

## SPORTS ARE OUTLINED

### SPLENDID PROGRAMME ARRANGED FOR FALL CARNIVAL.

Committee on Amusements Desires to Spend \$500 Daily—Matter of Transportation Not Settled.

At the meeting of the general committee for the 1901 carnival, held last night, the sub-committee on music and amusements, consisting of John F. Cordray, B. B. Rich, D. Solis Cohen, Julius L. Meier and H. G. Ramdell, presented a report outlining in a general way the varieties of amusement which it is hoped to present during the carnival. The principal feature of the report was a request that \$500 per day for the 27 days of the carnival be appropriated for amusement purposes, a total of \$13,500.

The report began by stating that the special committee of the Multnomah Club, appointed to supervise the athletic features of the carnival, had been requested to prepare an outline of what athletic sports the club could present, together with a statement of the cost thereof. This request was complied with. The committee figured the cost of the athletic events at \$1257.50. This will include a championship athletic meet, a football game by electric light, a wrestling match, a ladies' basketball game and an indoor tennis match. Several of those who take part in the championship meet will have to be brought here from outside cities, and their expenses paid. This is also true of the wrestling.

In addition to the athletic features, the committee reported that the amusements would include a competitive military drill, a horse show and high-class vaudeville performances. The appropriation of \$50 daily, it was stated, would cover the employment of two bands, as well as the amusements in the German village, which will be one of the main attractions at the carnival. The sum asked for is also to include the pyrotechnic display.

Mr. Cordray supplemented the report with a verbal statement that the idea of the competitive military drill had already excited much interest in local military circles, and that this interest would undoubtedly extend throughout all the military organizations in the Northwest.

The report was not discussed in detail. Mr. Fieschner seemed to voice the general sentiment when he expressed the belief that before the request of the committee for an appropriation was granted it should be referred to the committee on finance. He put the suggestion in the form of a motion, and it was carried.

In the absence of H. C. Campbell, C. A. Whitmore made the report of the committee on transportation. He stated that the committee had as yet been unable to secure a conference with the railroad men of the railroads, but that one would probably be held the coming week. The committee is striving to secure a 10-day limit on all tickets, and there is some objection to so long a period on the part of the railroad men.

L. D. Cole, chairman of the committee on advertising, reported the work of his committee was practically a blank until some definite announcement could be made regarding transportation.

W. L. D. Dunaway, in a short speech, urged upon the committee the propriety of having all the printing and advertising done at home. The fact that this had not been done in the past, he said, engendered some feeling. He also urged that the printing be given to houses entitled to use the union label. He said this was particularly important if it were desired to bring people here from Idaho and Montana, where the union sentiment is very strong.

General Sumner, the chairman of the committee, briefly endorsed Mr. Dunaway's remarks. The committee then adjourned.

A meeting of the executive committee will be held next Wednesday night. At that time the superintendent of the exposition features of the carnival will be selected. Several applications for the position have been filed.

As stated previously, over \$13,000 of the \$15,000 guarantee fund desired by the committee has been subscribed, and the entire amount will probably be raised within the next few days.

The committee's meeting was held last night in the new carnival headquarters, rooms 334-336 Chamber of Commerce building. Heretofore the meetings have been held in the rooms of the Commercial Club.

## NOT SERIOUS OFFENSES.

### Mollala Corners Incident Investigated by Third Regiment.

Captain Charles E. McDowell, Lawrence H. Knapp and Josiah Kemp, who were appointed by Colonel Everett, commanding the Third Regiment, to investigate the charge of unsoldierly conduct against certain members of the regiment at Mollala Corners, in the recent practice march, without having filed their report with Colonel Everett. It will be forwarded to Brigadier-General Beebe, with a letter from Colonel Everett.

