Amusements Tonight.

MARQUAM GRAND THEATRE—Mr. Henry Miller and company in "Heartsease."

ONE MAN'S EXPERIENCE.—J. A. Stowbridge, from long experience as a property owner, has a very fair practical knowledge of the best method of improving streets and maintaining them in repair. He was yesterday ordering some cracked rock to dress up Taylor street west of Front from his property there. He said the macadam improvement on this bit of street was put down 35 years ago by "Uncle" Jimmy Stephens and "Uncle" Billy Frank. The material used was cement gravel from a quarry on the East Side. The street had been dressed up with cracked rock a few times and if this treatment was kept up it bid fair to last forever. Since this street was improved he had spent a lot of money on Front street in front of his property. He had macadamized it, planned it, laid Nicholson pavement, (which had lasted for 12 years and finally had paved it with stone blocks, which are there yet. The macadam improvement on the Taylor-street side of his property, he charged when the improvement had been made, and he thinks good cement gravel very good stuff.

BOUNTY ON HIS PARTNER.—The partnership dissolution suit of Henry S. Stroness against James D. Hennessy was settled yesterday by the purchase of the stock of goods of the concern by Hennessy, for \$500. The stock was put up for competitive bidding by order of Judge Sears and Cleland. There were 32 bids all told, ranging from \$500 up. As Hennessy owned half of the goods as a partner, he paid half of the amount of his bid of \$250. The consideration of the court today will decide whether the receivers, O. P. McFall and Al Stowbridge, shall collect these accounts, and other matters connected with the receivership. The firm over only about \$400 at a hearing in court several days ago it came out that Stephenson put \$700 into the business with Hennessy in 1897, and when they quarreled recently the assets of the concern were over \$12,000, and the indebtedness a mere trifle.

LOCKERS FOR SOLDIERS.—The soldiers of most countries are required to carry their wardrobe in their knapsacks, but Uncle Sam uses his boys in a better way than that. At the Taylor-street wharf yesterday was seen several hundred "lockers" painted blue, each provided with a tray divided into compartments and a hamp, and all painted a beautiful sky blue. The last of a lot of some 1500 made here and shipped to Vancouver for the men of the regiment just being organized there. Some 1000 men in all have been enlisted for this regiment, so it is not only full, but flowing over, and every man is to have a locker. When the regiment moves to new quarters these lockers will require somewhat extensive transportation facilities, but when it goes into the field for active service the lockers will be left behind in cold storage. In all modern barracks such lockers or their equivalent in the way of drawers are constructed as permanent fixtures.

PROGRESS ON BEACH-STREET SEWER.—Councilman Branch, of the Sewer Committee, and City Engineer Chase, visited Albina yesterday and inspected the partially completed portion of the Beach-street sewer. The trench is finished and the brick work is about half completed from the county road below the O. R. & N. car shops, on a ravine, Maryland avenue, which is being tunneled under. A layer of rock is placed under the sewer, and the inverted arch is being made of vitrified brick laid on concrete. Mr. Branch is well pleased with the manner in which the work is being done, the best of German concrete being used, and mixed thin enough to allow it to penetrate all the crevices between the bricks. The sewer will be completed through to Beach street by the middle of August, by which time the river will about have reached low water mark, and the section of the sewer across the bottom land can be laid.

HURRICANE AT THE BEACH.—Sunday excursionists to the seaside report that a regular old-fashioned southwest wind prevailed there on that day. The wind blew a hurricane and the rain clouds came down and rolled over the land, thoroughly drenching everything and obliging everybody to keep inside. One cheerful excursionist says the wind had a velocity of 30 miles an hour and blew the fish up on the beach so far from the water that they could not wriggle back in. Only a slight shower fell in this city during the afternoon, which, however, caught many girls out in white dresses and "trimmed" hats without umbrellas. Parties who were picnicking on the Clackamas near Gladstone Park, report that not a drop of rain fell there, and there appears to have been none in the country around Portland.

GOOD HORSEMAN JAILLED.—With the appearance of having been engaged in a prolonged drinking bout, Edward Reilly, gray-haired and pasty cheeked, was yesterday before Municipal Judge Cameron, charged with drunkenness, and the police made a request that he should not be fined, but should be sentenced to a short term in the City Jail, in order that he might take care of the horses attached to the patrol wagon. "This is a strange request," observed the Judge. "Ed Reilly is a professional driver of horsemen in Portland, and very few men understand the care of horses so well as he," said Jailer Roberts. Reilly blushed and said he "guessed" he would be all the better for a night's detention for a short time. He was sentenced to 30 days' imprisonment.

