SECURED PORTLAND MAN FOR CARRIERS.
—Hon. I. W. Hope, of Hope Bros., the mercantile firm, of Vale, Malheur county, has been in Portland for a few days, and left for home last night. Mr. Hope's visit here for the object of securing a Portland man for a fiduciary position in his growing town. For a dozen years Vale has been the banking with Baker City, Caldwell and Boise, and the distance has been so great an annoyance that the business men and a number of stockmen have decided to have a bank of their own. Mr. Hope has secured Arthur O. Jones, one of the receiving tellers of the First National, for cashier. Mr. Jones is a young man who has grown up in the First National Bank in the course of 11 years, going in a boy and going out as the first of August to be cashier of the strongest bank of Oregon, and a deposit. The training he received in the First National assures the patrons and owners of the new bank that its business will be conducted along lines of progress and surety.

SELLWOOD SUB-STATION ESTABLISHED.
The postoffice at Sellwood passed out of existence yesterday and Sellwood will hereafter be a station of the Portland postoffice under the title of Sellwood Station, in charge of A. R. Hemstock. The citizens of Sellwood were delighted with having free delivery of mail, which will be made by C. T. Steinfeld, mounted carrier. He put in the day yesterday going over the district to familiarize himself with it, and will begin delivering mail today. It will be necessary that numbers on the houses shall be made conspicuous. There is some confusion in the streets of Sellwood, which the Sellwood Sub-Station has tried to remedy. The territory is a large one and the carrier will have all he can do to make one delivery a day to start with.

NEW SURVEYOR-GENERAL TAKES CHARGE.—Henry Meldrum, who was appointed Surveyor-General of Oregon several weeks ago, but who has delayed assuming his duties until the end of the fiscal year, took charge of the office yesterday. He says there will be no change in the force, as they are all good people, and added, "Some of them are Democrats, but that is their misfortune, not my fault." Mr. Meldrum has been engaged in surveying for a long time, having taken his first contract from the Government 25 years ago. His father was a pioneer of 1842, and he was born in what is now the State of Washington when it was a part of the Territory of Oregon, in 1852. He has been a resident of Oregon City most of his life.

SCARRED BY THE NEEDLE.—Harry Dornier, a bar-room assistant, was found dead yesterday at Alder street, where he was employed. He had gone into an office near the saloon bar, to rest, as he said he was tired. Shortly afterward he was found dead, slumped over a chair. The coroner was notified, and from the evidence at the inquest, it appeared that Dornier was addicted to the morphine habit. The autopsy showed that the man's body was seared all over with marks left by the use of the hypodermic syringe, and the jury's verdict was that Dornier had died from paralysis of the heart, caused by an overdose of morphine. At one time, Dornier owned a share in a saloon on Second street.

STRONG DEATH.—Mrs. Anna M. Marshall, mother of John P. Marshall, treasurer of the Portland baseball team, dropped dead yesterday near her home, 73 Ella street. She was about 73 years old, and had enjoyed exceptional good health. Yesterday morning, she had breakfast in bed, as was her custom, and shortly afterward she walked out of her home to call on a friend, and was last seen alive. The coroner was called, and he decided that Mrs. Marshall died from heart failure. Mrs. Marshall was the widow of Captain Marshall, an officer who served with distinction in the Civil War. She is survived by her two sons, John P. Marshall and J. H. Marshall, who is at present in New York.

WERE WALKING ARSENALS.—Two Vancouver youths, H. O. Seward and Thomas Smith, were fined \$25 and \$15 respectively, by the Municipal Court yesterday, for disorderly conduct. It was in evidence that Seward and Smith were intoxicated last Sunday, near Twenty-third and Washington streets, and that they started a disturbance opposite M. Wolderman's house. Smith flourished a dirk knife and Seward a revolver, but a bystander knocked the revolver away. Municipal Judge Cheson lectured the defendants severely, and told them that if they persisted in becoming walking arsenals again he would impose the heaviest fine the law allows.

PORTLAND WOMEN'S UNION.—The regular meeting of the Portland Women's Union was held yesterday at the Boarding Home. Plans for a new basement were submitted and approved. Two new committees were added to the regular ones. One on membership, consisting of the following: Mrs. Levi Goodrich, Mrs. M. A. Dalton, Miss May Sears, Mrs. M. C. George, Miss Kate Stitt. The other, for the International Messenger, Mrs. W. D. Palmer, Mrs. George Andrews, Mrs. Julius Ordway, Mrs. C. E. Curry's name was added to the executive committee. Meetings were discontinued until September 1.

