

## ROOSEVELT IS SANGUINE

BELIEVES THE PRESIDENT WILL BE OUT OF DANGER TODAY.

He Told Laborers He Was Not Afraid, Because They Were His Protectors.

MILBURN HOUSE, BUFFALO, Sept. 9.—Vice-President Roosevelt will not leave the city until the physicians of the President issue a bulletin or give an opinion that the President will positively recover. Tonight, in company with his host, Ansley Wilcox, he went out for a short drive. He is, without doubt, the most sanguine of the Government officials here, unless it be Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, who predicts that the President will be out in two weeks. Vice-President Roosevelt said tonight:

"I came here because I believed my place was near the President. The situation here is entirely cleared up. If I were predicting when I shall leave here, I should say tomorrow, because I firmly believe the physicians will announce tomorrow that the President is absolutely no longer in danger and that would not be so if the bulletins did not tell the exact truth."

The Vice-President was asked to express an opinion on legislation against anarchy. He said:

"It is not the time or place to discuss such matters. The only thing to be thought of now is the President's complete and rapid recovery."

## ROOSEVELT NOT AFRAID.

He Told Laborers Who Asked Him That They Were His Protectors.

BUFFALO, Sept. 9.—"I may say that I have even deeper information than the bulletins, and I again say with great confidence that the President will recover."

The Vice-President's statement was made in an interview with an Associated Press correspondent, while walking to the Milburn house. He reiterated the statement after he had been 15 minutes' visit with the physicians. The Vice-President did not leave the Wilcox mansion, where he is staying, until after the noon hour, and he was with the President's personal physician, Dr. George H. W. Peck, in the company with a correspondent of the Associated Press. Just after he left the mansion he was accompanied by a colored man who was talking to him.

"Governor, may I shake hands with you?" he said.

"You certainly may," answered the Vice-President, taking quickly and grasping his hand; and then, as two laborers with dinner pails and tools slipped up, he shook hands with them.

"Aren't you afraid of being shot?" asked one of the men.

"No, sir," he snapped out, "and I hope no official of this country will be ever afraid. You men are our protection, and the fact that you are here is the more vigorous in your protection of the lives of those whom you elect to office. Such men as you can work with the ballot the salvation of the country, without resort to violence."

As he walked on, the Vice-President discussed the case of the President and his condition. He said:

"I believe that the bulletins being issued are none too sanguine. In fact, I know they are not. I am perfectly positive that the President will recover, and more than that, I believe the President will be brief and the recovery rapid. Two or three men and a relative were shot in the same manner in the Cuban campaign. They lay in the hospital some time with no attendance, and yet they recovered."

Three members of the Cabinet—Gage, Hitchcock and Wilson—arrived while the Vice-President was in consultation. This gave rise to a report that the Cabinet officers would arrive with the doctor as to a contemplated operation, but Secretary Gage promptly dispelled such reports. He said to the Associated Press that everything was being done in the most efficient manner, and that the President would be out of the hospital in a matter of days.

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## MAN WHO WAS GLAD LET OUT.

Government Called in His Contract for Carrying the Mail.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—Second Assistant Postmaster-General Shallenberger today summarily cancelled the contract of a mail carrier for expressing satisfaction over the shooting of President McKinley.

The name of the person thus dealt with is Charles F. Cortright, and he had a contract for carrying the mail between Homer, Franklin County, N. Y., and Spafford, in Oneida County, the same route. The information concerning his offense came to the Postoffice Department through the postmaster at Homer, who enclosed affidavits from four citizens of the place confirming his report.

It appears that when Cortright first received the announcement of the news of the shooting of the President, he was marked with an oath he was "glad of it," and added that the President should have been killed years ago. Hearing of this, the postmaster at Homer called upon Cortright and asked if the report were correct, and he replied that it was. Upon receiving this information, duly supported by the oaths of the citizens, the postmaster at Homer made a feeling of uneasiness that seemed to be shared in by all who read it. 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## UNRAVELING THE PLOT

Police of United States Are Conducting Vigorous Search—Chicago Chief Reports Her Location.

CHICAGO, Sept. 9.—Chief O'Neal announced late this evening that Emma Goldman is under surveillance not far from Chicago, although not in this city. He said that she had been located, and intimated that she will be arrested soon.

Police and secret service officials became convinced that Emma Goldman, whose revolutionary speeches suggested the plot, was the prime mover in the Chicago plot. The Chicago police are now making a search for her, and it is believed that she will be arrested soon.

A young man, who represented himself as a friend of Miss Goldman, called at the Chicago postoffice today and inquired for mail in her name. It happened at the time that a substitute was in charge of the window, and not thinking of the valuable clerk that was presented of ascertaining the whereabouts of the woman, the clerk permitted the man to go without hindrance.

Having come to the conclusion that the attempted assassination of President McKinley was the result of a plot arranged in this city, United States secret service officers today telegraphed Chief Wilkie, of the United States marshal at Buffalo, asking him to send Colgoose's coat to Chicago immediately. The officers believe the mark on the assassin's coat will prove that it was made by a tailor who lived very recently in Buffalo.
