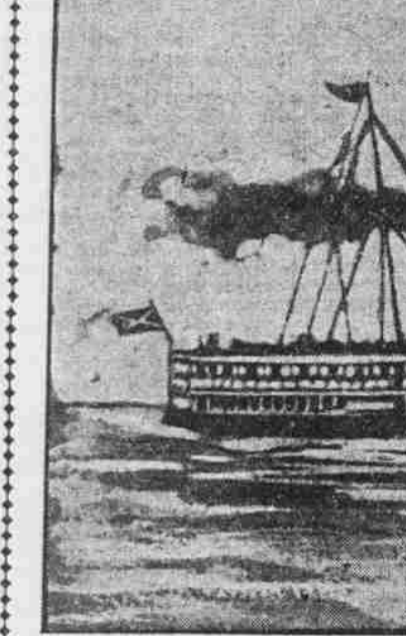
He is Said to Be Wanted for Complicity in Robbery of Salt Lake Postoffice.

Three Men Alleged to Have Much Paper of a Bank Long Defunct.

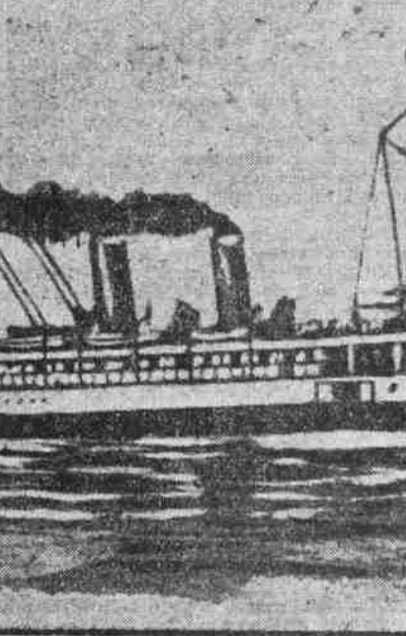
Notes Were Genuinely Printed.

Suit to Determine Heir. SALEM, Aug. 20.—A proceeding was commenced today which will determine the relative rights of a trustee in the United States Court in a bankruptcy case, and a receiver in the Circuit Court of Oregon in a partnership dissolution suit.

Walter Brannan, trustee of the bankrupt firm of Rountrier & Temple, filed a petition in the Circuit Court, asking an order directing H. T. Bruce, receiver of the same firm, to turn over the property in his hands to the trustee. Bruce was appointed receiver by Judge Boole, and took possession of the partnership property, selling a portion thereof. A few days ago Brannan was elected trustee of the same firm in a bankruptcy proceeding, and the question is as to the possession of the property.

No Change in Name of Society. SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 20.—The grand council of the Young Men's Institute today defeated, by an overwhelming majority, the proposition to change the name of the organization from the Young Men's Institute to the Catholic Institute of America. A resolution was adopted to the effect that hereafter there shall be voted from the fund of the grand council the sum of \$50 to the council of councils in whose city the grand body shall meet, to help defray the cost of entertaining the grand officers. Officers will be elected tomorrow.

Griffin, who resided in a lodging-house conducted by Gillespie, was quarreling with his wife, when Gillespie entered their apartments and endeavored to pacify the angry husband. According to Gillespie's statement, he raised a revolver from the cabinet and used a knife when he drew his pistol and fired, with fatal result.
