

MUST SIGN OR LOSE JOBS

ULTIMATUM TO SKILLED STEELWORKERS AT MCKEESPORT.

Contracts Practically Repudiate Any Labor Union—Only Few Days in Which to Decide.

PITTSBURG, July 26.—The National Tube Works Company at McKeesport has made an unexpected move intended to checkmate the Amalgamated Association.

This movement, which has fire, carried consideration into the ranks of the strikers. The workers are highly skilled workmen, and with their co-operation the big plant could be closed down.

Definite announcement that the officers of the American Sheet Steel Company would start the Dewees-Wood mill in McKeesport as a nonunion plant.

The strike is not affecting the United States Steel Corporation as seriously as was expected by the Amalgamated Association.

The present indications are that the employees of the National Tube Company, either tomorrow or the day after tomorrow, will go out on a strike.

The situation at the Dewees-Wood plant also became more interesting when, this morning, the management announced that they would start the plant with nonunion men.

Heavy Earthquake Shocks Experienced in a Large Section of the Nevada Desert.

SALT LAKE CITY, July 26.—A section 75 miles wide throughout the Nevada Desert from Death as far west as Carlin, experienced a series of heavy earthquake shocks about 2:30 this afternoon.
