Great Filly Stakes Given to Whittier's Blue Girl.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—The stewards of the Conny Island Jockey Club today sustained the protest of Jerry Dunn against the filly Leonora Loring, in the Great Filly stake, and disqualified the filly. Dunn's protest was based on the grounds that track today when the decision of the stewards was known. The determination gives the rich stake of \$24,000 to Whittier C. Whitney, whose filly Blue Girl was beaten a short head by a questionable ride by Shaw, for which he was suspended three racing days. The matter must now be submitted to the stewards of the Jockey Club for their approval. Jerry Dunn protested against Leonora Loring on the ground of irregularity in entering the filly. She was committed for the Great Filly stakes by Major G. H. Thomas. She is said to be owned jointly by L. M. CELEBRATING THE 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF KING ALFRED'S DEATH.

LONDON, Sept. 18.—The ceremonies proper in connection with the celebration of the one thousandth anniversary of the death of King Alfred the Great began in Winchester yesterday with a lecture on the life of the King by Frederic Harrison and a reading from Tennyson's "Becket" by Sir Henry Irving. There was a large attendance of visitors from all parts of the United Kingdom. Mr. Harrison reminded his American hearers that from the Danish settlement, which King Alfred had permitted, had gone the first American settlers.

The Mayor of Winchester, in the course of an address, made a sympathetic reference to the late President McKinley.

Sir Henry Irving, replying to a vote of thanks for the reading, referred to Mr. McKinley as "the emblem of noble purpose, high thought and patriotism," and declared that
