These differ are not to represent the actual differences in the usual selling price of the various grades. They are, in fact, to represent grades lower than the present contract grade. In this way, it is argued, the legitimate buyer, instead of being a sufferer under the proposed conditions,

It is a system whereby they can, without doiny, secure themselves against sections loss as soon as an order is taken, or as soon as grain is purchased which is still in the interior and must be transported to a seaport for shipment abroad.

Perhaps 15 per cent of the grain they purchase or sell, and against which they desire to "hedge," is off graite, but the only way in which they may protect themselves is to buy and sell contract grades, which, so far as New York is concerned, is fortified by about 314,000 bushels, representing the total of the stock of contract grades of wheat; 246,185 bushels, representing oats. In view of these figures, representing oats. In view of these figures, the stability of the market to be cornered is apparent. The system proposed is that wheat and osts, and, with the exception of the hot-weather months, corn also, shall be sold on a standard basis, and that all legitimate grades below that basis shall be deliverable on payment of the differences in price. This is almost identically the system pursued on the cotton exchange, where contracts are based upon the price of middling and sellers may deliver above or below middling at prices arranged periodically by a committee on recisions. ically by a committee on revisions. The object of the proposed change is, of course, to increase the business of the exchange by rendering it safer to trade in grain. In other words, traders may know that manipulation is not the controlling influence.
