OBEYED BY 14,000 Answer to Shaffer's General Strike Order.

SIXTY THOUSAND MEN NOW OUT Leaders of the Amalgamated Association Disappointed Because There Was Not a Fuller Response.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 12.—The struggle for mastery between manufacturers and men in the steel strike is now sharply launched, and on the first show of strength advantage is with the former. The general strike order issued by President Shaffer, of the Amalgamated Association, has so far been obeyed by only about 14,000 men, according to the best figures obtainable here.

Shaffer Scores Western Men. The Amalgamated leaders were not disposed to do much talking today. They would discuss the situation in the West, I do not believe Vice-President Davis, of Chicago, has accepted a superintendency of the trust, as reported. My only regret is that the men working in the steel plants trust had not spirit enough to come out and join the strikers.
