Amusements Tonight.

CORDEY'S THEATRE—Cummings Stock Company in "A Lady of Quality."

NO LARSEN COMMITTED—The charge of the larceny of a Yorkshire terrier against George Kalser on the complaint of Julius Severe was dismissed in the Municipal Court yesterday, on the ground that the evidence produced so far did not show that larceny had been committed.

SMALLPOX CASE—The first case of smallpox reported in the city for two weeks was brought to the notice of the Health Commissioner yesterday. The patient is Mrs. A. Shockley, 25 Seventh street, Mr. Shockley, while in the country buying stock, a short time ago, contracted the disease, and Mrs. Shockley has taken it from him. The case is mild one. There are only two patients in the smallpox hospital—Mr. Wilcock, from Halley, Idaho, and a boy named Lensen, from the East Side. They are convalescent, and as no more cases had been reported for two weeks, it was hoped that the disease had been stamped out here. It still lingers in many parts of the country, and doubtless cases will turn up here occasionally for some time to come.

BACK TO PRISON—Thomas Jones, a deserter on board a river steamer, left last night for Iowa's penitentiary at Fort Madison, under arrest, charged with breaking the parole he gave the Governor of the state. Detective E. P. Patterson had the prisoner in charge. Jones, a little over two years ago, was sentenced to four years' imprisonment at Fort Madison, for robbery, and he was recently released on parole to serve, on parole, and on the condition that he remained in Iowa and reported to the Sheriff of the county once every month. Instead, Jones left Iowa for Nampa Junction, Idaho, and afterward secured work in this city. Word of his departure from Iowa was telegraphed to the Portland police authorities, and his arrest by Detectives Day and Welner followed.

FOGOT WITH HIS MOUTH—A deckhand who gave his name as "Doc Day" was arrested yesterday by Detective Cordano on board a river steamer at Washington-street wharf, charged with peddling goods on sidewalks without a license. He was also a violinist of more than ordinary talent, and his many friends consider that he would have become famous in this line, but for his untimely taking off. His illness was consumption, with which he had been struggling for nearly a year. Mr. Phillips was married, but leaves no children. His funeral will take place this morning from Trinity Church.

REMOVING STAINS IN CITY HALL—The board of Public Works is considering the matter of having the walls and cornices of the City Hall, which have been stained black in places, cleaned and restored to their original color. The flat roof of the building has become an eyesore, and in some places it will probably be difficult to remove the discoloration.

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS—The United States Civil Service Commission has announced for July 23 examinations for the following positions: one clerk in this city; for the positions of carpenter and farmer in the Indian service; aid in the Coast and Geodetic Service; electrician in the customs service; and a copper-plate map engraver. From the examinations, resulting from these examinations, certification will be made to fill existing vacancies at salaries from \$600 to \$1200 per annum. Persons desiring to compete should at once apply to the Commission, Washington, D. C., for application blanks.

SPECIAL SCORCHER CHARGED—Frank Jackson, a boy, was before the Municipal Court yesterday, charged with riding a bicycle on the sidewalk last Monday at Front and Market streets. Jackson pleaded that he was riding on the sidewalk for a short distance, in order to get to the fire more quickly, when a policeman looked up. It's the old story. NEW BUSINESS BUILDING—A permit was taken out yesterday through the Merchants' National Bank, for the erection of a three-story brick building at the southeast corner of Stark and Sixth streets. The bank acts in this matter for the owners of the property. The lower story of the building will be occupied by a saloon, and the upper stories as an apartment house. The estimated cost of the building is \$25,000, and it will probably run up to \$30,000.

MISS CUMMING'S CONCERT

AN ARDUOUS PROGRAMME SUCCESSFULLY CARRIED OUT.

Marquand Audience Forthrightly Impressed—Improvement Since Her Last Appearance Here.

Shannah Cumming's radiant personality, together with the remarkable range and intensity of her emotional utterance, have never before been impressed so forcibly upon a Portland audience, as at last night's concert given at the Marquand by the Musical Club. Her powers, both vocally and temperamentally, have developed in a very remarkable degree since she last visited Portland. Her art has broadened and deepened, and she has acquired more dramatic passion, and allows her impetuous grace of temperament and native valiant free play. She is now in the full flower of her womanhood, as beautifully to the eye as satisfying to the ear. Vocally she has an exceptional range of voice of winsome sweetness and with no signs of roughness at the points of division between registers. It is a voice that responds with much sensitiveness to the demands made upon it.

The programme was an arduous one, such as would severely tax the powers of one who had less splendid vigor than Shannah Cumming; yet her voice lost nothing of its freshness in the closing number, "War Ich Nicht Ein Halm," was one of the most complex and interesting compositions on the programme. This headed a group of notably strong German songs that embraced such names as Brahms and Franck. The song from Goethe's "Faust," "Hawatha" was somewhat disappointing to those who were expecting a fuller measure of originality and power from the young negro composer, but the setting of Longfellow's Indian poem has attracted so much attention from Eastern critics.

Mr. Courten acquitted himself with honor in an accompaniment of sympathetic flow and delicate feeling, notwithstanding the difficulty of his task; for it is not easy to play for one who sings with so much abandon. It is a cross between the Magoon and the Timbrel. It is more round than the Magoon, and of a deep red color. In fact it is not quite so large as the Magoon. The berry is sweet and quite solid. The seeds, which are bright yellow in the ripe fruit, are nearly absent. The vine is very hardy, has dark leaves, and is not quite so large as that of the Magoon. Mr. Magoon started the new variety two years ago.

AN OBJECT OF ADMIRATION—The beautifully decorated ceiling in the store room of Messrs. Woodard, Clarke & Co., is attracting much attention, and is deserving of notice, marking as it does a radical departure from the ideas embodied in paper and kalsomine. A delicate tint of green forms the body color with border tracings of raised work, each corner bearing a fleur-de-lis. The design is "Wood-lark," upon the monogram, "W. C. & Co." The harmonious blending of gold and green form a pleasing contrast with the rich blue of the ceiling, and the furniture and fittings are constructed to harmonize with the color scheme.

LEG AMPUTATED—As a result of a recent runaway accident, it was necessary yesterday to amputate one of T. O. Barker's legs. The operation was performed in the Salem Hospital. About a week ago, while Mr. Barker was on an outing with Eugene Breyman and his wife, the horses of the carriage ran away near McHanna, and the three people were thrown out. One of Mr. Barker's legs was fractured, but Mr. and Mrs. Breyman escaped with severe bruises. Mr. Barker's brother and sister left yesterday afternoon for Salem.

RENEWED IT JUST IN TIME—Dr. James Surman, whose loss by the fire yesterday morning was some \$25,000, would have lost \$10,000 more had he not had a policy of insurance renewed the day before. He had been insuring with Russell & Blyth for a number of years, and when he went to them on Monday to renew the policy he asked for a reduction in the rate as he had been paying what he said was a rather stiff rate for so many years. His request was not granted, but he renewed the policy, and the next morning he was glad he did so.
