

WILL BE STRIKE CENTER

IRON WORKERS TO CONCENTRATE ON SAN FRANCISCO.

One Hundred Thousand Dollars Will Be Sent There Each Week to Aid Strikers.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 16.—San Francisco is to be made the strike center of the United States, so far as the ironworkers are concerned. A statement was made tonight by Thomas L. Wilson, fourth vice-president of the International Association of Machinists, in which he says:

"We have the assurance of the international grand lodge that the funds will be forthcoming for a final fight in San Francisco. Eighty-five per cent of the men out on strike in the East have been granted their demands and 20 per cent of the men have returned to work at the old scale. It is our expectation that we will call the latter out within a year, and have them on an equality with the others."

In addition to the machinists and others connected with the American Federation of Labor, the International Association of Machinists and local organizations, it is stated, propose to raise a strike fund of \$100,000 a week, which will be sent to San Francisco to carry out the plans of the strike leaders, who are confident that with this amount at their disposal, success is assured.

FIRED INTO CROWD OF STRIKERS

Two Non-Union Men, in Self-Defense, Wounded a Man.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 16.—Ill feeling between strikers and non-union men resulted in a shooting affair tonight at the corner of First and Harrison streets. F. A. Pagendam and Fred M. Cliff, employees of the Dunham Iron Works, discharged their revolvers into a crowd of strikers, one of the bullets lodging in the fleshy part of William Dunn's leg. The shooting was provoked by an assault committed by a number of strikers upon Pagendam and Cliff, who were on their way home from work, and were followed by strikers, who jeered at them and pelted them with stones. Threatening cries were made, when Cliff, who is an ex-convict, drew his revolver and called on Pagendam to do the same. They then called on the strikers to disperse. The reply was a shower of stones. The two workmen then fired their revolvers into the air. As this did not stop the throwing of stones they shot into the crowd. The only man hit was William Dunn, whose wound is not dangerous.

BAKER COUNTY WINS.

Judge Ellis Decides It Is Entitled to "Panhandle."

PENDLETON, Or., July 16.—Judge W. R. Ellis today handed down his decision in the famous Panhandle case. The opinion declares the act of the Legislature to be legal, and that the county has the power of the Legislature to take the "Panhandle" from Union County and annex it to Baker County. Union County will appeal the case to the Supreme Court.

Baker County versus George W. Benson, Clerk of Union County, is the title of the case. By act of the Legislature, which became a law March 1, 1901, a portion of Union County, known as the "Panhandle," was transferred to Baker County. The officials of the latter county wanted to collect the taxes from the residents of the "Panhandle," and petitioned Judge Robert Eakin for an alternative writ of mandamus. Judge Eakin issued the following order:

"It is therefore ordered that an alternative writ of mandamus be issued by the said George W. Benson, Clerk, as such clerk, commanding him, as such clerk, to immediately make out and deliver to said Baker County a transcript of all the taxes assessed upon all persons and property within the territory transferred from Union to Baker County; also commanding him, as such clerk, to immediately transfer and deliver to said Baker County all the original papers in all matters, cases, probate or otherwise, in which the moving party or the property involved is within said territory to said Baker County, and further commanding and directing said defendant to return said writ, with his certificate annexed thereto, to Judge Eakin on May 4, 1901, showing that he has complied with the commands expressed in said writ or show cause at such time and place, if any there be, for his omission or failure to so perform such acts and things as by said law and said writ directed and required."

Clerk Benson answered and the plaintiff, Baker County, demurred. The case was heard by Judge Ellis, sitting for Judge Eakin, at Union City. The decision is sustained on all six counts. This is a complete victory for the plaintiff, as far as the Circuit Court is concerned. As the act contained no provision for extra compensation for Clerk Benson doing the work prescribed, he will have to do it for his regular salary or resign.

BICYCLES MUST KEEP OFF.

Vancouver Council Decides Sidewalks Are No Place for Them.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 16.—At the regular biweekly meeting of the City Council last night a motion was made and carried directing the City Attorney to prepare an ordinance prohibiting the riding of bicycles on sidewalks.

Councilman Phil Caples tendered his resignation, to take effect August 19, which was accepted.

WILL BE ORDERED TO VANCOUVER

ALAMO COMING TO FRONT

MINES IN THAT DISTRICT ARE SHOWING UP WELL.

Prospects of Last Year Are Developing Into Good Properties—Quebec Putting in a Mill.

ALAMO, July 16.—Much development work has been done in this district in the last six months, and the results are extremely gratifying. Many new claims have been located, and many prospects of last year are rapidly developing into producing mines. The old faithful Bonanza, in the southeast corner of the district, is turning out from \$40,000 to \$50,000 a month and will turn out much more in the near future, when development work now in progress is completed. At present only five or six stamps of the 40 in the Bonanza mill are dropping. New machinery is to be put in, and the mine will probably be made to pay \$50,000 or even \$100,000 a month for an indefinite period.

