Obey Shaffer's Order

Twelve South Chicago Men Quit Work—Action Caused Senation. CHICAGO, Aug. 19.—A genuine sensation was created among the steel workers of the Illinois Steel Works of South Chicago when 12 of the Amalgamated Iron and Steel Workers decided to join the general strike of the steel workers. These men heretofore have refused to obey President Shaffer's order to strike. As Vice-President David, of the Fourth district, was informed of the step these men had taken, he wired President Shaffer that if he would come to Chicago at once, he would be glad to meet with the two local lodges, the remainder of the 500 Amalgamated men employed in the South Chicago mills could be induced to strike. Mr. David tonight made the prediction that there would be a strike that would close the South Chicago mills inside of 10 days.

Textile Workers' Conference

Ten-Hour Day is Strongly Favored—Less Wages Means a Strike. NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—At a meeting of the executive committee of the International Union of Textile Workers of America, it was decided to call a special convention of the international union for November 18, at Washington, when the union will formulate a demand for a ten-hour day and a universal 10-hour day among the textile workers of America, to take effect as early as the committee can advise. This is a most important step, and the section most affected will be the South, as few states south of Virginia have any 10-hour law at the present time, and in even 12 states at present the prevailing day's work. While Virginia has a 10-hour law for women, it has no such limit for the male workers, and in this state also the law is not enforced.

Five Days in a Death Trap

Two Men Rescued From the Lake Erie Waterworks Tunnel. CLEVELAND, Aug. 19.—Adam Kest and Joseph Eugene, two of the workmen who were trapped in the water works tunnel by the burning of crib number 2 last Wednesday morning, were rescued from their dangerous position late this afternoon and are now lying semi-conscious at the Huron Street hospital. With careful nursing the physicians say they will soon recover their former strength. Shut off from the upper world, the men knew nothing of the catastrophe that killed so many of their comrades and imprisoned them. They knew that something had severed their connection with the crib, behind which they had taken refuge. They were too foolish to breathe. But they supposed the trouble was temporary. Each day they expected their comrades to come down the tunnel and help them. When they saw no sign of relief, tapping on the air pipes, was at last answered from the crib. Kest and Eugene were preparing to eat raw mule meat. Their deliverance came through the crib, which was impeded by this last resort to keep them alive.

Killed While Fighting a Fire

Six Men Caught by Explosion of Dynamite. LITTLE FALLS, N. Y., Aug. 19.—The Mohawk and Malone roundhouse at Herkimer was discovered to be on fire at 10:29 tonight. Watchman Gilbert and crew extinguished the flames. While the quantity of dynamite stored in the building exploded with terrific force, killing Gilbert and Deck and four others. The bodies of the last four men were unrecognizable and the roundhouse was wrecked and burned. It is feared there are other bodies in the ruins. The roundhouse is owned by the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad.

Seven Men in Explosion are Dead

YOUNGSTOWN, O., Aug. 19.—Seven of the 14 men injured by the explosion of molten metal in the blast furnace department of the Ohio plant of the National Steel Company are dead. Their names are: Richard Richards, John Cruikshank, Mike Jorinik, Andy Kahut, Mike O'Brien, Joseph Bucos, George Matink. Two others of the injured are in a serious condition. The accident was caused by the machinery which handles the hot metal not working properly.

Receivers for Lumber Company

BALTIMORE, Aug. 19.—Receivers were appointed here today for the Parkton Lumber Company, of the same name in this city, on the application of Charles E. Cockran, who asserts that he is the principal stockholder in both concerns. The receivers in both cases allege that the companies are insolvent because of the misconduct and mismanagement of an officer of the corporations interested. Cockran makes a sweeping denial of the charges preferred against him.