A NEW CHERRY.—Oregon has long been famous for her cherries, and great improvement has been noted in varieties from year to year. Greatest of all the cherries yet seen is a new one now grown by J. M. G. Kallish, on the Columbia Slough, in this county. It excels alike in size, color and flavor. Some Eastern people to whom this cherry has been shown would not believe it was a cherry, but insisted that it was a plum, and could only be convinced by trying it. This incomparable cherry is not yet grown except on the farm of Mr. Kallish, though doubtless it will be spread rapidly from cuttings. It will be known as the "Kallish Cherry."

THEY HAD A THIRST.—Some thirty-two wandered along Fourth street near Washington, yesterday, just as a case of bitters and a box of cigars were left on the sidewalk in front of Blum's cigar store, until an expressman arrived. But the thirty-two did not wait for the expressman. He was thirsty and wanted a smoke, so he walked away with cigars and bitters. Just about the same time, some one stole a case containing whiskey from the front part of S. A. Arata & Co.'s store, 104 Third street, and walked off with it, while the clerk was busy in the rear part of the store.

INCORPORATIONS.—Articles of Incorporation of the Crude Oil Company were filed in the County Clerk's office yesterday by William Booth, R. W. Hoyt, R. J. Himes and C. W. Miller. Capital stock, \$100,000. The objects are to develop lands for coal oil, etc. Incorporation articles were filed of the Helena Consolidated Mining & Milling Company. The incorporators are: R. J. Jennings, M. G. McNichols and Charles B. Brunau. Capital stock, \$150,000.

The upholstered parts of the machine were clad with a cheap cretonne cloth laid on in excited stripes of pink and green. The plan is to let the purchaser choose a cozier tapestry of silk, satin, shawl skin or anything else in harmony with wall tints and esthetic notions. After the selection was made the clerk proposed to show her to the upholstery department, where she could select an appropriate outer covering. HOLD THIEF.—Two rogues entered Wadhams & Co.'s store yesterday forenoon and, after a search, they picked up one leisurely took down a case of 1000 cigars and calmly walked out the door with it, as unconcerned as if he was a customer. The act was observed by the cashier, who did not grasp its full significance until two or three minutes later, when it flashed into his head that a flagrant violation of trade ethics had occurred. He immediately called the police, and a scamp was half a block away. A bill clerk shouted after the thief and gave chase, but the latter dropped the cigars and scampered away so fleetly that he could not be caught. His confederate also managed to escape, for his function was not realized until after the episode had calmed down.

ART ROOMS OPEN ALL SUMMER.—The rooms of the Art Association in the Library building have not been closed for the summer months this year, but are open every afternoon, giving opportunity for the casual visits of strangers in the library for those seeking recreation, as well as for the use of those who care to make the collection an object of more serious study. The photographs will be taken from the cases at the request of any visitor, and books are on the open shelves as an aid to the study of the works themselves. The paintings and drawings of H. M. Walcott are still exhibited in the lecture room. The rooms are open daily from 2 to 4:30 P. M. Admission is free on Thursdays and Saturdays.

THE COURT RECOGNIZED HIM.—Nate Hoffman, an old offender, was in the Municipal Court yesterday, charged with being drunk, and he entered a plea of guilty, observing at the same time that he hoped the Judge would deal gently with him. PUGET SOUND SALMON PACK.—George T. Myers has returned from an extended trip among the Puget Sound canneries, from Blaine to Seattle. He reports very fair catches of fish being made generally, but, as usual, some are doing much better than others. The pack up to the end of last week amounted to between 7,000 and 10,000 cases, and canneries are hopeful of making an average pack. The canneries of the Pacific Northwest Company was sold at receiver's sale a few days ago, and was bought by Henry Allen, of San Francisco, who held claims against it amounting to \$26,000.

SELLS & GRAY'S CIRCUS

PLENTY OF GOOD FEATURES UNDER CANVAS.

It Has the Distinctive Quality of Allowing the Spectator to See All That is Going On.

Sells & Gray's circus has come and gone. Crowded houses witnessed both the afternoon and evening performances. The small boy has been duly tempted to leave his happy home and win immortal fame under the canvas. The small girl has held her breath, while larger and considerably older girls have performed daring feats on the trapeze or swung high in the air with only a strap clutched in their teeth for support. It was a great day for Young America; likewise for older America, or at least for a goodly portion thereof.

