

The increased business has been very unevenly distributed, however, a haif dozen houses having transacted the bulk of the busi-ness. The demand has been chiefly for ter-ritory and Oregon wools, although an interest has been manifested in flences, all of which have been moved at full prices. The trend of the market is noted for medium stock. Some dealers report that it is impossible to get higher prices, but on fine wools better prices certainly have been obtained than could prices certainly have been obtained than could have been secured two or three weeks ago. From the lowest point touched in the past year there has been a recovery from 2 to 4 cents per scoured pound, or, say, 5 to 10 recevent

cents per scoured pound, or, say, 3 to 10 per cent. The sales for the week in Boston amounted to 6.780,000 pounds domestic and 140,000 pounds foreign, makin a total of 6.620,000 pounds foreign, makin a total of 1.663,000 pounds for the corresponding week last year. The receipts of wool in Boston this week amount to 20,241 bales, against 14,843 bales last week, and 17,255 bales last year. 
