

END OF STRIKE NOT FAR OFF

FIREMEN AND UNITED MINERWORKERS CONFERENCE. Mineworkers Will Use Their Influence to Have Strikers Released to Old Places.

WILKESBARR, Pa., July 21.—The stationary firemen's strike will soon be at an end. A meeting of the executive officers of the United Mineworkers of the three anthracite districts, and the chief executive officers of the Stationary Firemen's Association was held in this city today, for the purpose of discussing the situation. The United Mineworkers have all along been lukewarm in their support of the strike, and the firemen insist that they define their position, once for all, as it was impossible to carry on the strike if the United Mineworkers opposed it. With that object in view, the executive officers of the United Mineworkers agreed to come to this city and meet the strikers. The United Mineworkers were represented by 28 officers of the three districts. The Stationary Firemen's Association was represented by J. F. Mullahy, president of the association, Thomas Barrett, vice-president, J. A. Gerrity, secretary, Brodus Langdon and J. F. Wade, T. D. Nicholls, president of district No. 1, opened the discussion. He said the strike was inopportune at this time. It was detrimental to the miners and the coal trade, and he urged with the operators to remain at work for one year, and if the United Mineworkers remained out it would mean the sacrifice of the good will of the coal operators. President Barrett of the United District also spoke against the strike. He said the strike was inopportune, and his men were opposed to it. President Duffy of the Second District said the strikers in that district did not get out on strike. This showed lack of unity, and the strike could not succeed. Secretary Gerrity spoke for the firemen, and the sacrifices that had been made for the coal operators. He said the strike had been declared by the unanimous vote of 30 delegates. It was plain from the discussion that the United Mineworkers were overwhelmingly against the continuation of the strike. The men realized this, and they submitted the following questions to the United Mineworkers: First—Will you withdraw all men of your organization from our positions, if the strike is declared off? Second—Will you use your influence to have all engineers and others reinstated to their former positions, if the strike is declared off? Third—Will you allow us to meet the United Mineworkers in joint conference, and to present grievances at the same time? To the first two questions an affirmative reply was given. To the third, this reply was made: "Yes, if you join the United Mineworkers." A resolution was then adopted calling on the grievance committee of the Firemen's Association to call on each coal company tomorrow, and ascertain if the men who went on strike Tuesday will be given back their places. These committees are to make a report to the same joint committee which met here today, and if the replies from the companies are favorable, then the strike will be officially declared off tomorrow night. The following official statement was issued from firemen's headquarters tonight: "After the officers of the three districts of the United Mineworkers, and the attitude they contemplated assuming toward the firemen, should their strike continue, we thought it would be to the interest of all concerned to put to a speedy termination, and in consequence thereof we made propositions to them, which were adopted, after which we instructed the firemen to pursue all honorable means to obtain their positions. We are confident the strike is not yet declared off until after the answers are received from their employers. It seems to be the prevailing opinion that should they be favorable, the action of the delegates Monday evening will end the strike. But should any one now out of employment on account of the strike be discriminated against, the end will be far off, and the United Mineworkers are determined to stand by those who sacrificed their positions before they would take our places. LONDON STOCK EXCHANGE.

