

CITY NEWS IN BRIEF

NEW Y. M. C. A. BUILDING.—The reconstruction of the Y. M. C. A. building has been delayed by the strike in San Francisco, the steel supports necessary not being forthcoming. The southwest quarter of the building, however, is well on toward completion, as but one story had to be added in order to make it a four-story structure. The new roof had been raised to the desired height, and now the brick walls have been carried up to meet it. This portion of the building contains the swimming tank, gymnasium, ball court, and class-rooms. The tank has been completed, and is the most spacious on the Coast, with the exception of that at the Sutro baths, in San Francisco. It is 250 feet in length, 100 feet in width, and 10 feet in depth. The association hopes to have this portion of the building ready for use October 1.

PARK COMMISSION.—The Portland Park Commission held its regular monthly meeting in the Mayor's office yesterday morning. The session was devoted to auditing bills for August, and estimates for September. The expense account for August made a total of \$120.35, and for this month the estimate is \$110.12. Michael Scheidecker, a landscape gardener, presented an elaborate plan for beautifying the city parks, but its cost precluded the possibility of its acceptance. LICENSE TAGS COME HIGHER.—License tags for vehicles will cost the city 100 per cent more this year, which is an advance of 25 cents over last year's price. The tags are to be of tin, and must be stamped in four different colors, as licenses are payable quarterly, and the color has to be changed four times a year, so that collectors can discern at a distance whether the expressman has paid his license or not. The tags will be needed under the contract, which has been awarded to Bolles & Strow, who control this tin plate plant at Astoria. The advance in price is attributed to the tin plate trust and the great strike in the East.

WILL HAVE A GOOD EFFECT OREGON WILL BE BENEFITED BY AN EXHIBIT AT CHARLESTON.

Superintendent Dorsch Expects to Reach Manufacturers Who Go South in Winter.

To those who have been disposed to believe that the state will waste \$200 by making an exhibit at the Charleston exposition, the assurance of Henry E. Dorsch, the Oregon superintendent at Buffalo, that good results will follow will be comforting. Mr. Dorsch has endeavored at Buffalo to attract the attention of manufacturers to Oregon's resources, but this desirable call has not been very numerous at the Pan-American exposition. Mr. Dorsch expects to reach the manufacturers while they are spending their vacations in the South. He writes from Buffalo to Secretary Lamson, of the State Board of Horticulture, that he was cordially treated while he was in Charleston. Of the exposition he says: "The Charleston people are going to make a success of their exposition, notwithstanding that the Government refused to assist them and turned down the small amount asked for. From what little I saw of it in two days' stay, it is just the sort of exposition Portland should have in 1905, especially in the matter of cost, which will come within our reach. I have carefully inquired into the cost of every building, the arrangement of the grounds, building of lagoons, lakes, etc., maintenance and other expenses. These were given to me in confidence, and I would send a statement of them. They will come out in due time, and I am sure the promoters of Portland's 1905 Exposition will be pleased when they learn the actual cost on the opening day. "The Charleston managers have promised me cordial support for 1905, and I have no reason to doubt their sincerity. The new South is rising phoenix-like in this matter, and these are part of her manufacturing interests. The South now has the largest cotton mills in America, with all the improved, up-to-date machinery rapidly becoming a dangerous rival of down East, and in a few years will crowd the cotton manufacturing establishments of New England to the wall. There is much for us to learn in this lesson, and the sooner we understand the better. By reason of our exhibits at Buffalo, manufacturers are making some inquiry regarding our resources, present output and future possibilities. I have no doubt that many will send agents to Oregon to look over our field from their own peculiar standpoint. Of these agents fall into the proper hands when they reach Oregon, and there is no doubt that they will make a report favorable to us as a manufacturing field. It is to be hoped, therefore, that no pessimist will cross their path.

"While perhaps we may not do much business with the South by reason of our exhibit at Charleston, except in lumber, oranges and some fruit, we shall be more than compensated for the \$200 we shall spend by the opportunity afforded to meet capitalists and manufacturers from the North who spend the winter in the South. While at Charleston I found hundreds of fine dwellings locked up, which, I was informed, belong to Northerners who come here to winter. If you would catch rabbits, you must go to the South, and there is no doubt that the capitalists and manufacturers by their absence from Buffalo, are doing the daily work of the South. It is the particular kind of rabbit that Oregon is hunting, and, as the boy said when he killed the woodchuck, he was out of the world where the rabbit was, is proper that we should go to Charleston hunting.

"I have been promised all the space free of charge that I may require at Charleston. At my suggestion the management has erected a large building for composite exhibits, instead of scattering exhibits throughout several buildings. I have asked for and been granted 15,000 square feet, a space five times as large as that occupied by the permanent exhibit at Portland, and I have the stuff to fill it out, too. Oregon is going to be the biggest pebble on the Charleston beach."

ALL WILL USE CRUDE OIL.

D. M. Watson Tells of Increased Demand in California.

D. M. Watson has returned from Los Angeles more than ever imbued with the idea that oil is going to revolutionize the fuel supply of the entire Pacific Coast. He is interested in a well at Redondo, which is now down over 100 feet, and in which there is probably 100 feet of crude oil. He says the Santa Fe Railroad is equipping all its locomotive tenders for storing oil instead of coal; and that the Southern Pacific will also do the same thing, clear to Portland. "The O. R. & N.," he said, "figures that it can land oil as far east as Huntington to meet the coal from Wyoming. The British American coal mines have already shut down, because they have been crowded out of the San Francisco market by cheap oil from Southern California."

"Oil is being found as far north as Colusa, Cal., and I am certain the Willamette Valley is full of it. At Walla Walla splendid oil has been found, and I think they will strike it before long. The oil becomes finer as we come north, that in the Sacramento Valley being fit for illuminating purposes."

He thinks the Standard Oil Company is friendly to the development of oil fields, as it buys up all the product. The price has been forced down to 25 cents a barrel by the big monopoly. Oil stands in pools around many wells, and evaporation causes much of it to be lost, leaving nothing but the asphalt sediment. The owners of these pools are willing to take any-
