DR. KOCH'S THEORY.
Will be Ignored by Chicago Health Authorities.
CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—Dr. Arthur R. Reynolds, Health Commissioner of Chicago, has returned from England, where he attended the sessions of the British congress on tuberculosis, at which Dr. Koch expounded his tuberculosis theory. Whether the tests which are to be made of Koch's theory—that animal tuberculosis is not communicable to human beings—succeed or not, according to Dr. Reynolds the inspection of animals by the Health Department will continue, and those infected with tuberculosis will be condemned and disposed of as before.
"So long as I am Health Commissioner," said Dr. Reynolds, "the rigid inspection will continue. Animals infected with tuberculosis will be disposed of."

Koch Will Test His Theory.
PARIS, Aug. 28.—Dr. Koch has announced that he will inoculate Dr. Granville with bovine tuberculosis to test the theory that human and bovine tuberculosis have nothing to do with each other and that man cannot catch the disease from cattle.

HE STANDS BY BRYAN

But Senator Turner Says Silver Is Not Now an Issue.

REORGANIZATION TALK HUMBLED

Perpetuity of Republican Institutions, Trusts and Tariff Will Be the Issues in 1904—Declares Republicans Unpatriotic.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 28.—United States Senator George Turner, who left the Republican party on the money issue in 1896, and who has since signed the Democratic caucus roll in the Senate, has, at the request of The Oregonian, given out an interview relative to the political issues of 1904, with special reference to the course to be pursued by the Democratic party.

In brief, Senator Turner believes the main issue of the 1904 campaign may be the administrative and legislative measures to be adopted by the Republican party in the near future for the government of the islands that came under the control of this country as a result of the war with Spain. Moreover, the trust question, with which he says the tariff question is inseparably connected, is also, in his judgment, likely to be as vital an issue as what he terms the "colonial question." He believes any reorganization of the Democratic party unnecessary.

Four questions were submitted to Senator Turner, and he answers them in their order. The questions were:
First—What are your views relative to the elimination of Bryan and the caucus of any reference to the Chicago and Kansas City platforms by the Ohio Democracy?
Second—What, in your judgment, will be the leading issue of the 1904 campaign?
Third—What do you think of the future of Bryan as a leader in the Democratic party, and what is your opinion concerning the proposed reorganization of the Democratic party?
Fourth—Who is your personal choice for President?

Senator Turner's reply follows:
Silver Is Not an Issue.
"If you mean by your first question to imply that Mr. Bryan and his friends have been eliminated from leadership in the Democratic party, I do not believe that such has occurred, and it is likely to occur in the near future. Mr. Bryan is a very great man, and will continue to exercise a commanding influence in the councils of his party. If, however, your question has reference to the silver issue, I say frankly that I do not expect the next Democratic National convention to insist on the restoration of silver as one of our money metals; nor do I expect Mr. Bryan to urge anything of the kind."

"The very large output of gold since 1896, and certain fortuitous local conditions, have improved the situation so that it would be useless to insist on pressing the silver question on the country at this time. Students of history and economics may see an end to the present enormous output of gold, and a renewal of conditions under which, for a generation prior to 1896, values were being squeezed out of property until all debtors became bankrupt, and may well insist that the restoration of silver to our money metal will improve present conditions, but preclude the certainty of future disaster; but unfortunately it is only present evils that impress the majority of men, and therefore, in the face of other great natural forces, some of them involving the very existence of Republican institutions, and depending upon the Democratic success for right solution, I would not advise any patriotic to continue an agitation now of pressing importance, however it may be in the future."

"I think it was this consideration that induced the Ohio Democracy to omit in its late platform any reference to the Chicago or Kansas City platforms, and not any hostility to Mr. Bryan, or any belief that the principles of the Republican party were being fundamentally wrong. Whether the Ohio Democracy was wise in its action remains to be seen."

Issues of the Future.
"In answer to your second interrogatory, I will say that the present purpose of the Republican party to debase our Republic by instituting the establishment of arbitrary colonial governments abroad, which may eventually into various measures of legislation and administration by the present Republican majority before the campaign of 1904, if persisted in, will furnish the most important issue in that campaign. Arbitrary colonial government, or in fact any kind of colonial government, is opposed to the ideas of the founders of the Republic, and stifles their every act and utterance, and is likewise opposed to the letter and spirit of the organic law which they formulated and adopted for the perpetuity of the liberties of themselves and their children. A majority of the Supreme Court so held in the insular cases, and it needs but a cursory reading of our political history to satisfy anyone of the truth of what I say."