Week Opened Gloomy, but Ended With a Decidedly Cheerful Tone. LONDON, July 21.—The Stock Exchange, after beginning the week with just a present with about the worst possible prospects, ended it with a decidedly more cheerful tone. Among the numerous depressing influences which marked the week were the reports from Pekin, the drought, the steel strike in the United States, and the seemingly ineffective administration of the South African War. The capture of the Red-Steyn correspondence had a more exhilarating effect upon London traders than the facts seemed to warrant, having in view the circumstance that the captured letters contained ancient history, and the further circumstance that so little in the way of real advance has been made since May 1. Howland's letter, which was so long and tangible excuse to advance for some time, and the capture of the correspondence answered the purpose. There is general confidence in the future of the war, and the general situation was helped by the confidence displayed in New York, in spite of the steel strike, and by the announcement of the adjustment of the Northern Pacific dispute. London, as has been usual recently, followed New York's lead in the American section. On the other hand, some rails were delayed, and the market was closed as to the half-year dividend, and the showing of other industries was either stagnant or only slightly higher, with the exception of the iron and steel, which fell off 13 points, as a result of what is regarded as the surrender of the directors to the Americans. The closing meetings of the convention were held tonight in Mechanics' Pavilion, the Alhambra Theatre, the Metropolitan Temple, the Presbyterian Church, in the latter place Rev. J. L. Batty, of Halifax, N. S., spoke as follows: "The end of the feast draws near. We have been sumptuously fed. We rise from the banquet with more strength than we brought to it. We go now to meet and mingle with those of our fellow-workers who are not gathered. Our building would not be a God-ordained institution? If so, its perfection and completeness is a God-given activity. Our pattern revealed an hitherto unknown realm not simply by writing an essay or giving advice, but it was told John what things were and heard; how that the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, to the poor the gospel is preached. The Holy Spirit and the consecrated water. Satan selects his disciples when they are idle. Christ found either fishing or mending nets. Now let us drop the metaphorical and the tabernacle, both in speech and in reality. The Epworth League has come to stay, and our future duty is to see that it becomes the permanent 'Gate Beautiful,' an entrance for the people of God to our homes into the temple of our church responsibilities. But let the youth of our church never forget that there are still lying on the outside of the temple who are in their glorious privilege to take with them the healing power of a Spirit-filled life. At the evening session the report of the committee on resolutions was read and adopted, viva voce. After expressing thanks to all who had aided in making the convention a success, the resolutions continue: "Resolutions. 'First—We rejoice in the deepening interest among our members in the great cause of Christian missions, and congratulate our organization for the systematic training of our young people in Christian work. The importance of the study of such great topics as the English Bible, Christian stewardship, personal evangelism, cannot be overestimated. 'Second—That we are unalterably, as ever, opposed to the traffic in liquor, and we mean to keep up our war upon this wicked business until our continent is freed from the dread of it. 'Second—That we greatly rejoice at the abolition of the canteen in our Army, and deplore the fact that a persistent effort is being made to have it restored. Especially is this distressing to us when we note that Russia is protesting against the canteen, and that even France has prohibited it in its army camps. We earnestly hope that wider agencies will prevail in free Christian America, and to this end we will ever pray and fight. 'Colored Epworth Leaguers. 'We have learned that representatives of the various Christian Young People's Societies among the colored churches of the country plan to hold a gathering in the Summer of 1902, to discuss the better development of their young people in Christian work, and we desire to express our approval of the movement, and heartily commend it to the consideration of the Epworth League. 'Junior Work. 'We are much encouraged with the growth of our Junior Epworth League, and we are experiencing the training of our youngest soldiers for Christ in accomplishing great good, unhesitatingly urge all our pastors and Christian workers to give their attention and gifts into Junior chapters wherever possible. 'Supreme Purpose. 'While we do not underestimate the value of the literary, social and benevolent departments, we desire to emphasize once again the supreme purpose of our existence, i. e., the development of the highest type of young members of our churches, and the salvation of the multitudes of young men and women of our communities who are now perishing. 'Many leaguers will leave the city on side-trips to the Yosemite and other points in various parts of the state. Of these, a certain percentage of our young people, but the greater part will journey eastward to their homes after the completion of their outings in the interior. Several hundred will advance the city to attend the convention of the main army of the leaguers, which will leave at intervals during the week. 'Bishop Joyce Reviews Meeting. 'Bishop Isaac W. Joyce, president of the Epworth League convention as it closed today, said as follows: 'I have only good tidings to say of the Epworth League international convention, which has just closed. It is indicative of those who have been at the preceding ones that this one of the best ever held. The attendance has been a delightful surprise. In this respect, the convention has been the highest order. A delightful and brotherly spirit pervaded the convention from the first hour to the last. The reports of the sub-committees, and the memories of this great convention, and of San Francisco, I do not see how any people could have done more for us, for our comfort and happiness. After the closing scenes have passed, and the people of San Francisco have done. The daily papers and the railroads and the steamer lines have also contributed their share to the astonishing success of our convention. 'Rev. Joseph F. Berry, general secretary, said: 'The Epworth League convention has been the most remarkable in the history of the organization. The attendance has been enormous. The speeches have been unusually able, and the spirit of the meetings has been the most inspiring. I have been approached by many religious meetings I have ever attended.' 'Clark in Russian Copper Company. 'ST. PETERSBURG, July 21.—United States Senator W. A. Clark, according to the Moscow Telegram, has joined with Kieff capitalists in establishing a copper company having a capital of 15,000,000 rubles. Mr. Clark is supplying 12,000,000 rubles. With M. Maslova, one of the directors, Mr. Clark is going to the Government of Semipalatinsk, to examine the mines there. 'Belgian Minister Will Return. 'BRUSSELS, July 21.—Count Delclerch, Belgian Minister to the United States, will retire from the post at his residence in Washington, D. C., tomorrow. Baron Moncheur, Belgian Minister to Mexico, who in turn will be succeeded by Viscount de Beghuen de Houthem, councillor to the Belgian Legation in London. 'Rise of North Seacoast Confirmed. 'LONDON, July 21.—The rise of the north seacoast, or the sinking of the sea level, has been confirmed, says the Berlin correspondent of the Standard. 'Surprised a Boer Commando. 'KROONSTADT, July 21.—Major Pincuff's forces surprised a Boer commando at Honingsburg, July 19, capturing Commandant Hattling, two sons of General Pincuff and 24 others, and killing and wounding 17. 'Order of Lord Roberts. 'LONDON, July 21.—Lord Roberts, the Commander-in-Chief of the British Army, will also accompany the force, which will invade a wild country, inhabited by hardy and desperate people, and will be on active service and in maneuvers. 'Medieval Trusts. 'Atlantic. 'The combinations which in their magnitude and methods most nearly resemble the trusts of the present day were corners in foreign trade or in domestic commodities like the metals, silver, iron, tin, ginger, cinnamon, pepper, etc., and after consulting the chief merchants of the empire, fixed a price for each commodity. These trusts were abolished in the reign of Edward I. and the price of goods was left to the free market. 'Bicycle Races at Vallsburg. 'NEW YORK, July 21.—The feature of the day at Vallsburg, N. J., today was the bicycle race, which was held at the half-mile. Gascoyne, having beaten Major Taylor at Boston Saturday night, hurried to Vallsburg, and won the half-mile race. The race was held at 7:30 p. m. Fenn, in a five-mile pursuit race. Many of the spectators said the Englishman had not had time to rest between the races, and he was called upon to rest a little over three miles. The Home is Peary relief steamer Erik, which counted upon calling at Turnavia, Northern Labrador, and landing her last mail before entering the Arctic Circle. LEAGUERS CONCLUDE WORK

INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION IS BROUGHT TO A CLOSE. President Joyce Tendered an Impromptu Reception—Strong Anti-Canteen Resolution.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 21.—The religious enthusiasm aroused by the international convention of the Epworth League, which culminated in a large grand meeting held this afternoon at Mechanics' Pavilion. About 10,000 persons were in attendance, and not a seat was vacant. The conclusion of the sermon, preached by Bishop Joyce, was a stirring appeal for the Epworth League. The league, his theme was "Faith in Christ," and no address more eloquent nor more fervent has been heard since the assembly of the league was organized. The conclusion the bishop was tendered an impromptu reception, not being allowed to leave the platform until nearly all the members of the great congregation had grasped his hand. The influence of the league was not alone felt in the central meeting. All over the city, in churches of many denominations, services were held, and in every place the local pulpits were occupied by a visiting divine. At Grace Episcopal Church, where Rev. J. M. Buckley, of New York, preached, it was impossible to gain admittance to the time announced for the opening of the doors, and in none of the churches was there a vacant pew. Old-fashioned religious services were being held in more than a dozen places, including the Japanese and Chinese missions. At 11 o'clock came the regular services of the day, which were characterized by exceptional fervor. In the afternoon an enthusiastic children's meeting was held in the Alhambra Theatre. Rev. M. E. Ketchum, of Xenia, O., acted as chairman, and Rev. G. W. Gorman, of Xenia, Ont., led in prayer. The first address was made by Miss H. H. Bacon, of Washington, D. C., who spoke on "Character-Building." She said: "Anyone who contemplates erecting a fine building first employs an architect to draw a plan, showing each part of the structure.
