late
Pingree will be embalmed and taken
to his home.The diagnosis made by London special-
ists of the cancerous affection of the in-
testine, from which Mr. Pingree suffered,
left no hope for the patient's recovery.
Toward the end of his illness, Mr. Pin-
gree suffered great pain, and weakened
rapidly. He was unable to retain nourish-
ment, and his mind, however, remained
fairly clear. During the whole of Tues-
day he was practically kept alive by in-
jections of strychnine and drugs administered
to lessen his pain.Hazen Senter Pingree was born at
Denmark, Me., in 1840. In 1862 he enlisted
in the First Massachusetts Heavy Artillery
and served until 1864, when he was elected
over 200 majority. He was re-elected in
1881, 1883 and 1885 by increased majorities
each time. In 1894 Mr. Pingree was
elected Governor of Michigan by 82,000
majority, running ahead of the National ticket
by 25,000 votes. He was re-elected Gov-
ernor in 1898 by about 100,000 plurality and
served out his term, which expired in
1900. Last March he started on a trip
to South Africa, which resulted in his
death in London. Ex-Governor Pingree,
while he was Mayor, accomplished many
municipal reforms, among others forcing
the gas company to lower rates 50 cents
per 1000; establishing public lighting
plants; organizing the Detroit street rail-
way on a 2-cent fare basis; lowering tele-
phone rates and breaking up a number
of sewer and paving rings that were
thriving when he came into office. His
potato-patch scheme for the relief of the
poor of the city was extensively copied
and brought him much fame. While Gov-
ernor, Mr. Pingree devoted his energies
toward securing a law taxing railroads
and other corporations property on an ad-
valorem basis, instead of specifically on
the passage of a law along these lines
by the last Legislature. Mr. Pingree is
survived by a widow and two children,
a son and a daughter.

UNITED VERDE STOCK.

Professor Treadwell Sues Clark and
Associates to Recover It.NEW YORK, June 18.—An action
brought by Professor George A. Tread-
well against Senator William A. Clark, of
Montana; the United Verde Copper Com-
pany, of which Clark is the president;
the directors of the corporation and other
defendants, to recover 300 shares of stock
in the United Verde Copper Company,
was brought to trial today before Justice
McLean in the Supreme Court. The action
is the outcome of another action of
Professor Treadwell against the United
Verde Copper Company, in which he
asked that Senator Clark and others be
restrained from transferring the stock of
the corporation and from proceeding with
their plan of reorganization.
The defendants named in the present
suit are William A. Clark, individually,
the United Verde Copper Company and
William A. Clark, Charles W. Clark,James A. MacDonald, Henry C. Atwater,
James Kitchen, Lindsay Watson, as
directors of the company, and Charles E.
Thomas, John Dewitt Burgess and E.
Bennett, a tea and coffee dealer of Lon-
don, England. The plaintiff claims that he
deposited the stock as security with Ben-
nett and his manager, Thomas, and that
subsequently, without any authority from
Treadwell, the stock was sold to Burgess,
who in turn sold it to Senator Clark, and
the allegation is made that the Senator
was aware of the facts in the case. The
professor alleges that the par value of
the stock was \$10 a share, but that it has
recently brought \$30 a share, and he asks
that Mr. Clark, who is president of the
corporation, be compelled to render an ac-
counting.
The answer of the United Verde Com-
pany and its directors claims that Professor
Treadwell absolutely transferred the stock
to Thomas and that it reached Clark
legally. As a further defense, it is al-
leged that the plaintiff is barred by the
statute of limitation. Professor Tread-
well was on the stand today.

BAD FIRE AT NOME

The Total Losses Are Placed
at \$126,650.

