OFF FOR THE REGATTA

QUEEN AND HER SUITE LEAVE IN ROYAL STYLE.

Gala Scene at Ash-Street Wharf on the Departure of the Harvest Queen.

It was a jolly crowd of passengers that left Ash-street dock yesterday on board the steamer Harvest Queen for Astoria. The steamer had previously been tastefully decorated in honor of Her Majesty, Queen of the Regatta, Miss Ivy Barker, and her retinue. Flags and pennants fluttered from the masts and rigging, and the ladies' cabin was converted into a throne-room. The national colors were draped gracefully everywhere within, and tropical plants scattered about gave the spectator the impression that he was in a veritable bower.

Admiral E. S. Edwards looked gorgeous in his naval uniform, a navy-blue coat, white trousers and cap and tan shoes. This uniform was also worn by his staff, whose members were everywhere, making people feel at home. One squad lined the gangway, and when the Admiral arrived the white caps were raised in salute and the regimental band played "See, the Conquering Hero Comes." The Admiral returned the salute with becoming dignity as he stepped between the files and along the gangway to the deck of the steamer.

Her Majesty arrived at the dock in an elegant open barouche at exactly 12:30, and as she approached and in a post walking-suit of creamy color, accompanied by Prime Minister C. W. Fulton, the band played the stirring march, "America Forever Victorious." As the royal pair passed on board the boat between the saluting files the Admiral was on the forward deck to bid them welcome.

All the ceremonies were conducted on a regal scale, and suggested a familiarity with court scenes in European capitals.

As the steamer left the dock the waving of handkerchiefs and hats from her decks was returned with vigor by the crowd of friends on shore. Other river craft added to the merry din by their prolonged whistling, and a big cannon boomed away from the O. R. & N. wharf. The crowd ashore watched the graceful Harvest Queen as she swung out into the stream, and then steamed gracefully down toward Burnside-street bridge, whose draw was promptly opened to permit the passage of the royal craft.

Nearly 300 invitations had been issued, and from the crowded appearance of the upper cabin it was thought that nearly every eye had been accepted. The day was bright and clear, and a gentle river breeze fanned the cheeks of the happy celebrators, assuring them a most delightful ride down the broad Columbia and a successful three day fete when they reached Astoria. From Salmon River Postoffice.

R. W. Parker came in from Salmon River postoffice yesterday. He says that the fires have subsided, and with the exception of the damage that was done near Pleasant Home, he does not think the losses have been serious. One party was

driven out of their camp by fire, and lost their bedding. On the way between Revenue's and Pleasant Home he noticed that the fire had approached within about 20 feet of two sawmills. He judged that there had been a hard fight to save the property. Mr. Parker reports that the mountains are filled with camping parties, fishing is excellent and all are enjoying good sport.

PERMITS ARE NECESSARY.

Sidewalks Cannot Be Built or Repaired Without Them.

The city ordinance requiring permits to be procured at the City Engineer's office before any sidewalk improvement can be made, is to be strictly enforced in future. Property-owners will do well to bear this in mind and also the fact that they must not pay the contractors for sidewalk work until the contractors present a certificate showing that the work has been accepted by the City Engineer.

The object in issuing permits is to keep a record of all sidewalk work done, and the reason for not paying contractors before their work is accepted, is to make sure that they have cleaned up the street and removed all old planks or other debris before they are paid. One reason why the law in regard to procuring permits to make sidewalk improvements has heretofore not been enforced is that no one has ever dreamed of making any such improvements until notified peremptorily to do so, and the record of notices answered the purpose of the record of permits.

Now since Councilman Mulkey has had more stringent laws enacted providing for the health and cleanliness of the city, and notices to repair sidewalks are being served on every hand and can be enforced, many people are hastening to build new sidewalks or repair old ones and they must secure permits.

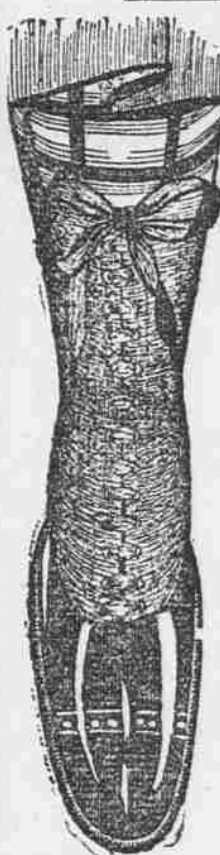

The Goble, Nehalem & Pacific. ST. HELENS, Or., Aug. 28.—The receiver of the Goble, Nehalem & Pacific Railway, A. E. Maxwell, today said that arrangements had been made to sell the logs and poles in the company's boom at Goble, and with the proceeds pay the la-

borers' liens. Mill men from Portland are now looking over the logs preparing to make a bid on them. Mr. Maxwell also said that two Michigan lumbermen had their cruisers out in the timber at the end of the road, and that there was little doubt that the land for which he is trustee will be sold to these gentlemen. The road will then be extended to these lands and again put in operation. Mr. Maxwell said that they were abundantly able to buy the lands, build the necessary road and to operate it.

Reform Club Prizes. NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The committee of judges selected by the Reform Club to award the prizes offered by the club for the best original essay on given fields of inquiry has awarded the first prize to Edward F. Adams, of San Francisco, his subject being "Credit Facilities for Rural Communities"; the second prize to A. D. S. Gilett, of West Superior, Wis., whose

essay was entitled "Better Credit Facilities for our Rural Communities," and the third prize to George R. De Saumure, of Atlanta, Ga., for an article on "Branch Banking."

The Charges Against Humphreys. WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—The Attorney-General today received a telegram signed by 59 attorneys of Honolulu, returning the charges made against Judge Humphreys, and asking for his removal. Yesterday he received a telegram signed by about 25 members of the Honolulu bar expressing their entire confidence in Judge Humphreys, and asking that he be retained in his office.

Oregon City Pioneer. OREGON CITY, Aug. 28.—D. J. Sawicki, a pioneer teazel-grower of this city, died suddenly at 1 o'clock this morning of heart disease.
