Origin of the Wilder Medal. The Pomological Society of America, which includes the British Provinces, was founded in 1847, and its first president, J. Wilder, the veteran enthusiast in horticulture, was its first president, and for many years filled that important position. It included among its members, then as now, all the noted fruitgrowers in order to stimulate the production of new varieties as well as perfect fruits, the so-called "fruit of the year" award, which, for obvious reasons, did not prove satisfactory, and they decided on medals of award instead, and in honor of their president and promoter the name "Wilder Medal" was given to the award.

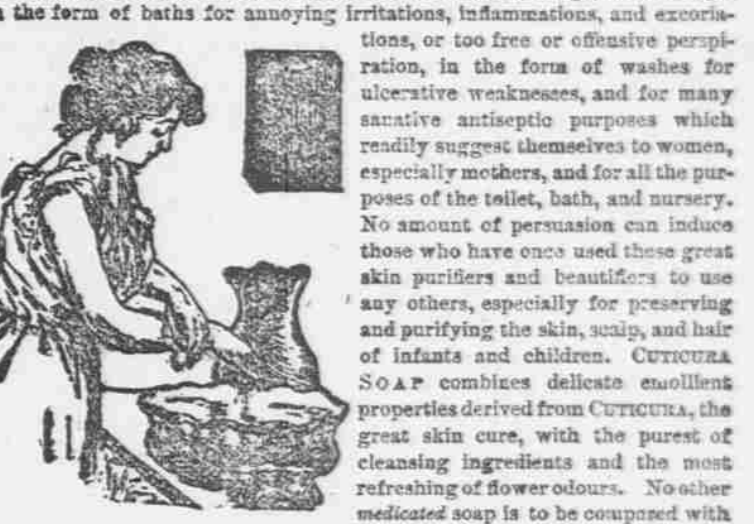
