

CITY NEWS IN BRIEF

FOURTHS HIMSELF RICH.—A farmer who owns a gravel patch of 60 acres near the line between Multnomah and Clatsop Counties has agreed to allow the County Commissioners of both counties to take gravel from it for improving roads at 25 cents per cubic yard. They are to excavate to a depth of 30 feet and take everything clean as they go. Yesterday this farmer was in town to find a mathematician who could tell him how much his farm was going to bring him; that is to say, how much the first 30-foot layer would bring him. He found a man who figured that he was 204 square yards in a rod and 480 square rods in an acre. The layer being 30 yards in thickness, an acre of the layer contains 48,000 yards, which, at 25 cents per yard, amounts to \$12,000. The farm of 60 acres, 30 feet in depth, at this, would bring \$7,200,000. The farmer, however, who is now 60 years of age, is not so sure of this, and he would only charge the county 20 cents per yard for the gravel and trust to getting even on the next generation when he is gone. The next 30-foot layer. He will be in luck if he gets 20 cents per yard for his gravel, as County Commissioners and Road Supervisors have a habit of cutting a person's land and taking all the gravel they want and never paying anything for it.

PATH TO WILLAMETTE HEIGHTS.—The County Commissioners audited bills for the month of July yesterday and ordered the bridge span on the Cully road repaired, at the request of various duck-shooters. This runs between the Columbia Slough and Sandy river. Ed Lyons was before the County Commissioners yesterday urging the construction of a bicycle path, beginning at Fifteenth and Washington streets, and ending at the Twenty-second street, the base of Willamette Heights. The route is along Fifteenth street to Flinders, thence to Twenty-second, and follows a zigzag course to the further end. The bill of \$100,000 has been contemplated for some time, and the Commissioners will probably take favorable action soon. The lowest bid received for the construction of the path, according to specifications prepared by the City Engineer, was \$200. The Commissioners think that figure is high and will ask Mr. Lyons to draw up new specifications and let whether they cannot get the amount reduced a little.

FRUIT FOR BUFFALO.—The request for fruit for the session of the American Poultrying Society and for Oregon day at the Buffalo Exposition has caused fruitgrowers to "loosen up," and Superintendent Dorsch will be happy when he receives the packages that were sent to him yesterday by Secretary Grand, of the State Board of Horticulture. The contributors were: Mrs. Alfred J. Armstrong, 400 Prescott street, Italian prunes and egg plums; L. T. Reynolds, of Salem, Bartlett pears; A. Holliday, of Scappoose, crab apples; B. G. Leedy, of Tigardville, Graveston apples, running three tiers to a large box. Mr. Lamberton made a trip Wednesday to Mr. Dorsch's orchard, a few miles west of Portland, and picked a few peaches of Mr. Dorsch's favorite—the Dutch prune. It is larger than an egg plum, but has a taste as good as a Hungarian prune, and has a delicious flavor. It will be a marvel to the Exposition exhibitors.

CARRIAGE TWO BRICKS.—The dispute between R. St. Clair, known as "Dollar Bill," and R. A. Phillips, both colored, was heard yesterday by Acting Municipal Judge McDewitt. St. Clair testified that Phillips called at his saloon on Fourth street, played pool and ran up a bill of 20 cents, and then said he had no money. St. Clair asked him to retire and Phillips was ejected, and he was heard to say: "Dollar, I have it in for you." Some little time afterward, when witness was on his way to a lodge meeting, Phillips rushed up with one of his hands under his coat, and witness, thinking Phillips was about to draw a weapon, took out his revolver and struck Phillips on the head. Witness then saw that Phillips was carrying two bricks, in defiance of Phillips testified he carried bricks, but could not say why he did so. The case was continued until tomorrow.

INSULTED WOMAN.—A drunken man whose name could not be learned, was knocked down at the corner of Fourth and Washington streets last night at 9:30 o'clock by another man, accompanied by two women, whom the drunken man insulted. He was struck by the fall and appeared to have been badly injured, but an examination in Woodward, Clarke & Co.'s drug store revealed that the man had only sustained a bruise on the side of his face. The affair created considerable excitement.

ASKS FOR CONFIRMATION OF SALE.—The administrator of the estate of James A. Ham, deceased, yesterday filed a petition in the County Court asking for the confirmation of the sale by him of certain lands in Jackson County, Oregon. The property of the estate is all under order of sale, the proceeds to be used to pay the creditors, of which the principal one is the Centenary Methodist Episcopal Church.

REAL ESTATE BUSINESS GOOD.—Real estate transfers for the eight months ending August 31 aggregated \$3,244,494, compared with \$4,653,671 for the same period in 1900 and \$4,495,222 for the same period in 1899. Based on the transactions, real estate business for the first eight months of 1901 was nearly one-third better than in the same period of last year.

LOCATING A LEAK.—The difficulty of locating leaks in water mains beneath asphalt pavement is now being illustrated at the corner of Third and Morrison streets, where a little rivulet of Bull Run has been finding its way into the gutter for several days past. Five holes were picked through the asphalt before the leak was struck, and the pavement was considerably torn up. The cause of the trouble was found to be a wooden plug that had been driven into the "dead end" of a five-inch pipe when it was laid many years ago. This was speedily replaced with a metallic cap, and the leak will now be filled in again, though it will be some time before the asphalt patches can be laid properly.

MORTGAGE TAX ONCE MORE

Suit to Prevent the City From Collecting on the Marquam Block.

A suit against the City of Portland to restrain the sale of the Marquam block for four lots in block 130, Portland, for mortgage taxes, was filed in the State Circuit Court yesterday by J. Thorburn Ross, trustee, as plaintiff. It is set forth in the complaint that the claim of the city is void, and that, it would seem, is an attempt again to raise the question whether the mortgage tax is a lien upon the land. The matter of the regularity of the assessment may also be an issue. It is alleged that the plaintiff is the owner of block 130 and lots 1, 2, 3 and 4, block 130, Portland, which in 1892 and 1893 was owned by P. A. Marquam. In May, 1898, it is stated that Marquam executed a mortgage in favor of the German Savings & Loan Society for \$35,000 on block 130, and in May, 1899, signed another mortgage in favor of the same company for \$50,000, also that June 4, 1899, he executed a third mortgage in favor of this association, covering all of the property mentioned for \$50,000. The mortgages were all paid and released in February, 1891, and Marquam mortgaged to James Pheasant, of San Francisco, the amount being \$250,000.

These mortgages, it is averred, were assessed for tax by the City Auditor in 1891, as follows:

Name of taxpayer, German Savings & Loan Society; description of property, block 178, P. M. block 130, Portland, P. A. Marquam. Value, \$15,000; tax, \$120.

Name of taxpayer, German Savings & Loan Society; description, block 178. Value, \$25,000; tax, \$200.

Name of taxpayer, same; description, block 178. Value, \$25,000; tax, \$200.

In 1893, by the City Assessor. Name of taxpayer, James Pheasant; description of property, lots 1 to 4, inclusive, block 130, block 178, P. A. Marquam. Value, \$125,000; tax, \$1,250.

The City of Portland, it is alleged, claims a lien on the premises described, and threatens to sell the same to recover taxes. This claim, it is asserted, constitutes a cloud upon plaintiff's title, but such claim is null and void and of no effect. An order restraining the sale is asked. J. Thorburn Ross, E. H. Seabrook and W. A. Manly are named as the attorneys.