Down about Granite, the southeast corner of the district, the Red Boy, another great mine, is putting out from its 20-stamp mill \$20,000 to \$40,000 a month. A shaft is being sunk to reach the 1000-foot level, but much water has been encountered and the work goes on slowly, though steadily. The output of the Red Boy will be greatly increased ere long.

About Alamo, the new town, much work is in progress. The Quebec is putting up a 20-stamp mill, which will soon be completed, and has a vast quantity of high-grade ore. The Strasburg will have 20 or 25-stamp mill this fall, with an abundance of good ore for it. The Scandia is running a double-track tunnel and has plenty of good ore. Hundreds of other claims are being opened, and nearly all are showing up well.

From Alamo west and south, and north, too, for that matter, the woods are full of mines doing development work, and the sound of blasting can be heard at all hours of the day and night. On Quartz Gulch, three miles southeast of Alamo, the Double Eagle, owned by people of the Dalles, a rich strike in the lower tunnel was recently made. The ore runs high in free gold, and is said to contain some fine sylvanite. The Double Eagle is a group of seven claims and is a most promising property. Adjoining it, on the south, is the Belcher group, recently purchased by Spokane people, who are running two tunnels on it, in one of which is a fine body of ore, running some 500 feet clear across the vein. Adjoining the Belcher, on the south, is the Golden Gate group, where an immense body of low-grade ore has been cut and along with it some three feet, that will run about 300 feet. Then to the west the locations are so thick that to even make a list of them would take as much space as this communication will fill.

Among these is the Poyche, with three feet of ore running 400 in gold and 10 per cent copper. Ore is being taken out for shipment.

The Diadem is another property with good ore in sight, which is being cut with a 200-foot tunnel. The ore from the Diadem is also being carried considerable galena and lead carbonate. At the Dorley, an old claim, a body of ore has been uncovered on the surface, but its extent is not known. It is about three feet in width and carries about \$700 gold, with a large per cent of copper and galena. Another good strike made last winter is the Johnnie, situated about 20 feet wide. Three feet of it is rich in sylvanite. The Rockefeller group is another promising "yearling" that will be a real breaker, and is one of the few mines owned by Portland people. Jack Martin is opening a fine property at the head of Olive Creek, which carries considerable sylvanite and lots of free gold. There are hundreds of fine-looking prospects, running clear down Greenhorn Mountain, and down to Susanville, where the Badger is taking out and shipping some very high-grade ore.

When one realizes that the Greenhorn district covers an area of 30 by 20 miles, and that it joins on to the Sumpter district proper, which is nearly as large, and that every hill in the two regions contains from one to a dozen mineral-bearing veins, it is a conservative statement that Oregon is a state lake of gold.

It is not first rank among the gold-producing states of the Union.

PROMISING PLACER MINE.

Ground Near Baker City Is to Be Worked Thoroughly.

BAKER CITY, July 16.—Dan Dillabaugh came in today with a gold nugget valued at \$12, which he picked up on the Kenyon & Brown place claim in Baker City. The nugget is about 15 miles southwest of Baker City. Sam Kenyon, one of the owners of the mine, is in the city, and he says he has every reason to believe they have a good lot of ground. They own 200 acres, which they are preparing to work after the latest-approved method of placer mining, where there is plenty of water. The gold taken from this claim averages \$16 per ounce, and is quite coarse. A shaft did not strike bedrock until a depth of 20 feet had been attained. The bedrock is a slate formation, above which is six feet of gravel. This is very rich in gold.

DOES IT APPLY TO BREWERIES?

The Law Prohibiting a Schoolhouse Close to a Saloon.

BAKER CITY, July 16.—Whether the new state law which prohibits the establishment of a saloon within 20 feet of a public schoolhouse applies to brewer is a question under discussion here. The site chosen by the School Board for the new \$15,000 schoolhouse is less than 20 feet distant from the \$50,000 brewery which is just being completed by Spokane capitalists. The brewery people say they will have their first beer ready to move, while the School Board is saying nothing, probably awaiting a legal opinion on the subject.

Star Performer an Oregon Woman.

The star bareback rider of Sells & Grist's Circus, which gave a performance here yesterday, is a resident of Sparks, Baker County. Her name is Edna Gerber, but she is known as Miss Edna on

the bills. Her mother, Rose Marretta, does a trapeze balancing act which is very clever. Miss Edna is said to be the only woman in the world who turns a back somersault on a bareback horse. A number of Sparks friends of the young woman and her mother were in yesterday to see them. Mrs. Marretta's son and father reside on the ranch near Sparks which the mother and daughter call home.