BLOW WILL BE ONLY TEMPORARY

Fire Department Experienced Great
Difficulty in Fighting the Flames,
Owing to the Hose Being
Filled With Ice.PORT TOWNSEND, June 18.—The
steamer Nome City, the first of the Nome
fleet, arrived this evening, direct from
Cape Nome, having sailed for Puget
Sound June 8.Nome was subjected to a most disas-
trous fire May 25. The blaze started in a
building at the corner of Steadman avenue
and First street, and soon leaped across
to the old Court building. Later the
Washington Trading Company's building
and the Smiley-Campbell building both
caught. The fire department experienced
great difficulty in fighting the flames, owing
to the hose being filled with ice. The
crowds added materially in preventing the
spread of the fire to other buildings, the
flames being extinguished as the buildings
on fire were consumed. Judge T. P.
Ryan and his wife barely escaped with
their lives, losing all they possessed in
the way of furniture and clothing. The
total losses are placed at \$126,650. Busi-
ness has been resumed, and the effects
of the fire are not expected to result in
more than a temporary blow to the prop-
erty of the town.The Nome City managed to find an
open channel in the ice a considerable
distance west of the usual course
taken by vessels sailing for that
place, and succeeded in getting within a
few miles of Nome. She discharged her
cargo on the ice, and also landed her
passengers. Just as everything was safely
taken to the shore, the ice broke, and
the steamer had a hard time in working
her way back to the open sea. Before
the ice broke, however, 10 passengers, six
women and four men, succeeded in board-
ing her.The steam schooner Jennie was the first
vessel to reach Nome this year, as well
as last season. She had landed her
freight and passengers before the Nome
City arrived. Although she started on her
return voyage three days ahead of the
Nome City, she is still on the way down.
The captain of the Nome City says it was
a streak of good luck that his vessel and
the Jennie got in when they did, and ex-
presses his opinion that no other vessel
will reach Nome before the latter part
of this month, as the ice had broken in
many places and was rapidly closing in
on the open channel. He had a harder
time getting out than he had to go in.
His vessel bears evidence of this fact,
as her sides are scraped and splintered
from contact with ice.Passengers report that Nome during the
Winter was little more than a collection
of huts. There was little sickness, and the
weather was good, with the exception of one
or two severe storms. The Nome City
remained here just long enough to pass
United States quarantine inspection, and
then proceeded up Puget Sound.

DARING JAIL DELIVERY.

Seven Hardened Criminals Escape in
Alaska—Three Recaptured.NOME CITY, June 8, via Seattle, June
18.—One of the most daring and suc-
cessful jail deliveries that has taken place in
Alaska occurred May 20. Seven of the
most hardened criminals in the Federal
jail escaped, and at last advice four were
still at large. Those who got away were
named Bowers, Davis, Miller and Landes,
while Smith, Libby and May were recaptured.
In the capture, May was shot
through the head and jaw, and is in a
prison.The escape was effected by cutting
through the roofs of the cells, and after-
ward cutting through the corrugated iron
roof of the jail. As soon as the prisoners
were missed a detachment of soldiers was
sent from Fort Davis. Every one leaving
town was questioned, and "doggers" ad-
vertising the escape were freely circulated.
Libby was first captured by a hunting party
Smith and May were found making their
way over the ridge, and were called on to
surrender. The former did so, but May
made a break for liberty and was shot
and brought down. Neighboring towns
and camps have been advised of the
escape of the remaining four, and their cap-
ture is thought to be a matter of but a
short time.

NOME IS A WINTER CAMP.

The results of the Winter's work prove
emphatically that Nome is a winter camp.
Within a radius of eight miles about the
city dumps have been piled up, which, on
conservative estimates, will yield \$300,000,
and the in spite of the lack of proper
appliances and the high price of fuel, with
an ample coal supply at reasonable prices
for thawing, Winter work can be pro-
ceeded on a large scale.From Cape Nome the Topokuk
came the best of reports. It is said that
gold has been taken out during the Win-
ter to the value of \$200,000. The Topokuk
beach continues to yield good pay. Con-
siderable dust is being taken out right
along. The bankers and commercial agents
of the city have received over \$100,000 in
Winter dust and nuggets.All reports received at Nome during
the Winter tend to establish the reports
of immense richness in the Bluestone and
Kougakou country, and excellent reports
come from the farther northern Arctic
districts.

Tornado in Ohio.

DELAWARE, O., June 18.—A tornado
swept over a large area of territory in

1800 feet wide and about six miles long.