LOOKING FOR LONG LUMBER.—A San Francisco man in the city today is on the order for some timber, and is looking for 100 feet long. He will probably have no trouble in securing all such timbers he wants, as the mill here frequently saw timbers 100 feet long. Special orders have to be placed for logs suitable for such timbers. Benson's camp, at Bunker Hill, is filling such orders right along. A few days ago a log 102 feet in length and containing 12,832 feet was put in the water there. That stick was growing when Columbus found this continent, and was quite a tree when Lewis and Clark arrived in Oregon.

MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS.—The State Board of Medical Examiners will hold examinations beginning at 9 o'clock this morning at the Portland Business College, and continuing two days. The laws of Oregon require every physician to pass a successful examination before receiving a license. About 20 physicians will take this examination, including graduates from several American colleges, as well as Japan and Great Britain.

WANTED TO BEAT A POLICEMAN.—A youth who gave his name as Thomas Smith, was fined \$3 in the Municipal Court yesterday, charged with drunkenness and disorderly conduct in the City Park, last Sunday. The policeman who arrested Smith testified when he first met Smith that the latter said: "If you did not have that star on your breast, I'd fix you."

INCORPORATION.—Articles of incorporation of the University Club were filed in the County Clerk's office yesterday by Robert T. Platt, John H. Kellock, Edmund J. Labbe, William L. Brewster and Ernest F. Tucker. The objects of the organization are to promote the welfare of college men in the city. The present value of the property of the society is \$700.

FIRST CREMATION TODAY

IT WILL BE A STRICTLY PRIVATE SERVICE FOR THE DEAD.

No Public Ceremony Will Take Place for Some Weeks—Eighteen Bodies Awaiting Cremation.

The first cremation at the Portland Crematorium, on the Oregon City electric railway, will take place this forenoon. The body of E. P. Sine, an attorney of Lexington, Or., will be the first to be incinerated. It will also be the first cremation in the Northwest. There will be no ceremonies. No one will be admitted except a few friends of the deceased.

Superintendent of the crematorium said yesterday that 18 bodies are awaiting the completion of the plant. Yesterday he received a telegram from La Grande, stating that a body would be held for incineration. A similar message was received from Seattle. The crematorium is not ready for public service, and will not be for several weeks, although the retorts are completed and private cremations will be held. The gasoline engine and furnace blast were tested yesterday. The engine is in the superintendent's building, just across the sidewalk, east of the main structure. Work is going forward in the chapel, which will be the handsomest funeral chapel in the Northwest. Owing to the character of the decorations and furnishings the work progresses slowly, and it will be some time before the plant will be fully completed.

Completing Cycle Path.
The cycle path on East Twenty-first street, between Division street and the north entrance to the Southern Pacific canal, will be finished in a few days. It is now ready, except the graveling, and this is being put on. It extends a distance of 12 blocks, and is a model in the way of street cycle paths, showing how much of a street is occupied and how it looks. This path is 6 feet wide, and is just outside the curb line. It is built up above the level of the roadway, and the street line is protected by a timber securely held in place. Vehicles cannot be driven on this path. It is carried over intersecting streets by plank crosswalks. East Twenty-first street was never fully improved, but it was known as one of the worst roads in the city. It was easy matter to build this path, besides the entire distance is almost a dead level. It could not have been built where it will accommodate a greater number of people.

Pioneer Albina Man Dead.
John T. Hughes, who died at his home, 506 Goldsmith street, Albina, was a pioneer of 1847. He was born at Augusta, Ill., in 1828. With his parents he crossed the plains, and they first settled at Salem, and shortly afterward moved to a farm three miles from where Albina was built. Mr. Hughes moved into Benton County and was twice elected to the Legislature on the Democratic ticket. He came to Portland about 15 years ago he moved to Portland with his family, and served as Recorder of the old city government of Albina until consolidation. He was president of the Albina Pioneer Volunteer Company, and took an interest generally in the affairs of Albina. He is survived by a wife and one daughter, Miss Ella Hughes. The body will be taken to Albany for burial today, and the funeral services will be in charge of the Masonic fraternity.