Sells & Gray's show is worth the price. There are some mighty clever things in it. The place of honor must go to the Eddy family, all-around acrobats and tumblers. The family consists of men, women and a clever child, 7 years of age. This precocious youngster was brought on the stage in a basket of flowers, and he can tumble to beat fairly dead. The kid has a native humor about him, and his face dimples with pleasure as he goes through his act. To him it is not business, but pleasure.

The Eddy family does not appear in tight. On the contrary, the men do their act in dress suits, and the women in long skirts. They are the originators of this kind of work, and the act is well. Tumbling in a parlor dress is not easy. A detailed description of their act cannot be given here, but it is scientific tumbling, and pleased the audiences that witnessed it.

To Miss Edna Mariotta, the bareback rider, should be given the second place of honor. She is a wonder. She sits lightly on the back of a beautiful milk-white horse while that animal canter around the ring, and performs wonderful feats. A streamer is raised over the horse's back, and Miss Edna first jumps over this streamer as the horse passes under it, and on the next round she turns a somersault over it and lands on her feet.

It was this performance that caused the audience to hold its breath. "She's the only woman who ever came to Portland who could do that," remarked an old-time circus enthusiast who witnessed it. Miss Edna was born in Oregon. Her father, who is the proud owner of being her native land.

One of the features of the show is known as "the woman with the iron jaw." She is the Tybell sisters. Wrapped in the American flag, she clasps a strap which is riveted to the end of a rope, and is hauled to the ceiling. With only the iron jaw she is able to prevent her feet from coming down, and she is so strong she resists, and has to be led off the stage by her sister, who also has a jaw that is no slouch.

The Bell sisters, Maud and Hazel, also perform aerial feats that are hair-raising. They leap from trapeze to trapeze with startling agility, and add much to the good part of the show.

And the Bovolaps! We mustn't forget the Bovolaps. Chained in the main entrance tent, this remarkable product of the jungle attracted wide attention. It is said to be the only one of its kind in America, and it's to be hoped there are no more coming. The Bovolaps doesn't travel on its shape; neither would its beauty gain it a prize. It is probably the ugliest specimen of animal creation that ever came over the pike, yet interesting withal. It looks part bull, part buffalo, part hippopotamus. The Bovolaps is a product of the Argentine country, and Aguilardo himself is a prize beauty in comparison to it.

Among the male performers of the circus, Orrin Davenport and William Riland should be given special mention. Davenport is the principal bareback rider of the aggregation, and does some wonderful somersault feats, and Riland does a jockey act that is all right.

Now for the clowns. There are good clowns and bad clowns in the circus—some 20 in the total. They spring some good jokes, and some very bad ones, thereby delighting the small boy. The gray hairs of some of their witclowns entitle them to respect and veneration.

"I was raised on a boomer," declared one clown, as he took a drink of an amber-colored fluid. "What kind?" asked another. "Rubberneck," was the side-splitting reply. "I'll knock your brains out," announced one painted monster to the other. "You can't," was the emphatic reply. "Because I'm like the Portland dude; I haven't got any brains."

Still, this is the way some people make their living, and honest toil must be respected. He it ever so painful. The clowns add to the interest of a springboard act in which several acrobats take part, and one of them actually jumped over the elephant, while the bayonet clown threw his hat over.

The clown who does their new grand and lofty tumbling on roller skates, have their mock fire department in which the water is thrown on one of their number instead of on the fire, and go through all the regulation horseplay, some of which is funny.

There is a side-show to the circus containing some 15 freaks. The management announced, through their gentlemanly spokesman, that several snakes still possessing their fangs and other deadly attachments, arrived by the Wells-Fargo express yesterday afternoon, and were on exhibition for the first time. It was further stated that a female snake charmer would for the first time and in the presence of the assembled multitude, essay the feat of taming these reptiles, one of which was declared to be as large round as a man's body.

A drawing card last night was a ventriloquist, who stood outside the main tent and made wooden boys say all sorts of funny things. This act was supposed to be but an eye-opener to the performance inside, and, although ventriloquism is not new, it was a clever act.

One thing that can be said for Sells & Gray's circus is that things happen when they ought to. Everything moves like clockwork; there are no uncomfortable delays. The circus drew a big crowd both afternoon and evening. There was no disaster and no accidents. The show goes from here to Chehalis and then on to Puget Sound.
