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EXPULSION OF KENNAN

AMERICAN AUTHOR AND LECTURER QUIETLY LEFT RUSSIA.

LONDON, July 29.—Mail advices received here today from the correspondent of the Associated Press at St. Petersburg give details of the expulsion from Russia of George Kennan, the American author and lecturer, who, as called explicitly to the Associated Press on Friday last, was called upon at his hotel at St. Petersburg, Thursday evening, and informed, by a high police officer, that he must leave the country by 10 o'clock Friday evening.