Patton Home Affairs.
The regular monthly meeting of the managers of the Patton Home was held yesterday afternoon at the Home. In the absence of the president, on account of illness, Mrs. Dr. L. M. Davis, first vice-president, presided. Aside from the regular routine business, the following action was taken: The president, Mrs. Rev. W. O. Forbes, Mrs. Knox, Mrs. Cline and Mrs. Evans, all charter members, and founders of the Home, were made honorary members. Mrs. Adolph Dekum was made chairman of the membership committee, with instructions to enlarge the membership as greatly as possible. The trustees were authorized to order cords of wood for the winter's use. There was a full attendance, and much interest manifested in all the affairs of the association.

Was an Old-Timer.
G. J. Ross, who died at an old home, Sunday, was an old East Side resident. For 20 years or more he had been a familiar figure in that part of the city. He built on Union avenue what is known as the Ross Hall. Since the organization of Sumner Park No. 1, G. J. Ross has been quartermaster, and was re-elected last January, out of respect for him, although he was then absent from the city. He went to Washington City, where his wife, Carrie, was employed in one of the departments, about a year ago, on a visit. Three daughters and one son survive him—Miss L. and Charles Ross, Portland; Miss Carrie Ross, Washington; Mrs. A. Hooper, Massachusetts. The two daughters were with him when he died. Interment will probably be in the East.

Favors Jameson.
A considerable sentiment has developed in the Third Ward in connection with Councilman Jameson's election to the Council by the death of Councilman A. F. Nichols. When first spoken to on the subject, Mr. Jameson very positively declined to be considered in connection with the place, but yesterday, after earnest solicitation on the part of a number of leading citizens of the ward, he said that if elected he would serve, but would make no effort to influence the election. He served two years in the Council, and it is considered that his knowledge of affairs would be valuable to the ward at this time.

United Brethren Church.
Rev. Frank E. Coulter, who was pastor of the United Brethren Church, East Fifteenth and East Morrison streets, has returned from Hopewell, where the conference has been in session. He came away before the appointments for the year had been made, and he does not know where he will go the ensuing year, but expects to remain in Portland till October. There is doubt as to a regular pastor being appointed to the Portland church for the coming year.

Tracks from the main line are being extended into the new car barn at 35th avenue, of the Portland City & Oregon Railway Company.
The Sellwood Methodist Church's lecture course closed with the fine address of Judge Caples on his "Observations in South America."
Rev. W. B. Bishop, a well-known member of the First Cumberland Presbyterian Church, East Side, will occupy the pulpit of the Walla Walla Cumberland Presbyterian Church for a time.

DEFERRED ONE YEAR.
Why National League of Press Clubs Will Visit Portland in 1902.

Mrs. Edith Tozier Weathered writes from Buffalo to Frank Lee, secretary of the Portland Press Club, explaining why the National League of Press Clubs, which was to hold the annual session in Portland this month, changed their plans and decided to come next year. On account of the Pan-American Exposition and other engagements East, about one-

half the delegates could not take the time for the Pacific Coast trip. Rather than have half a representation, Mrs. Weathered suggested that the engagement for Portland be canceled for 1901, on condition that the League meet here in 1902, which was agreed to by all hands.

The league, through Mrs. Weathered's intervention, has secured the promise of a special train of Pullman cars from New York to Portland for next year, and they will make a big event of the convention in 1902.

ELKS AND EAGLES.
Baseball Cranks Likely to See a Good Game Thursday.

Everything is now in readiness for the game of baseball to be played on the league grounds on the Fourth between the Eagles and the Elks, that is to say, by lines picked from the two organizations named. The teams have been practicing daily, and a great rivalry has sprung up between them. The game will be well ahead of any amateur game played this season will be readily seen from the names of the players who represent the teams. Many of them are players well known to the patrons of the game, and are fast enough for any company. Of course, the two lodges are backing their respective lines with a great deal of cash, and each thinks its team is the sure winner. Both teams have had the use of the professional field, and each day a large crowd of the supporters of the practicing team gathers on the field and urge their team on to hard work.

The Elks have not as yet announced the personnel of their team, but say that it is a crack-jack and will surprise the natives. FOREIGN EXPORTS \$430,243.
This is the Record of the Custom-House for Last Month.

The receipts of the Custom-House of the port of Portland, from duties on imports during the month of June, 1901, amounted to \$430,243. The value of exports was \$430,243, of which \$197,859 worth was shipped to the Orient by the O. R. & N. line of steamers.

The receipts of the Portland postoffice for the month of June, 1901, from the sale of postage stamps, stamped envelopes and postal cards amounted to \$17,368.24. The receipts for the corresponding month of 1900 were \$16,717.74, showing an increase of \$650.50, which is much less than the usual monthly increase.