"What is the meaning, then, of the present manifest design of the leaders of the Republican party in dealing with the people who have been brought under our control as a result of the war with Spain? It is simply that, as they have given away the rights and interests of the people to finance a generation at the demand of organized wealth, as they have allied themselves for years with the same power until industrial conditions are absolutely at the mercy of half a dozen great trusts, so now, at the behest of the same power, in order that it may have a wider field of exploitation and one not hampered by constitutional restraints, they are prepared to stultify the fathers of the Republic, and to debase the sacred institutions which they left as a heritage to their children."

It is assumed here that Ecuador would join with Venezuela in any movement against Colombia—the two Liberal governments standing united against the Conservative element in control here, and making counter charges of interference with their affairs and of fostering revolutions.

There seems little doubt that the charges on both sides are well founded. The Liberals of one republic have lent a helping hand to their struggling brethren in adjacent territory, and the Conservatives have retaliated in kind. Colombia has, however, been the chief sufferer, as her revolution has already lasted nearly two years. It is estimated that from 25,000 to 40,000 lives have already been sacrificed, and the end is not yet, as the smoldering embers of revolt are coming into flame in a dozen sections simultaneously, and the Liberals do not hesitate to announce that they are preparing to deal a final blow.

The Conservatives retort by declaring that they have vanquished every army that has been collected, and that there only remain a few bushwhackers who carry on a spasmodic guerrilla warfare, attacking the Liberal forces from larger bodies, robbing exposed stores and ranches, and pillaging wayfarers.

Calls Them Vagabonds.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The ex-Governor of Colombia, General Mutes Duran, who is now in New York, in discussing the situation in Colombia, said that the rebels are a lot of vagabonds, and that the government will subdue the rebellion. Those injured are: Theresa Rhein, of Philadelphia, fatally; Louise Panschock, of Philadelphia, fatally; also a large number of residents of Philadelphia, Camden and towns near by, who were less seriously hurt.

After the explosion the boat took fire and ran aground. Tonight she lies a wrecked and blackened hulk in the marshes opposite Torresdale, 15 miles above the city. Her hold is filled with water, and it is feared more of her passengers and crew may be found in the bottom of the boat when the water is pumped out.

The City of Trenton made daily trips between Philadelphia and Trenton. She left the company's wharf at 1:45 o'clock this afternoon. At a point near Torresdale the steam pipe connecting the port boiler burst with a loud report. Before any of the passengers or employees had an opportunity of seeking places of safety an explosion occurred, and this time the port boiler was rent in twain. Scalding steam and water poured into the cabin, and sections of the woodwork of the boat were torn away by the force of the explosion. Those of the passengers who were not scalded by the steam and boiling water were struck by the flying portions of the splintered cabin. Legs and arms were broken and faces and bodies were parboiled.

The water was only four feet deep, and many of the passengers waded shore. All of the seriously injured were hastily conveyed to the hospital at Hulesburg, three miles below Torresdale.

Chief Engineer Murphy, who was on watch when the accident happened, reported to the officials in this city tonight that the boiler which exploded carried only 150 pounds of steam.

Late tonight two additional bodies were recovered from the wreck of the steamer and brought to the morgue in this city. At midnight the city police, who are searching the river, caught the body of a boy on their grappling iron in the channel where the explosion occurred. Later the body of a middle-aged man was recovered. There is a strong belief that more victims are in the river.

THREE GET NEW JOBS

Markham, Miller and Coman Are Promoted.

O. & C. NOT MERGED WITH O. R. & N.

New Position Created for Markham in San Francisco—Miller Takes Traffic of Southern Pacific Oregon Lines, Coman O. R. & N.

An O. R. & N. circular will be issued today announcing the appointment of William E. Coman to be assistant general freight agent of the O. R. & N., vice R. B. Miller, resigned to take service elsewhere. Mr. Miller will be appointed general freight and passenger agent of the Oregon Lines of the Southern Pacific, and C. H. Markham, who now holds that position, will go to San Francisco as assistant freight traffic manager of the Southern Pacific Company.

This news was liberally late last night, and it settles matters that have been in a state of much uncertainty for several months. Consolidation of Union Pacific (Oregon Short Line) and Southern Pacific Salt Lake City agencies under the Southern Pacific management, which was effected by the appointment of Mr. Miller from the assistant general freight agency of the O. R. & N. to the position of general freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, will report to the head office in San Francisco, just as Mr. Markham now does. R. Campbell remains as general freight manager of the O. R. & N., without having his authority extended over the Southern Pacific as many expected. Neither is there any change in the status of General Passenger Agent Craig, of the O. R. & N. It is deemed unlikely that further changes will take place in the official staffs of these Oregon roads.