As the investigation was military in character the members of the committee are not at liberty to make a statement of the contents of the report. Colonel Everett declined yesterday to give the report to the newspapers, saying his duty was to report to his superior officer. It is learned, however, that the report finds that two members of the regiment did not behave themselves as they should have done, but that their violation of the articles of war were not so serious as has been reported. Furthermore, the conduct of these men does not reflect upon the regiment at large, or its well-earned reputation for integrity and honor.

An officer of the regiment who is familiar with what occurred at Mollala Corners said yesterday:

"The offenses charged to the two men referred to in the report were committed unwittingly. When the regiment was passing Mollala Corners it was struck over a mile, and Colonel Everett could not be everywhere at once nor keep his eye on every man at the same time. My judgment is that 50 such offenses as those mentioned in the report now in Colonel Everett's hands might be expected in a hot and dusty march like the one to Willamette. That there were only two such offenses shows how well the regiment is disciplined and how needless it is to blame over 300 men for the slight infractions of two."

Who are blamed, or what punishment, if any, is provided, will not be known until the report reaches General Beebe, provided he consents to give it to the newspapers.

## JOINT SESSION DON'T GO.

### County Jail Prisoners Cannot Impeach Beal Judges.

The refusal of George Mitchell, the County Jailor, to allow the holding of a joint session of the kangaroo court has caused considerable dissatisfaction among the prisoners. They were disposed to kick considerably at first, but, knowing that under the existing circumstances they must bow to the inevitable, they received the decision of the jailor with as good grace as possible, and the kangaroo court will be conducted as in the past, with only one judge.

The business of the kangaroo court is to adopt rules requiring prisoners to keep themselves and their quarters clean, and generally to enforce good conduct. When a new prisoner arrives he is taken before the judge of the court and the situation is explained to him, and if he has any money he is fined a stipulated sum, which is expended for tobacco, etc., for the use of the crowd.

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### RIVERS AND HARBORS COMMITTEE'S TRIP FROM LEWISTON.

Part of the Journey by Rail and Part by Water—Portland Delegation to Go.

The wish of the Inland Empire for a visit from the rivers and harbors committee and for a practical illustration of Portland's interest in an open river will be gratified this month. Chairman Burton and between 12 and 15 members of the committee will leave Lewiston July 24, for a river and rail trip on and along the Snake and Columbia Rivers to Portland. Here they will go ashore and view the city, and the delegation will be small, because of the length of the trip and the time required, but it will be representative of the city's largest interests. A. L. Mohler, president of the O. R. & N. Co., Theodore B. Wilson and H. W. Scott will be members of the party. Six others who will be selected in a day or two will make the trip. The Portlanders expect to leave Monday night. They may meet the rivers and harbors committee between Spokane and Lewiston, or go direct to Lewiston and await the arrival of the committee.

Chairman Burton's committee will leave Seattle on the evening of July 22 and go direct to Lewiston, arriving there on the afternoon of July 23. For the remainder of the day the committee will be the guests of the people of Lewiston. The celebrated Porter orchard on the Clearwater will be visited and luncheon, including fruits, will be served. After that there will be a drive ending with a quiet dinner in the evening.

On the morning of July 24 the committee, accompanied by representatives of the towns of the Inland Empire and the Portland delegation, will leave Lewiston by boat. It is hoped that the stage of the water will permit a river trip to Wallula. Heretofore the committee has been unable to make the trip, but the R. & N. train for the run to The Dalles, time permitting, the obstructions between The Dalles and Celilo will be viewed on the down trip. At The Dalles, the committee and the guests accompanying them will dine with the Commercial Club. On the morning of July 25 a boat will be provided by the people of The Dalles and all hands will start for a trip to Big Lost Lake. Here they will go ashore and view the obstructions at the lower end of the rapids. In case the visitors have not had time to see Celilo on the down trip by rail, they will board the train at Big Lost Lake and go to Celilo. The obstructions have been viewed to the satisfaction of every one on the rivers and harbors committee will board the boat for the trip through the Cascade Locks to Portland. No plan of entertainment has been made for the committee in Portland, and probably none will be needed.
